PORTLAND BOY BACK FROM YPRES SAYS RED CROSS SAVED HIS LIFE

'I Wouldn't Be Here," Freeman Armstrong Says, "But for Stretcher Bearers." -

WILL AID FUND CAMPAIGN

Veteran, Who Eas Returned Wounded From Battle With Germans, Has Advice to Offer.

Freeman Armstrong, a Portland boy, went with the Canadian Scottish volunteers to the European war, filled with all of a youth's eager desire to witness the realities of war.

The other day he hobbled back, part of a foot torn away by a shell, a splinter of steel still imbedded in his skull and internal injuries lending pain to every breath.

"I wouldn't be here if it wasn't for the Red Cross," he said to his rejoic-

Will Tell About the War "After my wound at the battle of Tpres, I lay 24 hours unconscious on No Man's Land among the dead. Cross stretcher bearers, risking their ives, for the Germans did not respect their neutrality, found me and car-ried me back of the trenches, where a Red Cross ambulance hurried me to the hospital in which Red Cross physicians and nurses cared for me so well that I got through."

Armstrong's injuries incapacitated him for further active service under arms, but he is still determined to serve his country. He is going out for the State Red Cross campaign committee. He will address audiences in the towns of the Willamette valley and meeting of the Masters', Lecturers' war. He has seen the war. He will tell about it.
