Dr. S. Bishop of Forest Grove
Elected President of Medi-
cal Society.

EPILEPSY IS DISCUSSED

Acting Health Officer Is Indorsed;
Osteopathy Is Discussed by Dele-
gates at Afternoon Session.

The Oregon Homeopathic Medical society opened its forty-first annual convention and election of officers this morning at 10:30 with representatives from various branches throughout the state and a few from Wash- ington. Dr. John Benson, second vice president, presided in the absence of Dr. P. L. McKenlie, whose illness prevented his attendance. Dr. J. S. Bishop of Forest Grove was elected president; Dr. D. O. Webster, vice president; Dr. F. F. Fel- lows, secretary; Dr. L. N. Palmer, treasurer; Dr. Arthur L. Canfield, Dr. John Benson and Dr. H. S. Nichols, board of censors, all Portland men except Dr. Bishop.

Following the business meeting let- ters were read from absent members, and sympathy extended to the president, Dr. P. L. McKenlie, in his illness.

One Woman Physician Present
Dr. Ella K. Dearborn, the only woman physician present, read a paper on epilepsy, covering the history of many cases, methods of relief, but stating the apparent inability of the medical fraternity to do more than re- lieve this most intractable malady, that is alike the curse of the genius and the imbecile. Dr. E. Weldon Young of Seattle, Dr. A. S. Nichols, Dr. Ar- thur Canfield and Dr. John Benson taking part in the discussion that fol- lowed.

Dr. H. S. Nichols gave a talk on the "Mechanics of Mountain Climbing of Interest to Physicians," which embod- ied only points of benefit to the pa- tients of physicians but to the medical man himself, and closed with the ad- vice to abstain from tobacco for a couple of days before the heart-tax- ing effort of an unusual climb.

Dr. Able Is Indorsed
The society went on record as in- dorsing Dr. John Able, acting health officer to succeed himself and after adjournment for lunch the convention reopened at 2 o'clock with Dr. Edward Shoor of Hubbard on the program for a paper on "The Failure Is Not in Osteopathy, but in You," with discus- sion by Dr. A. W. Vincent of Portland; Dr. S. R. Vincent of Sherwood, Or., spoke on "Specific Medicine," with dis- cussion by Dr. John Benson, and Dr. Arthur Canfield spoke on "Surgical Diseases of the Liver," with discus- sion by Dr. J. S. Bishop of Forest Grove.

Those taking part in the morning session were Dr. Weldon F. Young of Seattle, Dr. Herbert S. Nichols, Dr. D. O. Webster, Dr. David Brainer, Dr. I. N. Palmer, Dr. F. F. Fellows, Dr. Arthur L. Canfield and Dr. J. S. Bishop.

Thursday, Dr. James W. Ward of San Francisco, Dr. W. A. Dewey of Ann Arbor Mich., and Dr. C. E. Sawyer of Marion, Ohio, will appear on the program. The convention will close tomorrow with a trip up the Columbia highway at 6:30 p. m.

Marshal Lists Aides For Service in State

Special Deputies Named to Register
Aliens in Cities Where Armories Are
Located—Rush Here Continues.

United States Marshal John Montag has made the following appointments for special deputies to take applica- tions of enemy aliens for permission to remain within the restricted half mile limits around armories:

Blaine McCord, attorney at law Woodburn; Max Gelhar, district at- torney, Salem; L. L. Ray, district at- torney, Eugene; George Quine, sheriff, Roseburg; Gale S. Hill, district at- torney, Albany; E. J. Kaiser, lawyer, Ashland; Adna King, attorney, Cot- tage Grove; Henry Crenshaw, Tillamook; A. J. Derby, district attorney, Hood River; John P. Hall, district at- torney, Marshfield.

The order prohibiting enemy aliens from approaching armories without a permit is, of course, the same as the order concerning the Portland armory, with the exception that applicants have un- til June 15 in which to apply for the permit. June 9 is the date set in Portland, after which enemy aliens must be able to produce their permits if found within one half mile of the armory or the Clackamas military camp.

The greatest rush of work in the marshal's office in issuing permits has already been accomplished. Enemy aliens are still coming in daily, in steady streams, however, to be ex- amined as to their fitness in being al- lowed to come within the restricted area.

OFFICIAL OF ELECTION WHO LOST JOB FILES SUIT AGAINST COUNTY

William F. Harris Demands
Pay for Service Which Was
Declined on Election Day.

SUIT BASIS FOR A TEST

All Election Board Members Removed
by Elimination May Have
Similar Claims.

William F. Harris, 44 East Seventh street, filed a written protest with the county commissioners this morning against his removal from the board of election officials of precinct 162 of which he was a duly appointed mem- ber. He demands pay for the services which he claims he offered election day but which were declined.

This will be the test case selected by the city and county officials to de- termine in the courts the legality or illegality of the consolidation of the two boards of election officials pro- vided for under the new election law. All those members of the boards, who were removed by elimination in the consolidation of the two boards and who reported for duty on Monday, June 4, will have a claim for services against the county as the case may be but will have to wait until the supreme court has passed on the matter before their claims can be ad- justed.

