Gibbons Says Darcy Badly Persecuted

Los Angeles, May 25.—(U. P.)—Mike Gibbons, who became middleweight champion of the world when Les Darcy died yesterday, bitterly scored here today what he called the "unfair persecution" accorded Darcy by officials who refused to allow him to box in America.

Gibbons, with his brother Tom and Eddie Kane, his manager, is here on a pleasure tour. "I am sorry to gain the middleweight championship by the death of Darcy," said Mike. "But I am more sorry for the unfortunate Darcy, whose life was made miserable by petty persecutions from the time of his arrival in America."

"I have never heard anything which has made me feel so badly," continued Rickard. "Darcy was young, ambitious and trusting. He was only a boy, though he was of age, and it was shameful the way he was treated in this country."

"Les got into the wrong company over here, and was badly advised. Had it not been for that I believe he would still be alive and happy today. He was honest in his effort to provide for his mother and father and to help his large family. He never got a chance."

"As a boxer I have never seen Darcy's equal. He was great in every respect, a champion from head to toes, and in his death the boxing game has lost one of the greatest and most likeable boys who ever drew on a pair of gloves."

Rickard, together with other promoters who made offers to Darcy, was instrumental in bringing him to this country. But Darcy crept from the protection of Rickard's wing, which, had he accepted, would probably have brought him both the fame and fortune which he sought.

"I ask every man here," he said, "to stand with his hat off for a minute, in remembrance of the boy who came to us and never was given a chance. I believe everyone here will understand me when I say 'God rest the memory of Les Darcy, martyr pugilist.' Every man in the crowded hall stood silently."
