

WHEN WILL WEALTHY MEN BUY THEIR SHARE OF LIBERTY BONDS?

Only Eight Days Are Left in Which Subscriptions May Be Made to Big Loans.

PORTLAND SALES LAGGING

Bankers Point Out That More Than Score of Citizens Could Buy \$100,000 Blocks.

Speakers Boost Liberty Loan. With the last speakers in the city volunteering their services for the noon meetings of the Liberty loan campaign, being held at the Hippodrome theatre, the crowd should be much larger than the one that attended today's meeting. Not more than 100 people gathered to hear Bishop Walter T. Sumner, one of Portland's most eloquent and forceful speakers.

The noon day meetings being held in other cities of the coast, San Francisco and Seattle, are receiving great notice from the public, and there is no reason why Portland people should not turn out. The regimental band of the Third Oregon contributed its services at today's meeting.

Rev. E. H. Pence, pastor of Westminster Presbyterian church, will address the meeting at noon Thursday and the Liberty loan committee hopes to see Portland people manifest their patriotism to the extent of filling the theatre. The meetings are at 12:15 p. m. each day.

With just eight days left in which subscriptions to the Liberty loan can be made, members of the Oregon campaign committee are wondering when the big subscriptions are going to be made.

To date there has not been a single Portland subscription of \$100,000 or the part of an individual, although one or two banks have subscribed to that sum through conversion of short term treasury certificates.

Furthermore, no local corporation, outside of the banks, has made a subscription of \$100,000.

Many Big Sales Possible. Portland has at least 35 people who could easily make subscriptions of \$100,000, said one of the bankers of the Liberty loan committee today.

"By easy, I mean they could make the subscription without the slightest inconvenience. A number of these could subscribe higher than that. But what are they doing? Regarding the loan as a mere formal display of patriotism, they are making subscriptions of \$1000, \$500 or \$10,000, all ridiculously small sums. There are a number of corporations that can and probably will make very large subscriptions. The banks simply cannot take the major portion of this loan.

Total to Date \$3,571,550. "These folks are waiting perhaps for some one to start the ball rolling with a big subscription and I know of one large sum that should be coming in this week. There is no reason why a million dollars in large subscriptions should not be made this week, and we have to get that much in either large or small subscriptions if we expect to secure anywhere near our required quota."

The total Liberty loan subscription in Oregon today reached \$3,571,550. The increase all over the state was \$3,150, the small amount being largely due to the fact that the banks were closed for two days on account of elections and the war commencing.

