

EDITORIAL ANALYSIS AGREES REQUESTS OF RUSSIA ARE ALL MET

Allies' Re-Statement of Aims
Held to Leave No Basis
for Failure to Cooperate.

PRESIDENT GIVEN CREDIT

Publication of Agreements and Revision of Treaties Depends on Desire of Russia, It Is Declared.

London, June 12.—(U. P.)—It is now up to Russia. England, France and the United States, in behalf of the allies, have frankly re-stated their war aims and those war aims coincide with expressions which have come from democratic Russia. If Russia desires publication of all agreements and revision of these treaties, it can be stated authoritatively that the allies are ready to take this step.

This was the general view here today following publication of England's note approving President Wilson's communication. France, through vote of her parliament, has already gone on record in the same unequivocal manner. Every request of the new Russian government has, therefore, been met.

Editorial analysis of the situation today agreed that every possible objection to Russia's full cooperation with the allies had now been met. What was particularly lauded by the news paper comment was the full order to revise all agreements contained in the British note.

President Wilson was universally credited with the initiative in the allies' unanimity in expression of their aims, his note being held to have clarified the situation.

The greatest interest is now manifest in what Russia will have to say in reply.

Wilson's Note Stirs Nations

London, June 12.—(U. P.)—Coming at a time when British arms are so successful on the western front, the note of President Wilson to Russia, setting forth the war aims of the United States, has created one of the biggest sensations since the war started. Its effect has been general, being felt in the central powers' territory as well as in the allied countries.

In some circles the Wilson statement is considered even stronger than the peace terms stated some months ago by Premier Lloyd George.

England lost no time in restating her war aims. A note has been dispatched to Petrograd reaffirming the declarations made by President Wilson. The British note leaves no ground for misunderstanding as to why British blood is being shed.

Equal clarity probably will be shown by the central powers. Although Germany and Austria may persist in their refusal to name definite peace terms, it is believed that the statements will be forthcoming from Berlin or Vienna, maybe from both capitals—giving a broader consideration of war aims than have yet been announced.

that in the past three years immigration has practically stopped.

While officials realize there are still probably many thousands of slackers, they pointed out, following a revision of the estimates, that the number will be far less than at first expected.

The government, on the trail of those who have failed to register, will make a wholesale roundup today. In the far west the government sweep will probably be the greatest inasmuch as western returns show figures far below the census estimates.

Estimates Not Far Out of Way
Government heads say the census estimates are not so far from the way as to be theoretical or visionary. The shortage in registration, compared with census estimates shows that there are many slackers.

While registration in many respects has been satisfactory, producing 9,250,000 or more, the response of the west has been amazing to men in charge of the registration.

It has shown a "slacker spirit," registration officials say, beyond the comprehension of even the most ardent peace-at-any-price advocates.

Regardless of slackers, however, America has sufficient men right now to turn out an army of 2,000,000 men without claim or hint of exemption.

Twin Cities Promised Demonstration

Minneapolis, Minn., June 12.—(U. P.)—Eleven thousand unregistered men in Minneapolis and St. Paul will begin a fight against the draft by surging to federal officials in a big demonstration, Abe Sugarman, secretary of the state Socialist party, announced today. He declared 7000 men to register in Minneapolis and 4000 in St. Paul.

Sugarman has been the leader of anti-conscription activities here. He recently confounded government agents who arrested him, following his announced intention not to register, by producing a registration card. No arrests have been made here for nonregistration as a result of a roundup order from Washington.

Under threat that martial law would be declared here, the city council has agreed to the program of war legislation demanded by the state council of defense. The measures demanded are to make possible municipal enforcement of the defense council's order closing saloons at 10 o'clock, prohibiting the sale of liquor to women and placing a ban upon cabarets. The city council at first balked.

Arrests Made in New York

New York, June 12.—(U. P.)—Wholesale arrests of anarchists followed last night's attempt to further impede the progress of the selective draft at a meeting featured by speeches by Emma Goldman and Leon Samson, 20-year-old Columbia student. Thirty men were seized, 11 of whom were arrested and nine detained for refusing to register for the draft. Orders to a sale of liquor to women rounded up at last night's meeting in \$5000 bail for the federal grand jury were issued today.

The men were Philip Lavine, 22, Herman Woskow, 21, and Wilhelm Herrguth, 27.

