

PORTLAND FIRST CITY ON COAST TO GAIN ITS LIBERTY BOND QUOTA

Tacoma May Exceed Its
Quota of \$2,160,000 by
Tonight, Is Belief.

OTHERS ARE FAR BEHIND

Pacific Coast Cities Must Subscribe
Nearly \$28,000,000 Before Friday
to Complete Quota Assigned.

San Francisco, June 13.—(U. P.)—The large cities of the Pacific coast must subscribe nearly \$28,000,000 worth of Liberty bonds before Friday noon if they expect to complete the quota assigned to them by the treasury department when the big drive for war funds began.

Eight of the largest cities of Washington, Oregon and California, whose aggregate allotment of bonds is \$107,675,000 of the loan.

Portland, Or., is the banner city so far, having exceeded the quota of \$2,160,000 by nearly \$100,000. The state of Oregon will also exceed its quota. Tacoma's quota will be completed by night also.

Final Drives Are On
Everywhere on the Pacific coast final drives for Liberty bonds are in full swing today and officials and members of the various Liberty loan committees were confident that all quotas would be filled.

The effectiveness of the local campaigns was evident today. In Los Angeles committees have raised approximately \$5,000,000 in the past 24 hours, and in Sacramento \$1,300,000 has been raised since yesterday morning.

Climax Comes Tonight
The climax of the San Francisco campaign will come tonight, when a big mass meeting will be held at the Civic Auditorium to arouse new enthusiasm for the bonds. Mary Pickford, movie star, who has already personally bought a large amount of bonds, will address the crowd and urge that the nation's financial need be met and the bogey of financial slackness be buried.

More than \$3,000,000 was subscribed here yesterday and the committees charged expect to raise the \$3,000,000 needed today and tomorrow. Labor leaders here have issued an appeal to workingmen to invest their savings in Liberty bonds.

The campaign throughout the state of California is no less spirited. Governor Stephens is touring the state to boost the bonds and his influence in this direction is expected to be felt immediately in large additions to the subscriptions.

North Yakima on Last Lap

North Yakima, Wash., June 13.—North Yakima begins its drive for Liberty loan subscriptions with about \$350,000 subscribed of the \$620,000 fixed by the federal reserve bank as the quota for this district. This district is composed of four counties: Kittitas, Yakima, Benton and Klickitat, and it is charged with raising \$1,300,000. The total for the district reported to date is \$500,000, according to J. A. Loudon, chairman of the committee that has the matter in charge. The local company of Boy Scouts in charge of Roy L. Steadman, who began a four days' campaign and will employ about 400 members during the week in distributing literature and soliciting applications.

W. L. Steadman and C. B. Bradford made a trip to the reclamation camp at McAllister Meadows to solicit subscriptions from the camp employees and left the camp yesterday in the hands of Bert Mitchell, the Y. M. C. A. director.

Town Oversubscribes Fund
Chesham, Wash., June 13.—It has been reported that Dr. H. B. Cravens of Wallville, who attended the Red Cross meeting here, that the sawmill town of Wallville on the South Fork branch line, has oversubscribed its Liberty bond proportion. Subscriptions to date are nearly \$6000 and the mark was only \$4000. It is believed that this is the only town in the state that has established a record of oversubscribing its full proportion.

Up to last night the Liberty bond subscription in this city had passed the \$30,000 mark by a comfortable margin with a total of \$100,000 to be raised.

Seattle Wants Million

Seattle, June 13.—(U. P.)—A Million Dollar day is what Seattle is striving for today in her campaign to raise \$2,000,000 of the Liberty bonds.

Total subscriptions reported to the banks at the close of business yesterday were \$6,359,000, with an estimated \$800,000 as yet unchecked.

One Way to Use Bonds

Bend, Or., June 13.—T. H. Foley, manager of the Bend Water Light Power company, ascertained through Portland firms that bills owing are payable in Liberty loan bonds, so that the large denominated bonds sent by Mr. Foley to Portland firms instead of cash.

U. S. Steel Increases Buy

Chicago, June 13.—(U. P.)—W. A. Heath, chairman of the federal reserve bank, announced shortly after noon today that the United States Steel corporation had subscribed an additional \$25,000,000 of Liberty bonds, bringing its total to \$50,000,000. Of this, \$12,000,000 was credited to the Chicago district and the balance to New York.

Napavine Has Committee

Centralia, Wash., June 13.—At a meeting held in Napavine Sunday evening a committee was organized to push the sale of Liberty bonds. Napavine's quota of the bonds is \$250,000, but an effort will be made to dispose of \$100,000 worth. The committee is composed of L. A. Dailey, chairman; W. C. Arnold, W. A. Horton, J. W. Helmick and B. P. Blue.

THE VALUE OF THE CONVERSION PRIVILEGE

The holder of a Liberty Bond has the privilege, without expense to him, of exchanging his 3½% bond into any new United States government bonds which may be issued during the present war, bearing higher rate of interest.

HOW LIBERTY LOAN SUBSCRIPTIONS GROW

IT is believed that the city of Athens, in Middle Georgia county, has established a record for the purchase of Liberty bonds in Oregon. Its total population is around 600 people, but \$50,000 has been subscribed, at a rate of almost \$100 a person.

