

ART AND STATUE FOR LATE DAVID CAMPBELL STIR COUNCIL SESSION

Over Objection of Art Commission, Council Decides to Build Memorial.

BIGELOW SO PROPOSES

Architect Doyle Objects to Locating Campbell Statue at Washington and Nineteenth Streets.

Art was the big subject of discussion at today's session of the city council, and for a time it nearly upset the equilibrium of that body. The discussion ended, however, with art receiving a knockout.

It all arose over the proposed erection of a memorial statue of the late "Fire Chief" David Campbell. Commissioner Bigelow, a trustee of the David Campbell memorial fund, introduced an ordinance permitting the trustees to erect the statue on city owned property at Nineteenth, Alder and Washington streets.

Why an Art Commission?

"Has the location been approved by the art commission appointed by the council?" asked Commissioner Dieck. "Unless we are to have the commission approve statues and locations, we'd better repeal the ordinance creating the board," replied Bigelow.

"The board of trustees is asking for this location for the statue, and I don't think we should have to get the approval of the art commission," replied Bigelow, heatedly.

"That's the purpose of the commission, however," said Dieck. "A. G. Long, also a trustee of the fund, called up Architect Doyle, who is a member of the art commission, to get his advice. Long told me that Doyle said Campbell was not a big enough man to have a statue erected there in his memory. If that's the kind of an art commission we've got, I'm with you in abolishing it," was Bigelow's rejoinder.

Council Picks Own Location

"Well, the location of the proposed statue is a matter of opinion," said Dieck. "and I think it should be approved by the art commission."

The majority of the council decided it was up to the council to fix the location, so it gave first and second readings to the ordinance.

Commissioner Bigelow explained that the trustees of the fund were to raise funds for the erection of the memorial and that on June 25 were to present fifteen medals for conspicuous bravery.

COURT TO DECIDE PAY ISSUE

County and City Agree \$3 Is Sufficient for Election Officials.

The state supreme court will be asked to settle any dispute made by judges and clerks for double pay in the joint city and special state election, according to an understanding reached by city and county officials. The county is to issue the warrants for the pay of the judges and clerks at the rate of \$3 a day and the city will later reimburse the county for its share.

Some of the election officials have contended that they should receive \$4 for their work, \$3 from the county and \$3 from the city. County and city officials have agreed that the question of double pay, should it arise, be presented to the supreme court.

City to Buy Water System

The city is to purchase the water system in Overlook established originally by the Overlook Land company. Commissioner Daly had the purchase plan before the council today and it was agreed that the property owners in the district are to receive their pro rata share of the money paid for the system. The system will cost approximately \$9000.

France Wants Only Peace for All People

Premier Ribot Tells Socialists Government Cannot Recognize One Party Efforts—Passports Promised Later.

Paris, June 1.—(U. P.)—France insists that there shall be no peace except that which all her people shall make; the government cannot recognize efforts of any single political party to arrange such a termination of the war.

Premier Ribot so declared in the chamber of deputies today, answering Socialist interpellations as to the government's attitude on the international Socialist "peace" conference at Stockholm.

"France wants only a French peace," he declared. "A conference such as that proposed at Stockholm, which might result in a partial—limping—peace, cannot be undertaken."

"When talk regarding this conference is quieted the government will deliver passports to Socialists to permit them to go to Petrograd. There they will not risk meeting Germans."

British Deputation to Go

London, June 1.—(U. P.)—Leaders of the British Labor party decided today to send a deputation to Petrograd to confer with Russian Socialists, this committee to stop at Stockholm en route for possible consultation with other Socialists called upon by the Russians to attend an international peace conference.

Fraternal Societies Listed for Parade

The following fraternal organizations will take part in the patriotic parade Saturday night: Woodmen of the World, Women of Woodcraft, Knights and Ladies of Seaside, United Artisans, Maccabees, Loyal Order of Moose. The automobiles will be appropriately decorated, and the parade will be led by an auto bearing H. B. Hudson, supreme master of the L. O. M., and the grand marshal, William Reid. The firemen's band will head the procession.

