June 3 Has Been Designated "Prison Sunday" by Proclamation of the Governor.

BISHOP SUMNER APPEALS

People of Oregon Asked to Support \$400,000 Appropriation for New State Prison.

Sunday, June 3, has been designated as "Prison Sunday" by proclamation of Governor Withycombe, and on that day ministers throughout the state will discuss the conditions existing at the Oregon state penitentlary and call attention to that measure on the state ballot providing an appropriation of \$400,000 for the construction of a new penitentiary.

Bishop W. T. Sumner has sent strong letter to the clergy and laity of the Episcopal church of Oregon urging that they cooperate in the effort to secure the enactment of the

proposed law. Present Conditions a Disgrace "In all our social efforts the most glaring failure has been our attempts long the lines of prison reform. Bishop Sumner says in his letter. is a crying disgrace to civilization that we have herded men under abconditions-they themselves normal abnormal-expecting to make of them normal citizens.

"For nearly 10 years I held services in the county jail and Bridewell in Chicago every week, and I know the distressing conditions and inefficiency -indeed, the moral and physical de struction which the whole present system now breeds.

"Oregon should certainly have a new penitentiary with modern equipment at the earliest possible moment, whatever the cost. Humanity demands it: morality is crying for it, and the best served by it."


Prison Reform Sought






