Recruiting in All Branches Is Rapid

Thirty Secured for Army This Morning and 12 Coming From Arlington; Additional Men to Arrive This Week.

Thirty recruits, the product of this morning's enlistment, were sent over to Vancouver at 2 o'clock this afternoon from the army recruiting station in the Worcester building. Twelve men from Arlington are expected shortly.

Judge Gantenbein Gives Up Duties on Bench to Report as Colonel at the Presidio.

Numbers of changes in the official family of District Attorney Walter H. Evans have resulted because of the answer to the call to the colors. Walter F. Geren, special agent, who will attend the officers' training camp at the Presidio, will be succeeded by Thomas Maguire, temporarily. Maguire, who is a first lieutenant in cavalry troop C of the Oregon National Guard, will hold the position only until he receives orders to take the field.

John Mowry, brother of Deputy District Attorney George Mowry, will become record clerk.

Colonel C. U. Gantenbein, who has been called to the officers' reserve corps for the western department, has relinquished his official duties as presiding judge of the circuit court of Multnomah county, and Monday he said his farewell to his associates on the bench and employees about the courthouse. Judge Gantenbein called attention to the large amount of work confronting the presiding judge and asked the lawyers to cooperate in every way in an effort to assist Judge J. P. Kavanaugh, Gantenbein's successor, in performing these duties. Judge Gantenbein expressed himself as having enjoyed the associations as presiding judge.

Judge H. H. Belt of Dallas has taken up the work as circuit judge made necessary by the changes. No successor has yet been named for the department of Judge Davis, who will leave Wednesday for the training camp. Judge Thomas Duffy of Prineville, Or., has assumed the duties in Judge Morrow's court temporarily, because of the illness of the latter.

SAW VISIONS OF MURDER

Keating and Flood Give Ride to Man Armed With Ugly Gun.

Visions of the Ristman jitney murder came before the eyes of Dan Flood and Larry Keating, local theatrical men, when they discovered that a stranger whom they had taken into their machine for a ride at the latter's request carried an ugly looking revolver. The man hailed the automobile at East Thirtieth and Hawthorne avenue about 8 o'clock in the evening.

"I want to go to Grand avenue quick," said the stranger, addressing the travelers in uncouth language. They told him to jump in. The car speeded up, and Flood, glancing behind him, saw the mysterious stranger in the act of breaking open the big gun. Keating's attention was called to the unpleasant sight. The machine was speeded up, and at Grand avenue the man left the car, explaining, as he put his gun in his pocket, that the "thing had failed to work the other night, when in a pinch."

AMONG APPLICANTS FOR ALCOHOL ARE Several Not Entitled to It.

An average of alcohol permits a month are being distributed to local drug stores, physicians, hospitals, manufacturing concerns and others entitled to them, according to Deputy District Attorney Hindman. The number of permits issued to importers is from 20 to 25. Five to 10 permits are issued for those who use wine for sacramental purposes.

Y. M. C. A. TEAMS ADD \$2332.50 TO FUND FOR SERVICE IN WAR

Total for Two-Day Campaign in Portland \$9464.45; Aim Is to Obtain \$25,000.

At the luncheon for teams engaged in raising Portland's share of the \$3,000,000 army Y. M. C. A. fund today, the captains reported pledges and cash, as a result of the work since Monday noon, amounting to \$2332.50. Practically all of this was raised today.

The total for the two days' campaign now amounts to \$9464.45. An endeavor is being made to raise \$25,000 in Portland before the end of the week.

Before the teams started on their morning canvass today, nearly \$1000 in mail and telegraphic pledges had been received, adding to the total of \$7131.95 secured in the first day's campaigning.

One of the largest individual pledges today came from T. B. Wilcox, who sent a check for \$500. Mayor H. R. Albion sent a check for \$25 and pledged \$2 a month for the period of the war.

Medford Sends \$426.85.

An encouraging telegram from Medford stated that the Baptist church, a small congregation of limited means, in the face of two other heavy financial demands recently made, at a meeting last night subscribed \$426.85.

H. W. Stone Directing Work.

President Wilson's executive order provided for the erection of Y. M. C. A. buildings on military reservations for the furnishing of heat and light for these buildings, and commanding officers were directed to provide proper facilities and the Y. M. C. A. work in every possible way, to police and protect the buildings, and to allow secretaries the privilege of purchase of supplies from the quartermaster's department.

Under this order, Y. M. C. A. organization made plans to raise \$3,000,000 to carry out the work. Two hundred standardized buildings will be erected at various military headquarters and concentration camps, including those in Europe.

To H. W. Stone was assigned the duty of raising \$120,000 in the four northwestern states, Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon. Oregon and Idaho, in a sub-district, is expected to give \$25,000. Mr. Stone hopes to raise the entire allotment within two weeks.

Umatilla County to Go Strong for Bonds

"A big affirmative vote in favor of the road bond issue will be cast in Umatilla county at the special election June 4," said M. M. Kyle, mayor of Stanfield, today.