All who can take part with automobiles are asked to assemble before 8 p. m. at W. O. W. temple, 128 Eleventh street, where the procession will start.

America's Part in War, Essay Themes

The war, and particularly America's part in it, will be the theme of essays and orations in schools and colleges throughout the country in graduation exercises. Recently Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the interior, presented a list of topics from which subjects could be selected, and following these suggestions the League to Enforce Peace has prepared material on three subjects: "League to Enforce Peace," "Preparation for Peace at Close of the War," and "International League of Peace."

William D. Wheelwright, chairman of the Oregon branch of the league, says that such material will be mailed to students upon request by the national headquarters of the league, at 70 Fifth avenue, New York.

Britain Has Enough Food for 12 Weeks

London, June 1.—(U. P.)—"The May shipping losses were the lightest so far in the submarine war, due to the fact that the British are destroying more submarines than ever before," Kennedy Jones, food director, declared today.

"However," he added, "the Germans are meeting this with a similarly increased output of U-boats."

"England has a reserve supply of cereals sufficient for 12 weeks, but it is uncertain whether this will be maintained until the harvest time. If it falls below seven weeks' supply, food rationing will result."

Bank Organizer Dies

Chicago, June 1.—(U. P.)—John Clark Black, 80 years old, one of the organizers and former president of the Consumers' and Commercial National bank, died today. His widow survives.

MARBLE FIRM WANTS CHANCE TO BID UPON VISTA HOUSE WORK

N. A. Schanen Promises Estimate Will Not Exceed \$9000 for Crown Point Job

FORMER BIDS REJECTED

County Officials Notify City That It Must Provide for Safeguards on Burnside Bridge.

The county commissioners received a communication this morning from the N. A. Schanen Marble Works, in which it states that, if new bids are advertised for the marble necessary for the completion of the superstructure of the Vista House at Crown Point, they will undertake to make an estimate which will not be in excess of \$9000. A duly certified check for this amount drawn payable to the county was enclosed with the letter as an evidence of their good faith.

Former bids made to the commissioners for this work, all of which were above \$15,000, were rejected at that time because of the excessive cost.

The question of the ownership of the Burnside bridge, brought up, due to the necessity of having some repairs made on the building and it was decided to make a thorough search of the records to ascertain whether it belongs to the county or the state.

A notice is being sent by the county officials to the city instructing the latter to take notice of the fact that the supervision of traffic over bridges in the city rests entirely in their hands and that therefore in the case of the Burnside bridge it is up to them to regulate the amount passing over it so as not to render it unsafe.

Temporary support for the span deck was ordered by Bridge Engineer Purcell and a complete report on the entire structure is to be secured at the earliest possible moment.

FATHER GETS SON BACK

Boy of 15 Taken From Custody of Mother and Stepmother.

On complaints that life for 15-year-old Harvey Boylan with his stepfather, Otis Cole, was a series of hardships, Probate Judge Taswell today gave the lad into the custody of his father, C. W. Boylan, until a further investigation of the case.

When a divorce was granted to Mrs. C. W. Boylan in 1911, the minor child was given to the care of his mother, who shortly thereafter married Otis Cole.

According to the story told by the boy and supported by affidavits from C. B. Hill, his uncle on his mother's side, and Clara Batdorf, his mother's sister, his life has been a series of cruelties.

TIMBERMAN IS FINED \$10

Appeal Will Be Taken in Case of Alleged Reckless Driving.

H. M. Hack, a timberman, who appeared before Judge Stevenson March 1 on a speeding charge, requested the judge to fine him \$25 that he might appeal to the higher court, according to the story told by Patrolman Ervin in Circuit Judge Bingham's court yesterday.

Ervin arrested Hack for traveling 35 miles an hour, and says the prisoner promised "to get the case into the upper court, where he would teach the officer a few things about the law."

Judge Bingham upheld the conviction of the lower court, but reduced the fine to \$10.