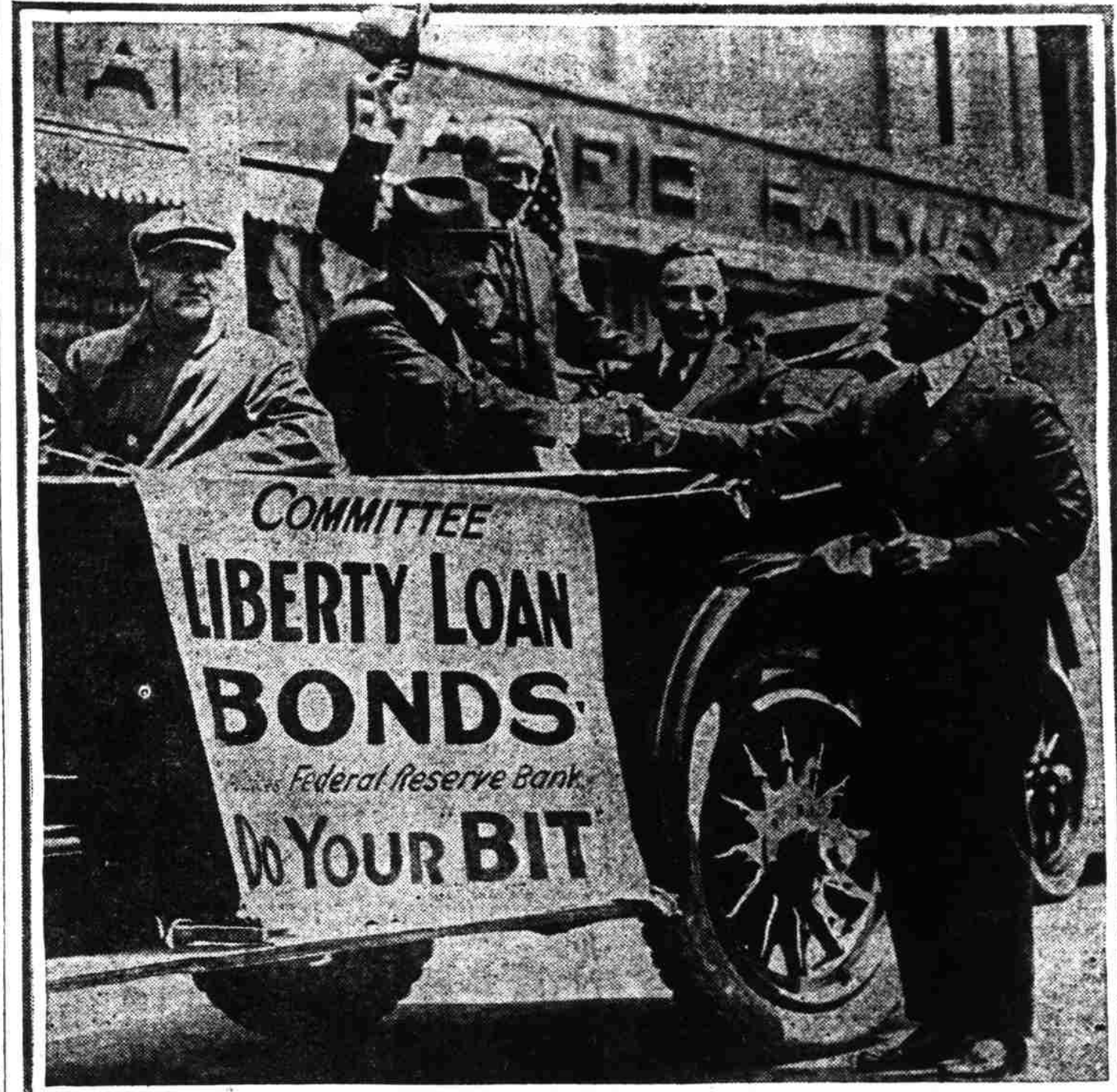
Telephone Employees Subscribe. Exceptionally good work was accomplished by the employees of the telephone company, who canvassed the city yesterday. They actually secured over 100 subscriptions, taking in the cash for all of them, the total amounting to \$21,500. These subscriptions came largely from business men and in addition to the signatures secured by the solicitors, at least 100 more subscribers pledged themselves. The agent secured 13 subscriptions from the 11 men on whom he called.

David M. Dunne and A. J. Bale, manager of the Pacific Coast Biscuit company, spoke to employees of the Home Telephone company this morning and secured 20 subscriptions, amounting to \$1850. The company men are also addressing the employees of Mr. Bale's company today.

Hint Given Business Men. C. C. Close, assistant secretary of the Lumbermen's Trust company, spoke to 35 employees of the Overland automobile branch Tuesday evening and secured 18 subscriptions, totalling \$1500.

"Why don't the business men keep these Liberty loan advertisements in their windows until after the campaign closes, June 15," asked William M. Ladd, chairman of the publicity committee this morning. "If an ad in behalf of the United States government is worth anything at this

time, it is worth remaining on display until June 15."

Speaking along the same lines, another member of the campaign committee asked why business men were not mentioning the Liberty loan in their advertisements, and pointed to the fact that the merchants in nearly every other city of the state are mentioning the bond issue in connection with their store news displays.

Other Meetings Held. Meetings were held today for employees of Marshall, Wells & Co., the Portland Lumber company and the East Side Business Men's club. Another meeting for employees of Twoby Bros. will be held at the shops in Montavilla Thursday.