"The people of my county are progressive. Crops were bountiful last year and the outlook is good for a bumper yield this season. Our people favor the road bond issue for the reason that they want roads which will enable them more readily to get their crops to market. Besides all this, they realize that the proposed issue does not mean any increase in taxes as the automobile owner pays in his increased license. If you will analyze this question you will find that the only thing to be decided is whether the motor license is to be applied to paying interest and principal on bonds or whether it is to be dribbled out in small amounts for construction."

"By a bond issue a large amount is made available and roads can be had in a short time. Otherwise we will not make any progress in years to come if we continue the policy of paying as we go. It is better to pay as we grow."

Mr. Kyle reports that in response to the appeal from the government authorities for increased crop production, the people of Umatilla county are planting potatoes and other food crops on land never before devoted to such crops.

Bonds Are Sold on Installment Plan

You can now buy your government "liberty loan" bond on the installment plan, just like purchasing a suit of clothes.

Anticipating that the government, to popularize the loan, will shortly announce the sale of bonds on the partial payment plan, the Lumbermens Trust company announced today that bonds are being sold with a small payment down and the balance in installments.

The actual bonds have not been received in Portland yet, and so-called "interim receipts" are being issued to those who wish to make investments. Interest of 2 1/2 per cent begins immediately on receipt of the money, even though the actual securities have not been delivered.

CITY COMMISSIONERS CONSIDER MEASURES TO GO ON JUNE BALLOT

Amidon and Shepherd Characters, Anti-Picketing, Telephone Interchange Go On.

2 ACTS ARE POSTPONED

One Refers to Street Repairs and the Other to Transfer of Money to Sinking Fund.

Measures to be voted on by the people at the city election in June were considered by the council today and will be formally placed on the ballot within a few days. The council also decided to have 10,000 copies of the ballot, when prepared, printed and placed at a number of central points throughout the city for distribution.

The measures decided upon by the council today to go on the ballot are: The Amidon and Shepherd anti-commissioners' charter. The council held that the ballot titles for both proposed charters should contain references to the fact that both abolished commission form of government.

A measure prohibiting picketing, banning and "trade wars" between the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co. and the Home Telephone Co.

A measure providing for all machines engaged in carrying passengers to give a bond of \$2500 to insure passengers against accident.

A measure providing for issuance of \$3,000,000 in bonds for the establishment of municipal grain elevators.

Four ordinances granting the Portland Trackless Car Co. franchises to operate jitneys through various districts of the city.

A charter amendment providing for a four-tenths of a mill tax levy for the purchase of land for parks and playgrounds and the establishment of a playground in Marquam's gulch, South Portland.

Two Other Measures Discussed.

A measure providing for a new method of extending streets. This measure is aimed to simplify the present charter procedure for street extensions.

A measure providing for the cost of sewers built within and without the city being paid for jointly by those within the city and those without.

A charter amendment providing for the elimination of grade crossings. This proposed amendment provides that the city's share of such projects shall not exceed 20 per cent and where the apportionment is in excess of \$20,000 the apportionment shall be voted on by the people.

Two other measures were discussed but no action was taken on them. One provides that the cost of repaving hard surface streets shall be assessed to abutting property owners and another is a charter amendment suggested by City Auditor Barbur to provide for the transfer of money from the city's sinking funds to improvement bond sinking funds that interest on improvement bonds may be paid when the bonds fall due. This money would be a loan and be returned with interest at the rate of 6 per cent a year.

Barbur's Amendment Discussed.

This proposed amendment was the subject of a long discussion today. Barbur explained that the city could save hundreds of thousands of dollars with the adoption of such an amendment, inasmuch as bonds could be redeemed as soon as the city had sufficient funds on hand, and that in some cases they could be redeemed a year after the bonds were issued.

Objection to the plan has been raised by banyas purchasing the bonds. They contended that improvement bonds

REED FACULTY WILL GIVE CREDIT TO ALL GOING TO PRESIDIO

Senior Ball Will Be Held Tonight and Students Rush Preparations for Event.

At a meeting of the Reed college faculty Monday, and decided to give the students who leave for the Presidio training camp full credit for the semester's work, based on their present standing in the college.

Usually it ends in the dreamy hours of the morning, but out of respect to Wednesday's classes the affair will end at 11:30.

Great Northern Will Take Men to S. F.

A large proportion of the passenger list of the steamer Great Northern on her trip from Flavel to San Francisco Thursday will be made of men from Portland and nearby cities who have been ordered to report for the reserve officers' training camp at the Presidio.

The voyage will mark the return of the Great Northern to the Columbia river run after being in the Honolulu service for the winter. Captain Ahman will be in command of the steamer.

Older Guardsmen Will Be Selected

Men from units of the Oregon National Guard who will be sent to the reserve officers' training camp at the Presidio, San Francisco, must be chosen from the older and more experienced non-commissioned officers, according to word received here today. Men up to 44 years of age will be accepted. In camp they will be used as assistant instructors and at the completion of the three months' training will be made captains where they display proficiency.