Governor of California Notified

Sacramento, Cal., June 12.—(U. P.)—California's roundup of slackers began today. Orders went out to peace officers and others with authority to enforce the registration law directing them to begin at once arrests of those who failed to register.

A telegram was received by Governor W. D. Stephens from Provost Marshal General Crowder, officially notifying the governor that the period of leniency for slackers had ended and urging immediate and effective action.

Revised figures on California's registration show 239,377 enrolled.

Public Officials Eliminated

San Francisco, June 12.—(U. P.)—Mayor Rolph today prepared a supplementary list of appointments to places on the San Francisco exemption boards. This was necessary because orders from Washington directed that no public official could sit on a board, eliminating five appointees. Failure to establish residence in the districts for which they were appointed eliminated two others.

OREGON MUST RECRUIT 6000 WORKERS TO AID IN HARVESTING CROPS

Thousand Berry Pickers Are
Needed at Once in White
Salmon and Hood River.

PATRIOTISM IN SERVICE

Government-City Recruiting Office at
Third and Ankeny Streets Is Busy
Place These Days.

There is a government-city recruiting office at Third and Ankeny streets which is becoming feverish. By July 1 its managers must recruit a mobile army of 6000. The food production of Oregon is at stake. The state's food contribution to national defense hinges on their success.

"The late season will bring the harvest of grain and say, loganberries, raspberries and blackberries at the same time," explained N. F. Johnson, manager of the municipal employment bureau and director of the labor division of the Oregon food preparedness campaign. To meet the emergency, workers usually exempt from farm duty will have to be drafted. Men will have to go out of their homes and offices into the harvest fields. Women and children will have to go from homes into loganberry, raspberry and blackberry fields.

Berry Pickers Wanted at Once

"The schools," continued Mr. Johnson, "are responding limitlessly to the appeal for junior agricultural service. We must save the berries and can or dry them for national defense. We must harvest the wheat to feed the allies and ourselves. We must mow the hay for livestock."

Today we need 1000 workers for the strawberry fields of the White Salmon and Hood River districts. The wage paid pickers is 7 1/2 cents a carrier of six quarts to part season workers. Packers receive 15 to 18 cents a crate. It is work that families can engage in with fair profit. They should prepare, however, to furnish camp equipment and food supplies for a period of, say, 30 days. Employers will furnish wood and water and transportation from the station. Railroad fare must be paid by the pickers. Those who will communicate with me at the municipal employment bureau, Third and Ankeny streets, can secure all needed information.

There Must Be Patriotic Service

"We must have much patriotic service and sacrifice for the harvest if Oregon is to do its part in the international emergency of food supply," an aid told that production may be 40 to 50 per cent above normal in Oregon this year.

\$10,000—Brown.

The coupon bonds will bear 60 coupons for interest payments every six months for 30 years.

WEST PROVING SLOW IN SUBSCRIBING FOR U. S. LIBERTY BONDS

Chicago, June 12.—(U. P.)—The west was struggling today to throw off the incubus of lethargy which has characterized its attitude toward the \$200,000,000 Liberty loan.

In some of the western federal reserve districts this struggle was succeeding, while in others it was frankly admitted that after the first spurt at the opening of "Liberty loan week" the people had fallen into apathy.

Chicago had mapped out a million-dollar-an-hour campaign, and was maintaining that pace, which, if continued, will result in this district having subscribed its minimum allotment of \$250,000,000 when the time limit on the issue expires Friday noon.

The district, to date, has taken slightly more than 60 per cent of its allotment.

The Kansas City district reported a noticeable apathy on the part of its citizens, with its allotment more than \$50,000,000 short. Various organizations, however, were vigorously pushing the campaign.

St. Paul and Minneapolis were oversubscribed, but the St. Paul district was still below its quota. Montana had raised \$10,500,000.

Milwaukee lacked \$3,390,550 of its allotment of \$14,000,000. A factory campaign was under way today.

Figures were unavailable for the whole Denver district, but the city itself had raised \$3,500,000. Utah had raised \$4,000,000 of its \$5,500,000.

St. Louis Doing Well

San Francisco residents had subscribed \$30,000,000 of the city's quota of \$42,000,000. Of this, \$4,000,000 was raised yesterday.

The Dallas district was still short \$15,000,000 of its allotment of \$40,000,000.

Total individual subscriptions in St. Louis today were \$11,397,250. The

clearing-house was reported to have underwritten \$50,000,000 in bonds for the St. Louis district. Boy Scouts were making a house to house canvass to raise \$1,000,000.

