

JOINT HEARINGS TO BE HELD FOR FIXING OF GRAIN STANDARDS

Plan Is to Make Specifications Uniform Throughout Northwest.

Salem, Or., June 6.—The Public Service commissions of Oregon and Washington will hold four joint hearings before prescribing rules and regulations for standardization of grain and hay, according to announcement made today by Frank J. Miller, chairman of the Oregon commission.

These hearings will be held as follows: Portland, Monday, June 18; Tacoma, Tuesday, June 19; Spokane, Wednesday, June 20; Pendleton, Thursday, June 21.

Will Fix Standards
As the grain bureau in Oregon and Washington will operate under very similar laws, the two commissions have agreed to fix the same standards for grain in the two states, to issue exactly the same rules and regulations, and charge the same fees where fees are to be charged.

Grain standards and rules and regulations for handling grain and hay will be established in this state under the provisions of chapter 333, laws of 1917.

All Will Be Uniform
"By Oregon and Washington adopting the same standards and the same rules," said Commissioner Miller, "it will mean that the standards will be uniform over the entire northwest. Idaho and Montana have no grain bureau, and the bulk of the grain from those states will move through Portland, or Seattle or Tacoma, and hence will come under the same standardization."

All persons interested will be urged to attend the hearings. The Oregon commission is also cooperating with the Oregon Agricultural college in working out rules and standards.

Klamath Responds To Cross Appeal

Parade, Followed by Big Mass Meeting, Marks Opening of Campaign for Funds in Southern Oregon Town.

Klamath Falls, Or., June 6.—Formal opening of the Red Cross drive here Monday was featured by a parade, followed by a mass meeting at the opera house. Several stirring appeals to this cause were made at the mass meeting. Details of the work were explained and the call for it emphasized in so thorough a manner that a large number took out memberships at the close of the meeting.

A joint entertainment by the Red Cross society and the Women's Relief corps is scheduled for tomorrow night. A house to house campaign for membership to the former organization is being arranged and will be started within the next few days.

Indians Will Help

Klamath Falls, Or., June 6.—Evidence of an liberal cooperation of the Indians of the Klamath reservation in the subscription of the Liberty loan bonds is brought in by Edward B. Ashurst, district chairman for that section. Ashurst, who plans to make a thorough campaign of the reservation, declares that the Indians are enthusiastic regarding the movement, and that a substantial sum is sure to be subscribed.

