

CONGRESS EXPECTED TO VOTE SUBMARINE BASE FOR COLUMBIA

Whether Action Will Be Taken
at Present Session Still in
Doubt, However.

SITE IS NOT DECIDED ON

Navy Department Officials Indicate
That They Will Prevent Extortion-
ate Price for Property.

Washington, June 6.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—A submarine base is coming to the mouth of the Columbia river just as Senator Chamberlain in the last congress contended it would have to come after investigation by an authorized commission of experts, who would report upon the advisability and necessity of the location.

No doubt the recommendation of the Heim commission will be followed by congress substantially as it has been made. Congress will provide \$1,200,000 for acquisition of site and development if it follows the Heim report, and it is interesting to note that this is the exact sum fixed for this purpose in the amendment offered by the late Senator Lane in the last congress, which the senate conference had to yield after the senate had agreed to it.

Action May Be Postponed
It is not yet clear whether the appropriation will be made at the present session of congress or be allowed to go over until the regular session in December. New work of this sort would naturally fall into the regular naval appropriation bill at the regular session, but it may be put forward as an emergency matter, along with the other recommendations for submarine and aviation stations on the Pacific coast.

The report of the Heim board places three submarine bases in the northwest, on the Columbia river, at the Puget sound navy yard and at Ediz Hook, opposite Port Angeles, Wash. The latter is of minor importance, for use as an operating base. The others are "home bases," where submarines will be permanently stationed, and the ground fully equipped for supplies and repairs.

Base for 12 Divers, Plan

At the Columbia river, it is proposed to have accommodations for 12 submarines, and without proportionate increase of the expense, that many more can be cared for. While some portion of the appropriation is expected to be expended for aviation, that is a secondary expense.

The sum recommended for the Puget sound submarine base is \$1,425,000, with \$375,000 additional for an aviation station. For the operating base for both submarine and aviation purposes at Ediz Hook the total sum asked is only \$300,000.

The navy department is committed to no particular site for the Columbia river base.

Price Must Be Reasonable

Local interests have indicated that they will prevent extortionate prices being asked, and the department serves its choice until prices are fully developed. The report suggests merely "such site as may be recommended as most suitable by the (Heim) commission and approved by the secretary of the navy and the president."

The land wanted for the main Pacific coast aviation station at San Diego is held at \$4,000,000, which is considered an extravagant price, and the commission has recommended that the secretary of the navy be authorized to procure the tract by condemnation.

Trade Discrimination Denied

Washington, June 5.—Brigadier General Shunk of the quartermaster general's office, commenting on criticisms made by the Portland Chamber of Commerce concerning alleged discrimination against Portland in computing the cost of sending a transport to Portland for supplies as compared with Seattle, has repeated assurances previously given Senator Chamberlain that there is no intent to discriminate in any way.

General Shunk first points out that contracts for oats for the Philippines and Hawaii have been awarded to Portland bidders and says:

Sailing Time Important

"There is no intention on the part of this department to discriminate against the Port of Portland in any way. At this particular time it is necessary for the department to utilize vessels to the fullest extent and make shipments from ports requiring the least possible sailing time."

"At the present time it is impossible to state whether or not the Dix or some other transport will be sent to Portland to make shipments of oats to the Philippines and Hawaii during the next fiscal year."

Allowance of two and one half days for steaming time for the Dix in reaching Portland over Seattle, says General Shunk, is based on previous trips and is "not believed excessive." The Portland chamber contends this time should be cut in half.

An estimate of \$500 for pilotage and towage is defended as a fair allowance, as delivery at ship's side would not dispense with the necessity of docking to take on supplies for a long trip. The Portland chamber asserts this should be eliminated, as any such charges would be willingly absorbed by Portland people.

North Bend Youth Will Serve in War

North Bend, Or., June 6.—Freemont Hodson, another North Bend boy, will leave today to join the army. Hodson attended the University of Oregon last year and won a scholarship and was elected manager of one of the fraternity houses. He will go to Eugene and secure his release from the university and then go to Portland to join the medical corps, having taken a course in chemistry at the college. He has a brother who has enlisted. His mother is a widow and she has secured a position in the local hospital while her two sons are at war.

Hanging May Keep Chinese From Draft

San Francisco, June 6.—(U. P.)—Wong Hing, 25 years old, registered Tuesday and claimed exemption from draft on the grounds that he will be dead before he can become a soldier. Wong is under sentence of death for the murder of Ng You, a Chinese undertaker, during a long war.