At a meeting of the executive committee of the Gettysburg-Chicamauga Peace Memorial Association last week it was decided that instead of devoting its funds to the erection of a monument to the battle, the money is to be invested in Liberty bonds until such time as the international situation will justify carrying out the original plan. In the provision of the resolution drawn up the committee stated its realization of the fact that the raising of funds for the war is the matter of first consideration.

Rodney Gist Minnion, 11 months old son of Mr. and Mrs. Gist Minnion of Yamhill, on May 25 became owner of the first Liberty bond purchased in Yamhill county, according to word received Tuesday by The Journal from the Yamhill State Bank. The bond was a gift from H. C. Gist, the child's grandfather. Mr. Gist is postmaster of Yamhill, and he purchased the second Liberty bond sold in that neighborhood.

Yamhill lodge No. 98, Knights of Pythias of Yamhill, has done its portion towards the Liberty loan by purchasing a \$100 bond, according to word received at the campaign headquarters Tuesday.

Eight-year-old Jean Woodward, 339 Fourteenth street, has purchased a Liberty bond with her earnings from doing chores. Wood carrying, work in the garden and odd jobs about home brought her the \$50, which she has invested in the bond. She made personal application for the bond.

The Printers' Benefit association of Portland, composed of members of the Typographical union of the city, Tuesday invested \$1000 of its trust fund in the bonds.

Ivanhoe lodge, Knights of Pythias at a recent meeting authorized investment of \$1050 in the bonds. This is the largest K. of P. lodge in the state.

Portland lodge, B. P. O. E., has subscribed \$1000 for the bonds, and many of its members have made individual subscriptions. The lodge has a complete lodge subscriptions to over \$10,000, it is estimated.

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FAIR METHOD SOUGHT FOR DRAWING NAMES OF MEN TO BE DRAFTED

Exact Means Not Yet
Decided Upon by Board Ad-
vising President.

IMPARTIALITY ESSENTIAL

Several Methods Discarded Because
Found Not "Politics-Proof"—Jury
Wheel Is Impracticable.

Washington, June 12.—(U. P.)—Within a few weeks the eyes of the nation will be fixed upon the most momentous "lottery" in history.

In an obscure office in the Land Office building a secret advisory board of lawyers, jurists and military men is laboring today setting the stage for the drawing that will sift out America's new armies from the millions on the "rolls of honor."

As yet the exact method of drawing the names of the first levy from more than nine million on the registration rolls is unsettled. It will upon an absolutely fair and impartial system that will be invulnerable to political or any other kind of tampering is one of the knottiest problems President Wilson's advisory board has encountered.

Already it is practically decided that the so-called jury wheel system is impracticable.

The board has considered a dozen schemes to single out the number of men needed; but most of them, however, lack some essential or are not "politics-proof" and are discarded.

Among the schemes tested and considered by the board was one by which the registration cards were assigned numbers to correspond with marbles in a basket. On a certain day the drawings were to be held simultaneously in the cities or counties.

Whatever plan the board decides upon is to combine the elements of speed, fairness and publicity. As soon as a tentative scheme is decided upon, the plan will be laid before President Wilson.

The war department is anxious to get the lottery ready so that the men for the first levy can be selected and rushed into camps for training.

Tug Service Planned
San Francisco, June 13.—The Ralph Coal and Navigation company, one of Mayor James Rolph Jr.'s enterprises, is preparing to become a competitor in the tug boat business here with the Red Hook company, which for years has had practically a monopoly along this coast. Two of the most powerful tugs in the United States are now being constructed for the company.

French & Co., bankers of The Dalles, informed the committee Tuesday that O. W. R. & N. employees of that city had subscribed for \$1950 of the bonds.

An order from County Judge Tazewell Tuesday enabled two little Portland boys to subscribe Liberty to the bonds. They are Gertrude and Helen Wood, daughters of Edward B. Wood, special agent of the O. W. R. & N. railroad agency.

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PORTLAND YOUTH WHO SERVED WITH BRITISH

Corporal Davies Is
On Way Home From
French Battlefield

Portland Youth Receives Dis-
charge From British Ser-
vice Because of Wound.

L. L. Davies, of Portland, until recently a member of the British fighting forces, is visiting E. P. Lipson of Salt Lake for a short time on his way home from Europe. He was wounded at the battle of the Somme, and is now recovering from a crushed foot resulting from the accident, and was honorably discharged from the British army.

He joined the Canadian army some time ago and spent altogether about seven months in France. He began in the British Columbia Horse and soon ranked as a corporal. He later changed to the 103rd Overseas regiment, and a short time afterward joined the American Legion. When it disbanded he entered the artillery corps, in which he was wounded.

While in Salt Lake he applied for the officers' training camp, but was rejected because his foot was not yet ready for hard service. He appeared at headquarters in his British army uniform, and made quite a stir.

Corporal Davies is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Davies, of 743 Greenwood, and a brother of Mary Carolyn Davies, well known as a writer of poetry, and who is just returning from New York to Portland. The family lived in Canada for some years prior to coming to Portland. Davies is 22 years old.
