

ALASKA'S SCENIC AND BIG INDUSTRIAL ATTRACTIONS FILMED

Pictures Are Taken by Rev.
George Lewis, Pastor High-
land Congregational Church

SOUVENIRS ARE OBTAINED

Motion Pictures Will Be Shown at
Portland for the Benefit of the
Y. M. C. A. Fund.

An adventuresome trip through
Alaska for the purpose of taking motion
pictures has just been concluded
by Rev. George Edward Lewis, pastor of
Highland Congregational church,
who reached Portland last week after
spending a number of months in the
far northland.

Mr. Lewis was accompanied by J.
S. Jones of Portland, and they re-
sided in filming many wonderful
scenes of wild and civilized parts of
the territory from the Alaskan penin-
sula to Ketchikan.

The travelers brought back with
them numerous souvenirs, and one of
the most valuable, a reindeer meat
block, used for two centuries by the
Eskimos at Leath, has been presented to
the municipal museum at the city
hall.

The object of the expedition, to
film Alaska as the territory now is,
was conscientiously carried out. The
pictures taken are of the railroads,
the steamships, the mines, mills, can-
neries, coal fields, oil wells, the farms,
dairies, churches, schools and cities,
together with "movies" of the dog
teams, the mountains, glaciers and
native life.

A motion picture company was
formed for the trip and the results
are to be exploited by Mr. Lewis
in a series of lectures throughout the
United States. In the near future
two exhibitions of the pictures will
be given in Portland for the benefit
of the army Y. M. C. A. fund.

During the trip, some extreme win-
ter weather was encountered. On one
occasion at St. Helena, according to Mr.
Lewis, the party was marooned for
nine days because the thermometer
stood at 76 degrees below zero and
made traveling out of the question.
Mr. Lewis says that Alaska is
rapidly filling up with all classes of
people and that every hotel and room-
ing house is packed with travelers.
The minister here and his church are
at Highland church and will prob-
ably remain in Portland the greater
part of the summer.

Gerard Day Will Be Celebrated in City

Annual Meeting of Pennsylvania So-
ciety Will Be Held at Noon, Saturday
Next, in Multnomah Hotel.

The annual meeting of the Pennsylv-
ania club will be held next Saturday
at noon at the Multnomah hotel. In-
stead of having the customary dinner
the meeting this year will be a lunch-
eon and it will also mark the anniver-
sary of the birth of Stephen Gerard,
who was one of Pennsylvania's great-
est philanthropists. While the college
founded and endowed under Gerard's
will is not widely known in the north-
west there are several graduates in
Oregon and one of these, D. Walter
Morton, dean of the School of Com-
merce of the University of Oregon,
will be the principal speaker.

Stephen Gerard was the richest man
in America when he died and he left
his vast fortune to endow Gerard col-
lege where orphan boys can live and
be educated. It is the richest en-
dowed college in Philadelphia and its
endowment showing a book value of
more than \$30,000,000, but an actual
value of more than \$50,000,000. It
outtranks the endowments of Harvard,
Yale, University of Chicago, the Car-
negie Institute and others many times.
Since its establishment it has edu-
cated 779 boys and at present there
are 1544 in the college.

In recognition of the celebration of
Gerard's anniversary in Portland next
Saturday, the board of directors of
city trusts of Philadelphia has issued
a booklet on Gerard college and its
founder and sent a supply of them to
Portland to be given those attending
the luncheon.

May 26 Will See Empire Day Doings

Although Empire Day is May 24, it
will be celebrated this year by the
British societies on May 25 in order
not to conflict with the lecture to be
delivered on the 25th by Ian Hay on
behalf of the American Red Cross.
Dan J. Maloney will make the prin-
cipal address, and P. Chappell Browne,
president of the British Benevolent
society, will preside.

Vocal numbers will be given by
George Wilbur Reed, R. Lovell Wil-
son, Madame Lucie Valair, and Mrs.
Jane Burns Albert. Miss Harper will
give a violin solo and Miss Laidlaw
will dance. Patriotic music of the
allied nations will be given by an
orchestra.

As has been the practice since the
beginning of the war, the net proceeds
of sale of seats will be given to the
British Red Cross.

May 17 to 19 Are Conference Dates

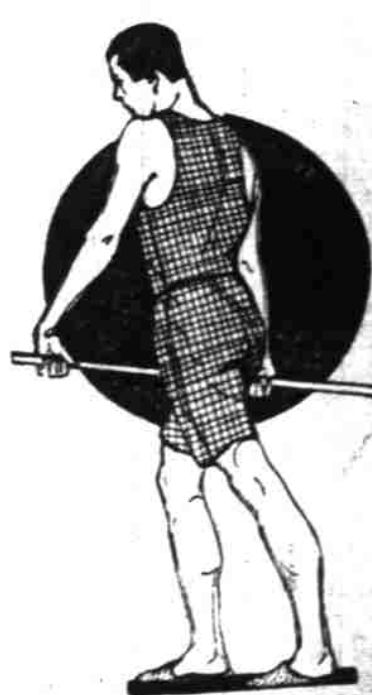