Boosters in Sherman County. Eastern Oregon is now entertaining a delegation of Portland Liberty loan campaigners who are boosting to strengthen the state's quota of \$2,500,000. An automobile load, consisting of Frank A. Freeman, vice president of the Lumbermen's Trust company; H. H. Cloutier, manager of the Multnomah hotel; C. C. Chapman, editor of the Oregon Voter, and Mark Woodruff Tuesday afternoon and spoke the same night at The Dalles. They are traveling in a big machine, which with its driver was donated by the Multnomah hotel. These men will be out until the campaign closes June 15. This afternoon the men are at Wasco and tonight at Moro, where Ladew Barsum is chairman of the campaign committee. They will hold meetings at Madras at noon Thursday and at Redmond the same night.

Portland Boy Scouts next week turn their hand to Liberty loan campaigning. Some 30,000 copies of posters, pamphlets and blanks were received by J. E. Brockway, state commissioner, Tuesday. The Scouts will place hand-somely lithographed posters in the homes where Liberty bonds have been purchased.

Three Chinese Are Held for Murders

Suey Fong, Yee Guk and Low Ju Are Believed to Have Been Responsible for Deaths in Tong War Saturday.

A formal charge of murder in the second degree was this morning placed against Suey Fong, Yee Guk and Low Ju, alleged participants in the tong shooting of last Saturday when two Chinese were killed and six persons were injured.

Suey Fong and Yee Guk were arrested during the shooting and Low Ju was arrested later on information given by Louis Him, one of the injured Chinese, that he was a gunman. Low Ju was arrested in Salem by Deputy District Attorney Ryan and detectives when a band of gunmen arrived in that city from San Francisco bound for Portland. He was later released for lack of evidence. This arrest was made in February.

Boy Is Arrested on A Charge of Theft

Youth Taken Into Custody in Connection With Disappearance of Talking Machines and Records.

After systematically stealing records and talking machines for a period of three months, a 16-year-old boy employed at the Hyatt Talking Machine company, was arrested last night by Police Sergeant Harvey Thatcher and Detective Moloney.

Among the articles stolen are a \$150 Edison machine, six \$25 machines, a Victrola, a typewriter and several hundred records that he sold at various places along First and Front streets. The boy was first noticed by Sergeant Thatcher when he was trading in 40 records for some slides. He was watched and his recurring trips to the district with talking machines and records led to his arrest. He was turned over to the juvenile court.

Washington Goes Dry at Midnight

Tacoma, Wash., June 6.—(U. P.)—The bone dry law passed by the 1917 legislature will take effect at midnight. Citizens who sent away for their last orders for liquor under the permit system must obtain the shipment before tonight or have it shipped back to the liquor houses from which it was ordered or it will be seized by the police.

The prosecuting attorneys and sheriffs will take no official heed of the referendum unless so instructed by Attorney General Tanner. The secretary of state is allowed 30 days after the filing of the petitions in which to check the signatures.

Whether the required number of signatures has been obtained will not be known for some days.

HOOD RIVER IS FIRST TO REPORT LISTING IN MILITARY SCHEME

Sheriff Johnson Sends Word at 2:10; Polk, Josephine and Washington Follow.

Men May Still Register. Adjutant General George A. White this afternoon received a telegram from Provost Marshal General Crowder instructing him to allow unregistered men of the conscription age to register until further notice, provided they had reasonably good excuses for failure to register on census day. Unregistered men may still obtain their green cards by applying to the registration boards of their home districts. The new order is subject to annulment at any time.

Hood River, Polk and Washington counties led the state in completing registration and reporting results to the adjutant general's office. Sheriff Thomas F. Johnson of Hood River county announced his registration returns in a telegram at 2:10 o'clock this morning, and his official returns were received in the early morning mail.

Sheriff Orr of Polk county and Sheriff Lewis of Josephine county also telegraphed through the night.

Hood River county registered 502 white citizens, 93 alien and three alien enemies between the ages of 21 and 30. Of the 502 white citizens 302 were registered in the exemption columns, as legislative, judicial or executive officers, persons totally disabled, having dependent relatives and engaged in exemption occupations. Those registering free from exemption numbered 200.

