

COURT TO DETERMINE MANNER OF MATCHING FEDERAL ROAD FUNDS

Mandamus or Injunction Suit
Will Be Instituted to De-
termine Method of Action,
HIGHWAY BOARD SO RULES

One Member Holds \$6,000,000 Bill Just
Approved Abrogates Restrictions in
the Bean-Barrett Measure.

Salem, Or., June 8.—The question as to whether the \$1,800,000 needed to match the federal road money shall be obtained by the sale of bonds, under the provisions of chapter 175, laws of 1917, known as the Bean-Barrett bill, will be put up to the state supreme court for determination.

This decision was reached Thursday at a joint meeting of the state board of control and the state highway commission, hurriedly called after the state treasurer Kay raised the contention that bonds could not be issued to match the federal fund until after all other money in the state highway fund had been exhausted for that purpose.

Form of Suit Undetermined
The suit will be a friendly affair, merely to test the legal point involved. Whether it will be in the form of original mandamus proceedings in the supreme court or injunction proceedings to be started in the circuit court will depend on an opinion to be given by the attorney general to the state board of control. If the attorney general advises that all the "match" money should be raised by the sale of bonds, the state board will refuse to order the bonds issued and someone will be asked to institute injunction proceedings. On the other hand, if the attorney general takes Mr. Kay's view of the law, the board will refuse to issue the bonds and the highway commission will institute mandamus proceedings.

In an oral opinion given to the joint meeting Thursday Assistant Attorney General Van Winkle was inclined to take Mr. Kay's view of the law.

Restrictions May Be Abrogated
A. J. Adams, a member of the highway commission, argued that a provision in the \$6,000,000 bonding bill, which has just been passed by the people, abrogates the restrictions in the Bean-Barrett bill which would prevent the issuance of bonds to match the federal money until after the highway fund was exhausted. The provision he quoted says:

"The funds with which to pay the portion of the expense of construction of said post roads and forest roads payable by the state of Oregon, shall be secured from the sale of bonds as provided in house bill No. 21, passed by the present legislative session."

Chairman Benson of the highway commission said if the state could not issue bonds for the entire amount needed to match the federal funds, it would prevent the commission from helping in the construction of all the outlying roads.

Julius Knispel May Be Interned for War

Agitator and Lawyer, Classed as En-
emy Alien, Being Gorman, Is Arrested
for Having Revolver in Possession.

Julius Knispel, agitator and lawyer, who has been often under arrest in Portland on various charges, probably will spend the period of the war in an internment camp.

United States District Attorney Reames telegraphed Thursday night to the attorney general at Washington, asking that Knispel be interned.

Knispel was arrested by Detective Swennes, charged with carrying a revolver in violation of the proclamation of President Wilson, April 6, which ordered enemy aliens to turn over to the police authorities all weapons in their possession and forbidding them to have such weapons. Knispel is an unnaturalized German.

AMERICAN DESTROYER RESCUES SURVIVORS OF TORPEDOED SHIPS

Wife of Captain and Stew-
ardess Included; Two Men
Killed, Seven Wounded.

New York, June 8.—(I. N. S.)—A United States destroyer rescued crews of the Norwegian bark Nadura, from Mobile, and the Russian bark Lynton, from Pensacola, 170 miles south of the Irish coast, on May 21, and landed them at an Irish port the following day.

The vessels were sunk by a U-boat. The news was brought by members of the rescued crews, who arrived at an American port Thursday.

The vessels were traveling together when attacked. They made no resistance. Despite this, the U-boat rained shrapnel on them all the time the lifeboats were being lowered. Even the presence of the captain's wife and a stewardess upon the Nadura's deck did not stop the shelling. Two men were killed and seven wounded on the Nadura.

Several hours later a destroyer came over the horizon. The surprised crews saw the American flag.

The U-boat disappeared before the destroyer could get a shot at her. The Lynton's crew were permitted to leave their ship in the lifeboats without molestation.

Members of the crew of the Russian bark Margarita, from Beaumont, Texas, to Liverpool with a large cargo of lumber, sunk May 17, and sailors from the United States gunboat Scorpion, interned at Constantinople, also arrived Thursday.

Another passenger was Wesley Frost, American consul at Queenstown. He was accompanied by his wife and daughter. The consul said he had been granted an indefinite leave of absence but would go to Washington before proceeding to his home in Bertha, Ky.

The consul's health has broken down during the strain of his ever increasing duties in Queenstown and his physician ordered an immediate and complete rest for him.

"Reports of the sinking of German submarines by merchant vessels should be taken with a grain of salt," he said. "The arming of merchant vessels has saved many ships, but the offensive value of the guns is not great."

San Francisco, June 8.—(P. N. S.)—Herman Somer, a pawnbroker, was shot twice by a holdup man who entered his shop in broad daylight today and ordered Somer to turn over his cash, after pretending to be interested in the purchase of some jewelry. Somer ran for the door when the demand was made and the intruder fired at him, one shot shattering his jaw and the other lodging in his arm. The robber fled.

CORPORAL GORMAN IN HOSPITAL RECOVERING FROM BULLET WOUND

Martin W. Gorman Receives
Letter From Nephew Tell-
ing of Life in the Trenches

Martin W. Gorman, superintendent of the Forestry building, received an interesting letter Wednesday from Corporal W. P. Gorman, his 24-year-old nephew, who is in a London hospital, recovering from injuries received on April 9, the first day of the great English offensive in France.

The young man is in Mile End hospital, one of the largest military hospitals in England. His letter in part follows:

"It is a long time since I last wrote to you. I intended writing from France, but neglected until it was too late. However, there was very little of interest in our part of the line up to April 9. It was that day that the big push started.

"Our battalion advanced to the German second line that morning, and then a sniper got me. The bullet went in through the collarbone and came out below my shoulder blade. It was a steel bullet, and only made a small hole. I am getting around again and my shoulder is getting strong as fast

as can be expected. I will likely get back to the trenches in about two months. I was glad to get a rest from the line for awhile, as we had a pretty cold, wet winter there. I was only five months in France. We left England November 14, and I came back April 14.

"I did not see much of the country, except that part ruined by the war, but from what I saw judge it must have been a very prosperous land. The land is very fertile and the farmers know their business, even if their methods are rather old-fashioned. Wheat appears to be the principal crop.

"The whole country is dotted with stacks. Owing to a scarcity of labor, a lot of last year's crop is still in the fields, but they build the stacks so they may stand for years and not suffer very much from the weather.

"I am afraid the folks are worrying about me, as the casualty list had me down as seriously wounded, but I got the chaplain to write and assure them that I was all right."
