

COMMITTEE CHANGES TO OCCUR AS RESULT OF SEN. LANE'S DEATH

McNary to Be at Bottom of
Committees to Which He
Will Be Appointed.

MAJORITY CUT, 12 TO 10

Chairmanship of Fisheries Body at
Stake as Result of Vacancy—Op-
portunity for Change

Washington, June 1.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—Senator Lane's death produces the first vacancy in the United States senate of the Sixty-fifth congress, which convened March 4. The appointment of Judge Charles L. McNary, a Republican, successor by the governor of Oregon reduces the Democratic majority from 12 to 10, the party standing becoming 53 Democrats and 42 Republicans.

The new senator will go to the bottom of the committees on which he is appointed, and will not necessarily be appointed to the same committees on which Senator Lane served. There will no doubt be some shifting around, partly to accommodate the new member, and partly because senators who are dissatisfied with present assignments will welcome the opportunity to make exchanges.

No Chairmanship for McNary.
Senator Lane held the chairmanship of the committee on fisheries, and by virtue of this became entitled to an extra clerk. Senators without chairmanships have a secretary and one clerk, while chairmen have at least one extra clerk. The new Oregon senator, being the baby in service and a member of the minority, will of course, have no chairmanship.

While the senate is composed largely of elderly men, and several of its members are at any given date sure to be infirm, the death rate is little higher than that of the house, where the average age is many years younger. Half a dozen senators can be named who have recently been frequently detained by illness, but all of them survived Senator Lane, whose decline was not noted until last March.

House Has Lost Three Members.
On the house side three vacancies have been created by death in the present congress. Conroy of New York, a man of large frame and previous good health, passed away suddenly. Sullivan of New Hampshire, one of the old members, contracted a cold in a vacation day, and succumbed soon afterward. Comstock of Indiana died only a few days before Senator Lane passed away.

The mortality among members of congress is high. Many of them are hard workers and compelled to keep late hours. The Washington climate does not favor the man who is overworked, nervous, and run-down. It drags heavily upon his vitality, and Senator Lane made the common mistake of remaining here for several weeks after the ending of his strength had given warning.

Yamhill Oil Supply Suggested.
Washington, June 1.—Dr. E. E. Goucher, of McMinnville, Or., has written to Senator Chamberlain suggesting that this may be a good time for the government to make investigations toward the discovery of oil in Yamhill county and the northern part of Polk county, where numbers of competent geologists have from time to time reported that an oil supply may underlie the country.

The letter of Dr. Goucher has been and the use of natural gas by Mr. Higgins for lighting and fuel, six miles south of the Amy well, indicates the field extends in that direction. It is suggested that an oil geologist should be sent to this vicinity to report to the government the value of the vast value which an oil strike would confer on the government in the northwest, supplying fuel for naval bases and transportation uses.

The letter of Dr. Goucher has been referred from Senator Chamberlain's office to the geological survey for its attention.

New Grain Bulletin Issued.
Washington, June 1.—"Grain for the Dry Lands of Central Oregon" is the title of a new farmers' bulletin, No. 500, issued by the department of agriculture. The author is L. B. Brecht, superintendent of the Harney branch experiment station at Burns, Or. It has chapters on equipment, rotation of crops, preparing land, good seed and suitable grains.

**Railroads Not Aiding
In Drawing Tourists**

Unless the railroads of the northwest show a disposition to continue the work of the Northwest Tourist association, the \$45,000 voted by the Oregon legislature for aiding in this work will be turned back to the state treasurer untouched.

This move was talked of at a meeting at the Imperial hotel Thursday, attended by L. M. Howell, secretary of state of Washington; A. E. Todd, mayor of Victoria and president of the tourist association; J. C. Ainsworth, J. P. Jaeger, Mark Woodruff, W. J. Hoffmann and Phil Metcalf Jr.

Unit to Commence**

Recruiting for an additional unit of the Oregon Naval militia has been authorized under orders from the navy department, and Robert N. Munly has been empowered by Adjutant General White to take charge of the recruiting for this new branch of the militia. He has opened offices at 108 Fifth street for accepting enlistments.

Burnside Bridge Is In Need of Repairs

Highway Bridge Engineer Makes Report and Commissioner Holman Notifies Foreman to Take Safeguards.
On the basis of a report made by C. H. Purcell, state highway bridge engineer, Chairman Holman of the board of county commissioners has authorized Foreman Forbush of the Burnside street bridge to take the necessary steps to safeguard it in the way of traffic regulation and repairs. He has also notified the city authorities of the condition of the bridge as disclosed in the report of Engineer Purcell.

Purcell reported that upon examina-

tion of the bridge he found the steel supports or girders, particularly along the west end of the east approach, have crystallized and rusted and are incapable of sustaining a heavy weight.

Two years ago an examination of the bridge was made by the firm of Harrington, Howard & Ash, who also called attention to the impaired condition of the bridge, saying while it was not unsafe its days were numbered. While the bridge is maintained and operated by the county it belongs to the city.

Grazing Rights Maintained
Stockgrowers having national forest grazing preferences will be entitled, if they enlist in the army or navy, to keep them without use of the ranges during their enlistment, accord-

ing to replies of the forest service to inquiries from the National Wool-growers' association. Statements should be filed to take advantage of the privilege. Temporary permits for the duration of the permanent permittee's absence only will be issued so that the land will be kept in use.

Eugene Willis, clerk of the juvenile court, has received a telegram announcing that his brother, Major Percy Willis, U. S. A., now stationed in the Philippines, had passed his examination for lieutenant colonel in the regular army.

Marine Corps Age Requirement Raised

Applicants Must Be at Least 20 Years Old; Recruiting Drive to Commence on June 10.
The great number of volunteers for the marine corps has enabled the service to tighten up requirements to higher standards. The age limit has been raised from 17 years to 20, according to instructions received Wednesday by First Sergeant Potter, who is in charge of the recruiting station. Stricter examinations are also enjoined.

A big recruiting drive, to be country-wide, will start June 10 for the

week following, to gather in 4000 new soldiers of the sea.