Age Data Are Given. In the Hood River registration the age of 30 showed the largest percentage, 73 of this age appearing on the rolls. Age 28 followed in number, with 58. Age 21 had the smallest percentage with 37.

Polk county registered 1097 white citizens, 665 under exemption columns and 432 with cards indicating no exemption. The rolls showed 72 alien and 7 alien enemies.

Registration in Josephine county brought out 580 white and 1 colored citizens, 4 alien and 3 alien enemies.

Under exemption 367 were registered and 213 free.

After a continuous night of checking and tabulating Sheriff Applegate of Washington county telegraphed his results to the adjutant general this morning. Registration at that point was heavy, showing a total of 1882, divided into 1765 white citizens and 117 aliens. The exempted classes showed 1057 and free 708.

No Anti-Conscription Feeling. Returns on the war census day registration made at the registration headquarters in the courthouse show that the total number of males between 21 and 31 will run fully 10 per cent more than had been estimated. Some precincts, especially those that have a transient population, ran over the expectations by as much as 100 per cent.

The striking features of the day were the total absence in nearly every case of anything that looked like anti-conscription feeling. Sections of the city where the foreign population is in the majority proved their patriotism as well as did the others.

Foreign birth or foreign blood played no part in keeping its subjects from the polls. Russians, Germans, Japanese, Greeks and a dozen other nationalities are represented on the lists containing the men of our future army and instances of claims for exemption among this element are rare.

Few Claimed Exemption. In precinct 70 of district No. 8, located in the northeast part of the city, 150 Russians appeared of the required age and with the exception of a few, who gave families as a reason no other claim for exemption was recorded.

Two thirds of the 268 cards from the 28th precinct of the First district belong to Japanese, most of whom were not born in this country.

The registration of a large Finnish precinct in South Portland showed a large number of parents in the old country that were dependent but otherwise held no claims for exemption.

Mrs. A. Bernore, 146 East Twentieth street, a native born German, voluntarily offered a hall free of charge for a registering place in her precinct.

Many other Americans of German extraction proved their patriotism to this country by offering their services and in many cases the use of their machines to assist in the work of the day.

One Unpleasant Incident. One unpleasant incident occurred in precinct 128 of the Sixth district, located near Twoby Brothers' shops.

Mrs. Jessie M. Cadarette reported Claud Harn Huffin, 185 East Sixty-ninth street north, for abusing the women officials and making seditious remarks. Huffin according to his card is a natural born citizen of this country but according to Mrs. Cadarette he said that he was a German, that his people were German and that if any fighting had to be done he would fight for Germany. He walked out of the registering place without signing his card.

The report on the whole county shows that very few of the registering

officials made any claim of payment for their services. Joe Millington, 570 Sumner street, was removed from his place as one of the officials and replaced by Charles D. Ray, because he insisted that he wanted pay if he worked. According to Chairman C. M. Stafford of the eighth district, Millington, who was serving on the board in the two hundred and seventy-fourth precinct, made the statement that President Wilson got paid for working for the country and so would he.

Chairman W. F. Woodward of district 7 reported that he had only one precinct out of 38 in which pay was asked and that was made by Oscar R. Moeller, 500 East Forty-fourth street north, who said he was a German and wanted to be paid.

Scattering reports were received from outsiders of about a dozen men who are suspected of being slackers. Four of these came from one precinct, No. 237. These are all being investigated by United States Attorney Clarence Reames.

Numerous instances occurred of men

both over and under the age required, insisting that they be registered for the draft.

Musical Association Files. Salem, Or., June 6.—(P. N. S.)—Musical Festival association today filed articles of incorporation with the corporation commission. W. F. Woodward is president, William A. Montgomery is vice president and N. G. Pike is treasurer. Purpose is stated to be to develop music and appreciation of music in the northwest.

Los Angeles Cleans Out Council. Los Angeles, June 6.—(P. N.
