Wille and Borton Enable the Beavers to Come From Behind and Win Fourth.

PENNER IN TIGHT HOLES

Fifteen Hits Made Off Portland Pitcher, While Hogg Holds to Four Blows Until Final Frame.

After 12 innings of hard hitting, in which Pitcher Kenneth Penner was pulled out of innumerable holes by sharp fielding, the Beavers rolled up their fourth straight victory over Los Angeles. Bradley Hogg was the victim and Hogg pitched four-hit baseball until the final frame, when the Beavers came from behind and won out.

Los Angeles made nearly three times as many hits as the locals, blinding in every inning but the seventh. More hard hit balls were speared in the one game than in all the previous games of the series. Rodgers, Siglin, Borton, Davis, Ellis and Schultz figured in the fancy stuff.

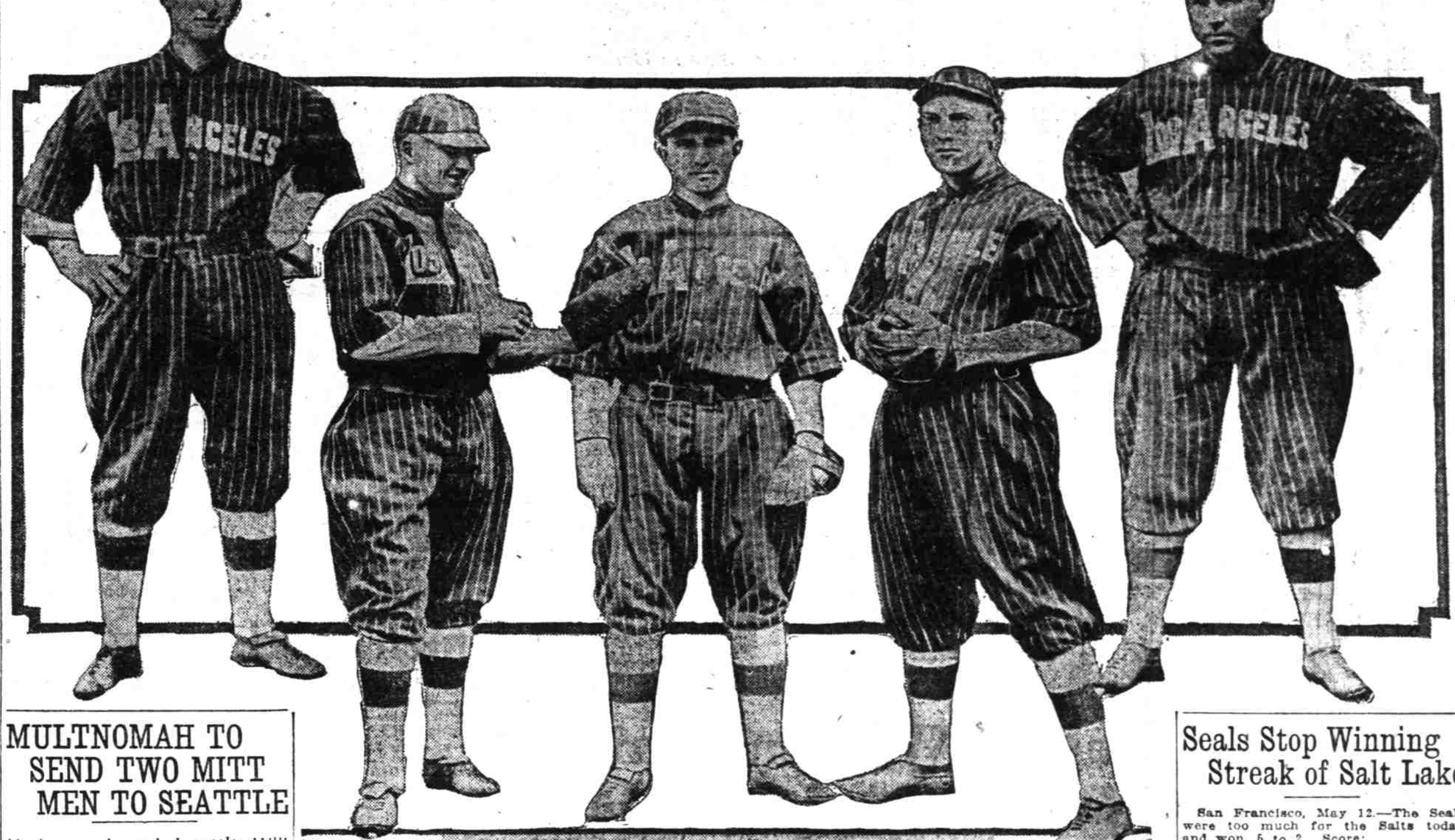
