

WASCO COUNTY WILL RAISE 'Y' WAR FUND IN RAPID CAMPAIGN

Committee to Solicit Money for Purpose of Aiding National Home Movement.

BIG RALLIES SCHEDULED

Each Community to Be Represented in General Organization to Promote Welfare of Soldiers in Service.

The Dalles, Or., May 14.—The committee appointed for Wasco county to raise this county's share of the \$2,000,000 to provide Y. M. C. A. units for the troops in camp or at the front, has gone vigorously to work. The state committee has asked for \$100 for each 1000 of population in the county. The Wasco committee has added another feature by which the county of Wasco will raise an additional amount, which, after the apportioned \$1000 has been sent to Portland, will be kept in the county.

The secretary of the Y. M. C. A. at the front or in camps will be requested to forward any information of special need on the part of any Wasco county soldier, and the county committee will have the funds in hand to respond instantly, that any boy from this county may have the best care possible.

A few days ago members of the committee, accompanied by other citizens, including militia officers who are stationed here, attended rallies at Dufur and Mosier. At both places the people were out to learn what "the people at home can do to help the boys at the front." As soon as the purpose of the Y. M. C. A. was explained, each community selected a committee of five and went to work to get the cash.

At Dufur the Dalles committee was told "there will probably be only five out; the notice was short and the men are busy." This was the feeling at all the places. But the Dufur school band came out, and the Dalles people had to hastily rearrange the remarks they had prepared to make to a small committee to suit an audience that looked like at least half the population of Dufur. Dufur has raised over \$900 to date.

The local committees visited and organized finance collection committees at Tygh Valley, Wamic, Wapinitia, Maupin, Antelope and Shaniko. The Dalles has subscribed several hundred dollars and the committee is working to bring this amount up to the \$1000 mark.

Boy Becomes Navy Cadet.

The Dalles, Or., May 14.—Aided Bayley, son of Mrs. and Mr. F. W. Bayley, has been informed he passed entrance examinations to the United States naval academy at Annapolis. Young Bayley, who enlisted in the naval training corps a year ago, has been stationed at a Colorado training station. He will leave at once for Annapolis.

Dalles Policeman Shot Three Times

Drunken Man Fires Five Times at Charles McLane; Wounds Will Not Prove Fatal; Assaultant Has Record.

The Dalles, Or., May 14.—"Watch me get him," said Alec Dalrymple to a friend after calling him from the street to the entrance of the Crescent rooming house at 11 o'clock Saturday night. Dalrymple then stepped on the sidewalk and fired five shots in rapid succession at Charles McLane, night policeman. Three shots caused wounds about the legs of the officer. He is in a hospital and will recover.

Dalrymple, who was intoxicated, is in jail.

Dalrymple was convicted in the Wasco county circuit court, November 19, 1908, on a charge of manslaughter. Following an argument at a local shooting gallery with Lee Putnam of Klickitat county, Washington, on June 12, 1908, Dalrymple knocked Putnam down in the street; a dog barked at Putnam's heels as he got to his feet; he turned around to

kick the dog; as he did so Dalrymple, who had picked up a rock, threw it at his opponent and hit him in the neck, which was broken, causing almost instant death. Dalrymple was sentenced to a year in the penitentiary, but was pardoned before he commenced serving time.

Wilson Jr., field artillery of the regular army; James Wilson, troop A, First cavalry; Joseph R. Wilson, candidate for officers' reserve corps.

Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the interior—Franklin K. Lane Jr., army aviator.

Josephus Daniels, secretary of the navy—Josephus Daniels Jr., training for the marine corps.

David Franklin Houston, secretary of agriculture—David Franklin Houston Jr., about to enlist in the navy.

William C. Redfield, secretary of commerce—Humphrey Redfield, enrolled naval reserve as member mosquito fleet.


