Washington, May 12 .- (U. P.) -The government today took its first preiminary step toward putting into effect the selective service system for raising an army of one million men. Certain of speedy action by congress on the army bill which came up for final debate in the house at 10:30, the war department began distribution of ten million registration blanks through which all males of the nation between the ages of 21 and 30, inclusive, will be card indexed. These blanks will be sent to sheriffs and mayors of hundreds of communities,

The cards contain blanks for 14 questions—every detail the government wishes to know about its potential soldiers—and a query whether exemption is claimed. Absent Must Mail Cards.

Men who are absent from their home states will be required to procure a card wherever he may be and mail it to the county clerk at his home. Distribution the process outlined above. of the cards is expected to be completed within a few days. According to estimates compiled by