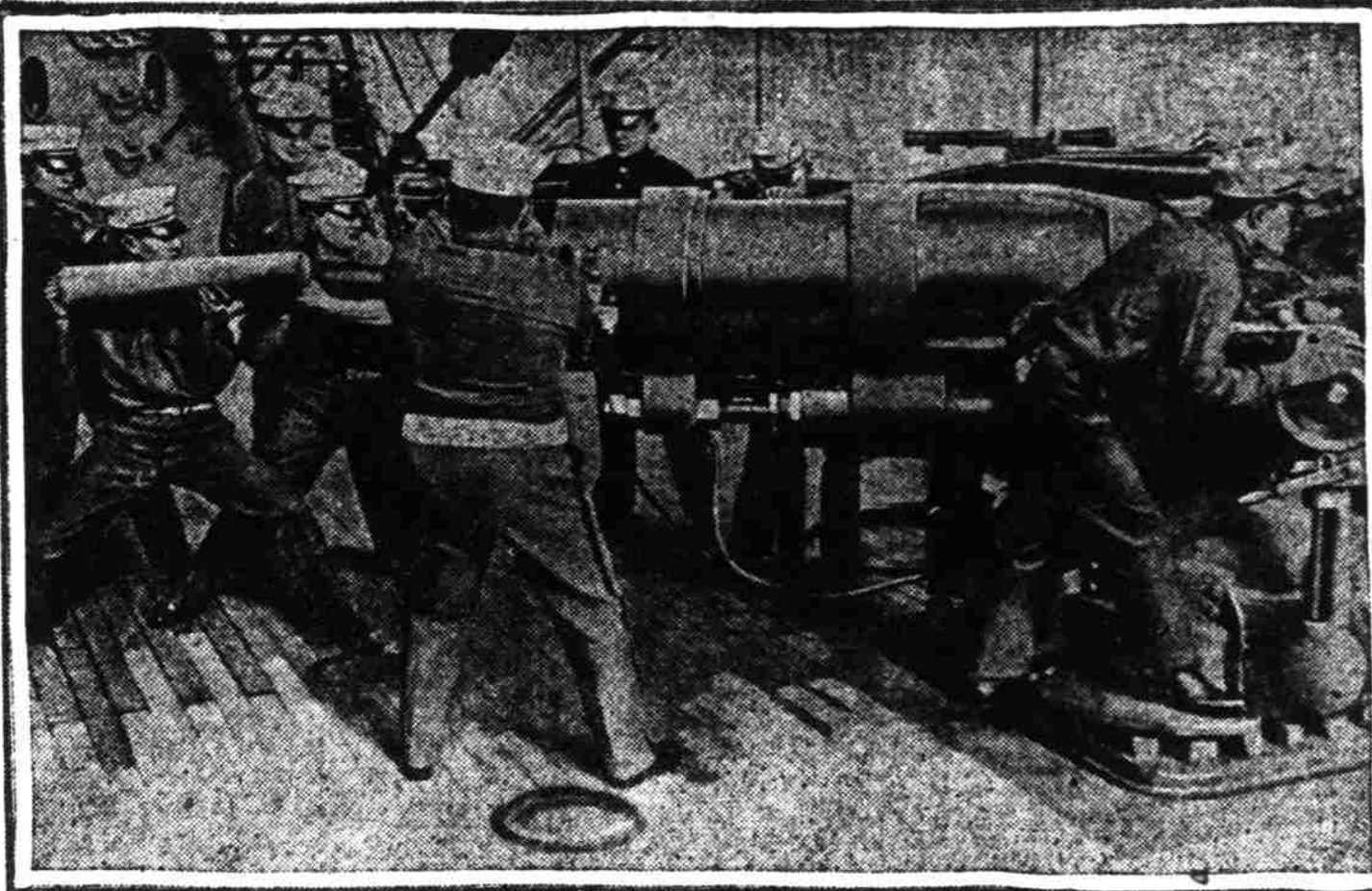

Wasco county is being thoroughly organized. Eighteen thousand dollars have already been subscribed in small amounts.

This afternoon the bond sellers are holding a meeting at Wasco arranged by R. C. Atwood. Tonight a big meeting of Mr. and Mrs. A. N. Wetterborg, his mother graduated from the same school as her son—the old Raleigh school. He will enter Lincoln high in Portland next fall.

John Schmidt Dies

Forest Grove, Or., June 6.—John Schmidt, aged 78 years, who died at his home near Laurel May 31, was a native of Switzerland, where he was married to Miss Mary Ritter. They came to America 25 years ago, and after a few months at Vancouver came to Washington county, where their home has been since. His widow and nine children survive.

Injuries Prove Fatal
Klamath Falls, Or., June 6.—As a result of injuries inflicted when a lumber wagon ran over his chest last week near this city, Eli Morris, an employee of the Turner Lumber company of Merrill, died Sunday at the Klamath Falls hospital. Morris was driving a load of lumber to town and fell off the front of the wagon. He was 46 years old and has no known relatives.

Chinese, Hiding as Tong War Result, Register in Secret

San Francisco, June 5.—(P. N. S.)—Tong warfare added a bizarre Oriental feature to registration here today, when registration deputies spent two hours in the secret haunts of Chinatown to register 2000 young Chinese, who were in hiding.

Members of the Hop Sing, Suey Sing and Bing Kong tong have been under cover because of recent activities of high binders and even Uncle Sam's call to the colors would not bring them into the open. They feared the bullets of their own race more than the prison threat of the government.

Lower Kills Mother Of Quadruplets

Toledo, Ohio, June 6.—(U. P.)—Because Mrs. Frances Sychalski, 37, mother of the only set of quadruplets ever born in Toledo, would not elope with him, John Ciechan, 27, of Detroit, fatally shot the woman and then committed suicide in a room in the United States hotel here Tuesday night. Sychalski died in a Toledo hospital. She was a Polish interpreter, well known in legal circles.

Austrian Destroyer Sunk by Submarine

Vienna, June 6.—(I. N. S.)—An Austrian destroyer was torpedoed and sunk in the Adriatic by an enemy submarine on the night of June 3, it was officially announced Tuesday.
