

OPENING OF COLLEGE DELAYED THAT PUPILS MAY WORK IN FIELDS

O. A. C. Board of Regents Decides That School Will Not Begin Until October 8.

TEACHERS' PAY IS RAISED

Great Demand for Trained Men Makes Increase Necessary to Mold Varsity Instructors.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, May 28.—To permit students to remain in the fields to harvest crops, the board of regents has decided to postpone the opening of college next fall to October 8.

The meeting of the board of regents was attended by President Weatherford, Governor Withycombe and Regents Pierce, Waldo, Hawley, Von der Heiden, Spence, Myers, Moore and Woodcock.

Because of inability to secure a contract for fuel oil, it was found necessary to reconvert the heating plant into a coal burner at a cost of more than \$8000.

President Kerr announced that within the last year 66 members of the faculty had withdrawn. Dean Parks and Messrs. Peaslee, Goodspeed, Chamberlain, Yeager and May have received officers' commissions and are now at the front.

Building Will Be Rushed. Because of the need of the conservation of all food materials, it was decided that the long contemplated by-products building should be rushed to completion and put into use for instruction in caring for surplus fruits and vegetables.

Captain Apperson Is Honored. The board took official recognition of the death of Captain Apperson, who for 32 years was a member and in recognition of his service and of his gift to the student loan fund, ordered that an oil painting of him be hung in the new library.

Many Evaporators Needed for Apples

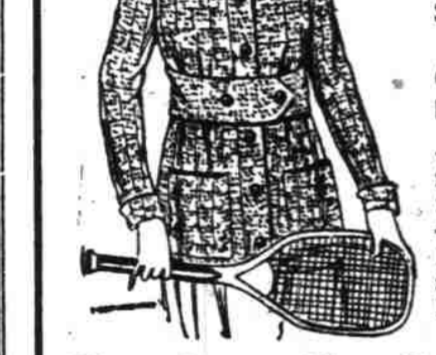