"No Peace Without Victory," France

Premier Ribot Insists That Alsace-
Lorraine Must Be Returned—Repa-
ration Wanted, Too.

Paris, June 6.—(U. P.)—Announc- ing France is in entire accord with the United States, Premier Ribot this afternoon declared to a special sitting of the senate that there "can be no peace without victory."

"It is necessary to speak clearly," the premier asserted. "We are in accord with the United States. Alsace-Lorraine must be returned. No Frenchman dares say there can be peace until that is accomplished. We do not want indemnities, but reparation for damages."

"We are morally backed by the world in this demand."

"It is necessary also that there be guarantees for the future. The best solution would be for Europe to be so constituted that all nations might be masters of their own destinies."

Ribot's speech was made at a special meeting of the senate, called at the government's request in response to Ribot's statement that he wished to explain France's position as soon as possible.

The senate is expected to ratify the war aims announced by the premier.

Livestock Bank Opens for Business

Deposits By Woon Reach Total of
\$200,000 in Kenton Institution—Con-
gratulations Come From Many.

Under particularly auspicious cir- cumstances, the Livestock State bank opened for business in the adminis- tration building of the Portland Union Stockyards at Kenton at 10 o'clock today.

By noon the bank had secured more than \$200,000 in deposits, while the officials received numerous messages of congratulation from many sources, and a number of handsome floral gifts were made.

The deposits were made on balances placed by country banks, the North Portland commission houses and a number of livestock men in various parts of the northwest.

The handsome quarters of the bank were inspected during the day by many visitors.
The bank officers are W. T. Dickey, president; C. C. Colt, vice president; T. J. Mahoney, cashier, and Carlton B. Swift, assistant cashier. These offi- cers, with Elliott R. Corbett of the First National bank, constitute the board of directors. E. F. Sims, formerly deputy state bank examiner, is paying teller.

President Opposes Relaxing Labor Law

Washington, June 6.—(U. N. S.)— President Wilson sees no reason for relaxing state labor laws, for the period of the war. In a letter ad- dressed to Governor Brumbaugh of Pennsylvania the president said:

"I think it would be most unfor- tune for any of the states to relax the laws by which safeguards have been thrown about labor. I feel that there is no necessity for such action and that it would lead to a slackening of the energy of the nation rather than to an increase of it, besides being very unfair to the laboring people them- selves."

St. Helens Man Is Dead by Own Hand

St. Helens, Or., June 6.—John W. Boyd committed suicide some time Monday night by shooting himself with a rifle in the head. The body was found by a neighbor. Boyd was 55 years old, and a rancher. He left a note directing that his money, \$104, and his farm be given to his son, Guy Boyd, who lives at St. Johns.
Boyd had taken off one shoe, after preparing to shoot himself, and had pulled the trigger with his toes.

Judge Dimick Is Live Wire Chief

Oregon City, June 6.—Because busi- ness affairs prevented him from tak- ing an active part, John W. Loder de- clined the election of Main Wire of the Live Wire of Oregon City, and Judge Grant B. Dimick has been elected in his stead. Thomas A. Burke, deputy district attorney, has been chosen as Seed Wire. Yesterday's luncheon hour was given over to talks by E. R. Brown, a former newspaper man of Oregon City, who has been in Califor- nia for over a year, and F. A. Olmsted of Portland, also formerly a resident here.

Columbia University Students Graduated

Annual Commencement Held and Di-
plomas Are Presented to 85; Services
Are Patriotic in Nature.

Twenty-six graduates were awarded diplomas at Columbia university yes- terday at the commencement exercises. The exercises partook of a patriotic nature, the local school song, "Colum- bia," and the "Star Spangled Banner" each being sung with enthusiasm. The closing address by Archbishop Christie was also filled with the same spirit as well as with wise helpfulness and advice. The class poem was given by Milton Daly of Ketchikan, Alaska, and the valedictory by W. Allen Casey, Portland; Rev. Francis Black, a graduate of the school nine years ago, delivered the charge to the graduates.

The contest for the Christie gold medal, presented by Rev. Alexander Christie to the student having the best record in the high school department of the university, was won by George Royer, St. Johns, with a record of 87.24 per cent. James Powers was second.

Joseph V. Springer of Portland was the recipient of the Daly gold medal for the best record in the English es- say class.

Louis J. Hylton Was Old Resident

Oregon City, June 6.—In the passing at Mullino yesterday of Louis Jackson Hylton, the state of Oregon loses a long time resident and one who though born in the north served on the side of the south in the Civil war. Mr. Hylton, who was 81 years of age, was visiting his daughter, Mrs. Laura Hendricks at Mullino, when he died. He was born in Vermont. He served four years in the Confederate army.

Coming to Oregon 25 years ago, Mr. Hylton made his home at Twilight for 14 years. He is survived by his widow, who lives with the daughter at Mullino; three sons, Louis J. Hylton of Oregon City, James Hylton, Twilight; Dennis Hylton, Mullino; three daughters, Mrs. Anna Earl, Albany; Mrs. S. B. Strong, Eugene, and Mrs. Hendricks, Mullino.