Des Moines reported the campaign slowed up after the first spurt. The city had taken \$1,750,000 of its \$2,000,000.

The farming districts have shown comparatively little interest to date.

McAdoo in Pittsburgh

Pittsburgh, Pa., June 12.—(U. P.)—Secretary of the Treasury William Gibbs McAdoo was here today to put the "punch" in the final drive of the Liberty loan campaign. Banks reported that small subscriptions were pouring in and that their bond departments would be kept open at night until Friday. Although definite figures have not been available for several days, no fear is felt that the \$50,000,000 allotment for this district will not be subscribed.

To Invest Indian Money

Washington, June 12.—(U. P.)—The senate has passed a resolution permitting the secretary of the interior to invest money belonging to Indians in Liberty bonds. Approximately \$11,000,000 of such money is available.

Thorlasons Go to Bend

Lebanon, Or., June 12.—Professor F. Thorlason of schools here, accompanied by his family, has gone to Bend, where he has been employed as city superintendent of schools. The Thorlasons have been visiting here since June 5.

Draft Not to Hurt Any Vital Industry

Where Such Results Follow Matter
Should Be Presented to Exemption
Board With Claims and Grounds.

Washington, June 12.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—Understanding that it is not the purpose of the administration to cripple any vital industry by the draft, Provost Marshal General Crowder has indicated to Senator Chamberlain the course that should be followed where such results might follow.

The matter should be presented to the exemption board of the locality, he says, with a claim for exemption on the ground of the service being performed by the individual.

Provisional exemption should be granted by classes, and individual claims will be individually considered.

The manager of the Utah-Idaho Sugar company's factory at Grants, N. M., recently reported to Senator Chamberlain that this factory will be seriously hampered if two men employed there are taken for the army.

Germans Use Big Guns

With the British armies in the field, June 12.—(U. P.)—In the face of very heavy artillery but with comparatively little infantry opposition, the British today were crossing by patrols well to the east of positions in the recently won battle of Messines Ridge.

Since that battle the Germans have attempted only one heavy counter-attack. Evidence at hand, such as observation of aeroplanes and testimony of newly taken prisoners, would seem to indicate that the Germans have not yet reorganized after the staggering blow General Plumer's second British army delivered against them last Thursday.

The seven field guns reported by Field Marshal Haig as taken yesterday were captured by patrols. The German gunners took fright at the first signs of the British approach and fled precipitately, evidently fearing another British massed attack.

British positions were under vigorous German shellfire today, but the projectiles were for the most part from long range guns.

Vienna Reports on Attacks
Vienna, June 12.—(U. P.)—"After great sacrifice, the enemy penetrated our trenches northwest of Asiago, only to be completely ejected later," declared an official statement today of the Italian offensive in the Trentino.

"The expected Italian attack on the Sclavi plateau and in the Sugana valley began after several days of artillery firing," the war office said.

Bill Would Put Curb On Raising of Rents

Washington, June 12.—(U. P.)—A campaign to determine whether landlords have attempted to increase rents "because of the war" and to prevent such increases during hostilities, will be begun in the house today by Representative Henry Emerson of Ohio.

Representative Emerson late today will introduce a bill asking an investigation of rent raising and passage of a law similar to that enacted by Great Britain—prohibiting rent increases during the war.

First National Adds \$500,000 to City's Liberty Bond Sales

Elliot R. Corbett, vice president of the First National bank, announced today that the bank had taken an additional \$500,000 block of Liberty loan bonds, which brings Portland's total very near the \$6,000,000 goal.

Exclusive of the new subscription of \$500,000, which is to be held intact as a permanent investment by the bank, the First National has absorbed \$1,020,000 worth of the bonds, all of which has been resold to individual investors. What further subscriptions are made through the bank will be listed in addition, Mr. Corbett explained.

American Aviators To Locate in Japan

Tokio, May 12.—(U. P.)—(By Mail to New York, June 12)—Two American aviators, now in Japan, are planning to establish aeronautic schools and aeroplane factories in this country.

They are Art Smith, who gained fame at the San Francisco exposition, and Frank Champion, Japanese capitalists will furnish the funds for the enterprise. Smith came here to fill flying engagements, while Champion made the trip to assist Miss Katherine Stinson, the American aviatrix, who recently returned to the United States.
