Weather Conditions.

A moderate disturbance is passing northeastward over the Lake region, and there are slight depressions over the southern Plateau states and interior western Canada; the pressure is relatively high along the Pacific coast, and from Alberta and Saskatchewan southwestward to the Gulf of Mexico. Precipitation has occurred in most of the northern states in southern Saskatchewan, Kansas, southern Texas, Missouri, and Tennessee; snow was falling at observation time this morning on the slopes of the northern Rockies. The weather is in degrees or more warmer in Colorado, and correspondingly cooler in northern Nevada, southern Texas and Tennessee.
 The conditions are favorable for partly cloudy weather in the district tonight and Wednesday. Light frost will form in the early morning in western Oregon and western Washington, and heavy frost east of the Cascade mountains.

CALVIN HEILIG BACK WITH NEW FEATURE FILM PLAN FOR WEST

Circuit May Be Formed for Larger Cities With Same Prices as Standard Plays.

A motion picture circuit which would handle multiple reel photoplay productions in the Pacific northwest on much the same basis that theatrical road shows are handled is a tentative scheme under consideration by Calvin Heilig, who has just returned from the east.
 The pictures which the circuit would handle would be such as the "Birth of a Nation," "Civilization," "Intolerance," "The Ten Commandments," etc. The circuit if formed would consist of a chain of houses in the larger cities in the district west of the Rocky mountains. These would be equipped to show the big pictures properly equipped with light and mechanical traps to bring out a last degree of realism.
 The prices charged as admission would be standard road show prices, ranging from \$1 to \$2. These houses in the east are said to be a big financial success because they occupy an entirely different field from the program picture houses and therefore do not come into competition with the latter.

Fisher-Thorsen to Sell Paint Business

W. P. Fuller & Co. Said to Be Purchasers; Portland Firm Plans Entirely to Retire From Business.

Negotiations are known to be under way for the sale of a portion of the business of Fisher-Thorsen & Co., to W. P. Fuller & Co. Parties to the sale did not deny today that plans for the sale had been practically completed, although neither side would discuss the matter.
 It is understood that Fisher-Thorsen & Co. probably will retire from business.
 The offices of W. P. Fuller & Co., now located at Twelfth and Davis streets, will be removed to the Fisher-Thorsen & Co. site at Front and Morrison streets.
 Security of paint-making materials, due to war conditions, is said by M. G. Thorsen of the selling corporation, to be the cause of the transfer. The competitive field has been made undesirable, it was stated. Head offices of W. P. Fuller & Co. are at San Francisco. Financial considerations involved in the sale have not been mentioned.

Clarence E. Platts Was Mining Man

The death of Clarence E. Platts in British Columbia on April 29 will be a matter of regret to many friends throughout the northwest who knew him as an active mining man. Mr. Platts was born in Michigan in 1856 and came to Oregon in 1877, settling on a farm near Turner.
 For the last 25 years he had been interested in mining in eastern Oregon, Idaho, Washington, Montana and British Columbia, and spent a good deal of time traveling. He is survived by three sons, John, Platts of Eugene; William J. of Eugene, and Edwin S. Platts, formerly of Baker and now residing in this city. Three sisters are: Mrs. Clara L. Pickard of Eugene; Mrs. Nora L. Pickard of Newberg and Mrs. Emma J. Hammett of Alberta, Canada.
 The funeral services were held in Turner, Or., on Wednesday last, and interment made in the family plot of the cemetery there.

Stanfield Goes to Washington.
 Stanfield, Or., May 1.—R. Stanfield, speaker of the house of representatives of the Oregon legislature, has left for Washington, D. C., where he goes as the representative of the governor and the Oregon Council of Defense, where, at the suggestion of Secretary of War Baker, delegates from all the states will meet for the purpose of discussing and advising methods of conserving the food supply and fuel supply of the country, fixing prices and methods of encouraging greater production of food supplies.

War Birds to Be No Bar to Enlistments

Discharges from the National Guard on account of marriage will be restricted entirely to those whose marriage contracts antedate the declaration of war between the United States and Germany.
 This is the ruling of Brigadier General Henry P. Maitland, assistant general of the army, received here today, and means that possession of a war bride will not bring about a discharge. Marriages contracted after May 1 will not be regarded as a bar to enlistment, say the instructions.

"How can I kill slugs?" asks an amateur gardener.
 "Gather dust from the road and scatter it upon the leaves," advises the county agriculturist. "Slugs will not stick to dusty leaves. A little Paris green sprinkled lightly upon the plants will destroy the pests and so will arsenate of lead. But common dust is safer and almost as efficient."
 "Can potatoes be dipped in formalin after being cut?" asked H. L. Morris of Oregon City.

No. Potatoes should be dipped in the mixture before cutting. A sack of potatoes can be lowered into the formalin, left for half an hour and then raised perpendicularly above the vat, permitting the sack to drain into the vat again. The recommended formula is 30 gallons of water to 10 ounces of formalin.

Advice to school children which is equally applicable to older amateur gardeners is given by Vane G. Gibson of O. A. C. Extension division, cooperating with the school district, after several inspections.
 "A noticeable feature," he says, "is the care in some cases, with the children have selected their places for the city gardens to give them the best exposure to sunlight, while in other cases little attention has been given to this important item. In one case a boy had selected a plot directly under a large fir tree and close to a high fence which would have shaded his garden the greater part of the time but after being told of the disadvantage he selected a much more open place out in the home garden.

Doubly Censored Letter Received After Five Months

After passing through the hands of both the German and American censors and taking five months in transit, a letter was received Monday evening by David Bottker, 116 East Washington street, from his father in Naestved, Denmark.
 The letter was mailed on December 8, left Copenhagen over the Scandinavian-American line December 10, and in the North sea was supposedly seized by the Germans. It was taken to Germany, then sent back to Denmark and started again on its way to America over the same line, but this time was held up by the English censor. It finally arrived in Portland wishing Mr. Bottker a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year and saying that business houses were all closed by 5 p. m. and that the inhabitants are receiving four pounds of sugar each per month.
