

INTERNECINE TROUBLE IN CHINESE REPUBLIC CONTINUES UNABATED

Wu Ting Fang Pleads for
Peace; Calls Foreign Inter-
ference Likely.

Tokio, June 7.—(U. P.)—The anniversary of the death of Yuan Shi Kai, first president of the republic of China, today found China divided into two distinct governments, with the internecine struggle between the northern and southern parts of the country unabated.

President Li Yuan Hung firmly maintains his opposition to the division of the country and continues to urge Wang Shi Chen, chief of staff, to accept the premiership and to attempt to bring the warring factions together.

Peking today received a protest against the Tu-chuns from the leaders of the provinces of Yunnan and Szechuan, both of whom are looking to the United States for aid. They suggest that Li Yuan Hung form a new cabinet with Dr. Wu Ting Fang, former Chinese minister to the United States as head, hoping thus to gain American support.

Fang Tries to Mediate
General Feng Kuo Chung has spurned the advances of the military and today announced his unswerving support of the president. He is making a strong effort to mediate and has proposed that Li Yuan Hung be petitioned to dissolve parliament and take steps to punish the Tu-chuns. The latter evidently fear the growing strength of the south China factions.

Wu Ting Fang issued a statement pleading for a peaceful solution and declaring that foreign interference in the affairs of China is likely.

General Ni Shi Chun, leader of the rebels in Anhwei province, in an interview today declared the Tu-chuns do not want a monarchy. President Li Yuan Hung, he said, must dissolve parliament or else retire in favor of Hsu Shi Chang, head of the provisional revolutionary government.

Rebel Leader Expects Success
Ni Shi Chun does not expect any fighting, declaring even President Li's personal body guard is in favor of the Tu-chuns.

The whole trouble, he said, will be

settled in a fortnight and then, he predicts, the new parliament will declare war on Germany.

The general declared that the cause of the revolt of himself and his associates was the refusal of President Li and his advisors to follow what the rebels believe to be a proper war policy. General Ni Shi Chun was the first military leader to declare his independence.

Three transports loaded with Japanese troops have left Japan for Manchuria where they will replace Japanese garrisons whose term of service there has expired.
