

STEPS ARE TAKEN TO PUT DRAFT MEASURE INTO EFFECT AT ONCE

Ten Million Blanks for Registration Are Being Distributed by the Government.

Washington, May 12.—(U. P.)—The government today took its first preliminary step toward putting into effect the selective service system for raising an army of one million men.

The cards contain blanks for 14 questions—every detail the government wishes to know about its potential citizens.

Absent Must Query Cards. Men who are absent from their home states will be required to procure a card wherever they may be and mail it to the federal clerk.

According to estimates compiled by the bureau of census, New York city alone should register 27,700 men of between 21 and 30 years inclusive.

The figures given by the bureau are based on the average annual numerical increase in population for the different states and states since 1910, when the last accurate census was compiled.

New York state leads the country in available material for war, with approximately 1,968,000 men subject to selective service.

HOE PARADE TONIGHT STARTS FROM TENTH AND SALMON STREETS

Knights of the Hoe, Young and Old, Men and Women, to Parade Through Streets.

Portland's first "hoe parade," as a stimulus for the increased production of foodstuffs and the enrollment of agricultural workers, will be held tonight.

The parade is under the direction of Helen I. Tomlinson, assisted by Captain James P. Shaw as grand marshal, and General Charles F. Beebe. It will move promptly at 7:30 o'clock from Tenth and Salmon streets.

The band of the Oregon coast artillery corps will lead the procession, followed by the Girls' Honor Guard, with a military escort. School children will follow the Honor Guard, and then will come civic organizations and citizens.

The Honor Guard will be led by the Misses Baxter and Bingham. They will all wear arm bands and carry hoes or rakes.

Parade permits to be obtained at the high school food preparedness rally. N. F. Johnson will enroll recruits for summer agricultural work.

Long-expected orders to assume active duties at sea in command of the cruiser Buffalo were received Friday by Lieutenant Commander John H. Blackburn, U. S. N., Portland recruiting officer for the navy.

He will leave Portland about the middle of next week. The Buffalo, a 6,000-ton ship, carrying 10 guns, is reputed to be especially desirable for assignment to the navy.

Ensign J. P. Hart, U. S. N., retired, who was put on the active list upon the call to arms, and who has been on detail under Lieutenant Commander Blackburn, will succeed to the position of recruiting officer for this district.

NEW FREIGHT TARIFFS SUBMITTED AT SALEM BY SEVEN RAILROADS

They Carry 15 Per Cent Increase in All Intrastate Rates; Filing Is Refused.

Salem, Or., May 12.—Seven railroad companies Friday submitted to the public service commission new freight tariffs carrying a 15 per cent increase in all intrastate freight rates, but the commission has refused to file them.

The law provides that after the public service commission has fixed by formal order any freight rate it cannot be changed by the railroad company until the matter is presented to the commission in a formal application and a hearing is held and a new order is made by the commission.

Many of the intrastate freight rates have been fixed by the commission, so instead of filing the new tariffs the commission is sending notice to the carriers to comply with the law by making formal application to increase the commission-made rates.

When these applications are filed, explained Chairman Frank J. Miller, the commission will file the tariffs unless other rates which have not been fixed by the commission and will immediately suspend them and will then proceed to fix them at the same time the applications for increases on commission-made rates are heard.

The carriers asking for the 15 per cent increase are the Southern Pacific, Union Pacific, P. & S., Oregon Electric, United Railways, Pacific & Eastern and the Portland Railway, Light & Power company.

STRENGTH MAKING PATENT CAMP OUTFITS IN PORTLAND FACTORY

George Shatokin, Scion of a Russian Royal House, Opens Thriving New Industry.

George Shatokin, with his wife and child, lives at 1050 East Market street. Mr. Shatokin is descendant of Russian nobility, his forefathers being slave owners in the earlier days of this new republic.

Mr. Shatokin is known as a sort of modern Samson. Getting under an automobile set on saw horses with one or two men in it, he lifted it with apparent ease. Once upon a time he traveled from city to city and country to country, giving exhibitions of his strength.

Confined to Portland four years ago, Mr. and Mrs. Shatokin concluded to make this city their home and over on Madison street Mr. Shatokin conducts a factory in which he manufactures outfits for the wearing of a suit case 32x17x9 inches, and it comprises a folding table, two folding double seats with interior compartments in the table for food, bottles, dishes, towels, napkins, knives and forks. When set up for use the table stands 30 inches high and is 32x17 inches. It can be used for a sewing or card table in the home and an inset has a handsome checkboard on top.