The funeral is being held from the Holman undertaking parlors in this city this afternoon, conducted by Rev. W. T. Milliken of the Baptist church, interment following in Mount View cemetery.

Henry Ford Takes \$5,000,000 of Loan

Factories Will Help Win War Just as
Surely as Men on Firing Line, He
Tells Luncheon Guests.

Detroit, Mich., June 6.—(U. P.)— Henry Ford, ex-pacifist, today sub- scribed \$5,000,000 to the government's Liberty loan. The announcement was made today at a luncheon of the De- troit Liberty loan committee.

Earlier in the day Ford had out- lined his ideas on the problems of the war.

"Our country is at war," Ford said. "All else must be forgotten. To end the terrible struggle, we must win. The war doesn't mean that the wheels of industry will stop, even slow up. The factories will win for us as surely as will the men on the firing line."

Vancouver, Wash., June 6.—News of the death of J. B. Emery at El Paso, Texas on May 8, was received here yesterday. Emery was a govern- ment clerk here, and was transferred to the Presidio, Cal., about six years ago. His wife died about five years ago and since that time his daughters, Beulah and Izora, have lived with J. B. Emery's sister at Rochester, N. Y. Mr. Emery had just returned from visiting his daughters, and had been home only a few days. It is not known here what caused his death.

STATE LAND BOARD'S LOANS NOT AFFECTED BY LIEN EXEMPTION

Supreme Court Hands Down
Opinion in Case of Land
Board vs. Lee.

OTHER OPINIONS TODAY

Judge Knowles Reversed in Case of
Camp Carson Mining & Power Co.
vs. Miles Stephenson et al.

Salem, Or., June 6.—Chapter 304, laws of 1913, which provides that mortgages on real property shall not be a lien upon such property after the expiration of 10 years from the date of maturity, does not apply to loans made by the state land board from the irrevocable school fund, according to an opinion handed down by the su- preme court today in the case of the State Land Board vs. Mary E. Osborn Lee et al.

The defendants borrowed from the school fund in 1902 and paid the in- terest each year until 1912, when they sought to have payment of the note on the grounds that the act of 1913 barred foreclosure of the mortgage. The case was tried before Circuit Judge Knowles of Union county, who gave the state land board judgment for the amount of the note, but re- fused foreclosure of the mortgage.

The supreme court modified the cir- cuit court opinion by allowing in addi- tion to the money judgment, a fore- closure of the mortgage.

FIRST OREGON UNIT OF ENGINEERS GOING INTO SERVICE ON THURSDAY

Detachment of 50 Men Will
Leave for American Lake
Under Command of Young

OTHER COMPANIES WAIT

Camp With All Equipment Has Al-
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Oregon's first unit in the Eighth Regiment Engineers, being mobilized for immediate duty in France, will go into service Thursday morning, when a detachment of 50 men, under com- mand of Captain Harold W. Young, will leave Portland to report at Ameri- can Lake.

Within the next few days the re- mainder of the companies being or- ganized in Portland, with Captain Kenneth Hausor, will receive orders for mobilization at the American Lake camp.

Sergeant McMicken in Charge
The detachment which will leave over the O-W. R. & N. company in- cludes men experienced in the differ- ent branches of railroad construction work, and will be under direct charge of First Sergeant D. E. McMicken, and Sergeants K. C. Roberts and John Herley.

The company organized by Captain Hausor has been designated D, with Captain Young's company as E.

The organization of company B takes as its officers four well known Portland men: Captain Young, as- sistant engineer of the O-W. R. & N.; First Lieutenant T. W. Seal, division engineer of the O-W. R. & N.; First Lieutenant C. K. Smith, bridge en- gineer of S. P. & S.; and Second Lieut- enant Preston Dalano, general man- ager of the California & Oregon Coast railroad at Grants Pass.

Camp All Completed.
Captain Young returned this morn- ing from a visit to American Lake, and reports as ideal in location the camp of the Eighth Regiment Engineers. The camp is established, with the mess houses complete. The hospital is also established, with doctors in attend- ance. A company of 150 from San Francisco is already in camp actively engaged in drilling, while the quar- termaster's department is bustling in the preparation of outfitting and equipping the new regiment.

There are still a few vacancies in the ranks of the Portland companies for experienced bridge carpenters and track laborers. The recruiting offices for the companies are in the Multi- nomah hotel building at the corner of Fourth and Pine streets.

Colonel Sidney Gauntlett will con- duct a united Salvation meeting at Salvation Army headquarters, 243 Ash street, Thursday at 8 p. m. All the city corps will be invited.

Colonel Gauntlett recently arrived in the United States from Europe, having had charge of the Army's work in Switzerland. He is now appointed territorial secretary for the western states under Commissioner Thomas Estell. This is the colonel's first visit to Portland. He will be ac- cepted by Lieutenant Colonel Scott from Seattle.

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