Divorce Granted Mrs. Babbidge

Mrs. Mary A. Babbidge was granted a divorce from Wilbur W. Babbidge Thursday by Presiding Judge Kavanaugh. The case was not contested.

Davis Murphy filed suit for divorce, alleging that Elizabeth Murphy wielded a butcher knife in a threatening manner. They were married in Chicago in 1914. Others seeking separation are: Mabel Amacher from John Amacher, desertion and cruelty; Roy Smith from Ida Smith, desertion; Myrtle Gates from Ernest Gates, desertion.

\$53,000 Raised for Y. M. C. A. in Army

Oregon and Idaho Expected to Contribute \$50,000 Toward \$2,000,000 Fund—\$18,000 Given by Portland.

Fifty-three thousand dollars have been raised of the \$50,000 which is Oregon and Idaho's share of the national \$2,000,000 fund for work of the Y. M. C. A. in the army and navy training camps.

Insurance Company Loses

A federal grand jury in the case of W. F. Todd against the Alliance Insurance company, Thursday found a verdict for \$1800 for the plaintiff. The suit was started for recovery of insurance money on some farm buildings near Dilley, Or., which burned a year ago. The defendant company, a Philadelphia concern, contended that suspicious irregularities existed in transactions concerning the property and in the manner in which the buildings were consumed.

Workings of Navy To Be Demonstrated

The people of Oregon are to be given some first hand demonstrations of the workings of their navy. Dr. E. K. Scott of the United States naval medical reserve corps has been assigned to conduct two educational tours. The first will include a lecture by a naval officer, illustrated with moving pictures with moving pictures and a second will include street demonstrations of submarine torpedo attack.

Ernest Hart of the navy lectured this morning at Lincoln high school and at Washington high school this afternoon and was announced for a lecture at Jefferson high school Monday morning at 10:30 o'clock. Among the towns in the state to be visited are: Hillsboro June 4, Forest Grove June 6 and 7, McMinnville June 7 and 8 and Sheridan June 9. The torpedo demonstrations will take place one week later at each of the towns mentioned.

Adventist Meeting Chooses Officers

Election of officers of the western Oregon conference of the Seventh Day Adventists took place this morning at the camp meeting grounds at Creston station.

H. W. Cottrell was elected president; H. G. Thurston of Salem, vice president and secretary; and C. E. Clout, treasurer. The executive board are: H. W. Cottrell, H. G. Thurston, P. C. Hayward, B. J. Cady, W. C. Emerson, J. H. Hanna, and W. H. Anderson.

Tonight Pastor W. H. Anderson, who occupies the most advanced position in central Africa of any missionary, will preach in the main pavilion. A telegram from Arthur G. Daniels, president of the world conference, says he will arrive in Portland Wednesday.

Federal Car Driver Fined for Speeding

Garnett Hyde, a driver of a United States mail automobile, was fined \$10 in municipal court this morning on a charge of speeding. Hyde is also wanted by the secretary of state on charges of sending worthless checks for auto licenses. Hyde was arrested Sunday night by Motorcycle Patrolman Ervin for speeding. Hyde said he was on duty and going to the Sellwood station. Ervin followed him and saw him fill the car with young women and drive to Crystal lake. Hyde told many conflicting stories in court this morning that the heavy sentence was imposed.

Business Men's Club Opposed to Merger

Strong protest against the proposed Pacific coast steamship merger was voiced by the Progressive Business Men's club Thursday in resolutions adopted at the club luncheon in the Multnomah hotel. Will H. Daly, candidate for mayor, and G. T. Dik, A. L. Barbur, W. L. Brewster and K. K. Kubli, candidates for commissionerships, were speakers. R. P. Hutton, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league for Oregon, who has been assigned to the prohibition campaign in Wisconsin, delivered a farewell message. He will leave tonight. C. A. Miller spoke in behalf of the Liberty bond issue, and Frank Branch Riley in behalf of the \$6,000,000 road bond issue.

Troop B of Oregon Cavalry Nearly Full
