WILSON BUYS \$10,000 LIBERTY LOAN SHARE; SORRY IT'S NOT MORE

Bank of Montreal Buys Up
\$1,000,000 Bonds; C. P. R.
Also Takes Large Amount.

Washington, June 1.—(I. N. S.)—President Wilson Thursday night bought a \$10,000 Liberty bond, in sending his subscription personally to the secretary of the treasury he declared he regretted it could not be a larger sum. The president's letter to Mr. McAdoo said:

"May I not send you personally my subscription to the Liberty loan, which I make with great satisfaction and with the wish that it might be a great deal larger."

The Bank of Montreal's subscription of \$1,000,000 to the Liberty loan was announced also by Secretary McAdoo tonight. The letter sent by Frederick Taylor, general manager of the bank, read:

"The subscription of the Bank of Montreal of \$1,000,000 to the Liberty loan means that Canada and the United States, side by side, face the common enemy. It is therefore fitting that the premier bank of the dominion contribute to the success of the Liberty loan, which is the first great blow

struck by the United States in the world war.

I do not hesitate to say there is no better security in the universe than the Liberty loan."

The Canadian Pacific railway was a large subscriber but the amount was not disclosed.

Secretary of the Navy Daniels addressed a personal memorandum to the 124,634 men and women who make up the military and civil strength of the United States navy, including all officials and employees calling upon them to get behind the Liberty loan.

Alaskan Complaint Dismissed by I. C. C.
Washington, June 1.—(I. N. S.)—Complaints that steamboat and railroad transportation rates through the territory of Alaska are "unjust, unreasonable and discriminatory in that large shippers were favored" were dismissed by the interstate commerce commission Thursday.

The commission found that special contracts entered into by the carriers with large mining and cannery interests were discriminatory, but this practice was discontinued nearly eight months ago.

Alcohol "Ads" Are Barred
Washington, June 1.—(I. N. S.)—Papers carrying advertisements of grain alcohol, irrespective of the purpose for which such alcohol is to be used, will be barred from the mails when addressed to states in which it will be unlawful on and after July 1 to publish liquor advertisements, the postoffice department announced Thursday. The department holds that grain alcohol is an intoxicating liquor.

Bankers of Yakima Plan to Sell Bonds

Banks of Four Counties Included in
Organization Which Will Boost for
Liberty Loan and Make Canvass.

North Yakima, Wash., June 1.—Bankers from Tappanish, Ellensburg, Mabton, Sunnyside, Zillah, Granger and Wapato, responding to the call of the Yakima Clearing House association, met here and formed an organization to promote subscriptions for Liberty loan bonds. All banks in Kittitas, Yakima, Benton and Klickitat counties will be included in the organization. It was decided that North Yakima, being central should be made the headquarters for the association and North

Squirrel Causes Damage
Klamath Falls, Or., June 1.—A squirrel hole in the bank of the main canal of the United States reclamation project here is believed to have been the cause of a serious washout eight miles south, last night. While the damage to the land is not extensive, the bank of the canal is badly torn and its repairing will be a matter of a week or 10 days. Meantime the water, which has just been turned on for the first irrigation, must again be shut off.

Indian Can Go Upon Place Only to Farm

North Yakima, Wash., June 1.—The need for agricultural preparedness has caused the modification of a court injunction restraining William Hoptowit, an Indian, from going on the farm where his wife lives. Mrs. Hoptowit is seeking a divorce and secured the injunction for personal protection. The court modifies the original order allowing the defendant to go on the farm for the purpose of caring for the crops but not for any other purpose. In making a plea for a modification of the order it was shown that the crops on the farm would go to waste unless such an arrangement could be made.

Would Increase Tax On Tea and Coffee

Washington, June 1.—(I. N. S.)—The senate finance committee Thursday decided to recommend increasing the excise tax on coffee to two cents per pound and on tea to five cents per pound. It is estimated that the coffee tax will yield \$18,000,000 and the tea tax \$3,000,000 annually.

Found Liquor on Steamer
South Bend, Wash., June 1.—A raid by Sheriff Will Turner of Pacific county at Raymond, netted the authorities 40 big sacks of perfectly good whiskey. The raid was made on the steamer Santa Barbara, a lumber vessel plying between this harbor and California. There not being enough safes in Raymond in which to store the booze for safe keeping, the sheriff locked the whole "shipment" in the town jail. No owner claimed the liquor, several arrests will be made tomorrow, including the captain of the vessel and the steward.
