

OREGON LIBERTY LOAN FUND NOW FAR ABOVE MARK OF \$11,000,000

First National Adds \$280,000
Today and Portland Flour-
ing Mills \$100,000.

nounced an added subscription of \$280,000, and the Portland Flouring Mills \$100,000. The latter subscription was made through the Ladd & Tilton bank.

Thirteen other large subscriptions this morning, in addition to the two mentioned, amounted to \$170,850, and at the various banks the regular public business amounted to over \$150,000 in the two hours.

Closing Hours Exciting

Closing hours of the campaign were filled with excitement. Small subscribers were making bargain counter rushes on the banks. In some of the large west side banks, two and three tellers were swamped with those waiting to subscribe. At one bank 77 applications had been received at noon. Everywhere the prediction was made that the last day would be the best day for the loan in Portland. And reports coming from outside indicated that this would be the best day throughout the state.

At the very last minute today it was determined that Oregon's apportionment in the loan, instead of being \$500,000, as previously reported, was \$10,560,000.

Total Will Reach \$12,000,000

The figure is based on the bank deposits of the state, which, on the May report to the state bank superintendent, aggregated \$12,000,000. The statement from San Francisco said that Oregon was expected to contribute 9 per cent of its deposits toward the loan, and this amounts to \$10,560,000.

But no matter what the actual figure is, it has been far over-subscribed, and when the books are closed for good this evening, the state will show a total of over \$12,000,000.

A number of other big amounts were recorded at the banks today. The Portland Lumber company and its employees subscribed \$15,000. As a result of the last industrial meeting of the campaign, held this morning at the Standard Oil company plant near Linnton, \$2750 was immediately subscribed and recorded with the Ladd & Tilton bank.

Port of Portland Gives \$10,000
The Warren Packing company subscribed \$5000 and the Alaska-Portland packers' association, for the same amount. The Port of Portland announced a subscription of \$10,000.

Some of the other big amounts today were Clatsop & Devers, and their employees, \$6650; Portland Cordage company and employees, \$5000; Henry Jennings & Sons, \$5000; Pomerooy State bank, Pomeroy, Wash., \$2000; Edward Boyce, \$10,000, and Fred Lead-better, \$10,000.

Employees of the Pacific Power & Light company, subscribed \$9000, under the partial payment plan of the

corporation, and this amount was duly recorded today.

City Employees Subscribe

City employees, through Treasurer William Adams, subscribed \$24,400, a large portion of which came from members of the fire department. The last of this amount was deposited with the banks this morning. Another large subscription was made by August Berg for \$5000.

Subscriptions to the amount of several thousand dollars have been obtained by Mrs. J. L. Louison and Miss Getta Wasserman, who have been devoting their time for the past week to assisting the Liberty loan committee. Mrs. Louison and Miss Wasserman are the only two women who have given any considerable number of days to the Liberty loan work locally.

Vancouver Still Buying

Vancouver, Wash., June 14.—Over \$130,000 has been invested in Liberty loan bonds in Vancouver up until this morning. One bank had received three applications during the first half hour the bank was open today and it is expected that a great many more will be received by night. Fully \$50,000 of this amount has been subscribed by local banks.

Chehalis Outdoes Herself

Chehalis, Wash., June 14.—Chehalis has oversubscribed the \$100,000 fund of Liberty loan bonds assigned her. Other towns of the county Wednesday reported sales as follows: Pe Ell, \$2000; Wauville, \$5000; Winlock, \$5000; Napavine, \$2500; Doty, \$5000.

Kellogg Scores Hit

Wallace, Ida., June 14.—(P. N. S.)—The town of Kellogg, Ida., today completed its campaign for Liberty loan bonds with a total subscription of \$300,000, which makes its subscription the largest in proportion to its size of any town in the state.

The Bunker Hill Mining company subscribed to \$200,000 and the balance was taken by miners.

Tacoma Exceeds Mark

Tacoma, Wash., June 14.—(U. P.)—Tacoma's quota of Liberty bonds has been exceeded by nearly \$100,000, but the committee in charge of the selling campaign announced today it would continue the work for a larger total. Bonds to the amount of \$2,283,800 had already been disposed of early today. Banks will remain open again tonight to receive subscriptions.

Roseburg Does Well

Roseburg, Or., June 14.—The total sales of Liberty bonds in Roseburg up to Wednesday evening amounted to \$45,050, with the prospect that the amount would be over \$50,000 by the closing of the subscription lists. The amounts sold by the different banks being as follows: Douglas National bank, \$17,850; First State and Savings bank, \$9500; Umpqua Valley bank, \$5000; Roseburg National bank, \$4400, while the Roseburg postoffice sold bonds to the amount of \$4500.

Klamath County Reports

Klamath Falls, Or., June 14.—Although all parts of Klamath county are responding to the call for Liberty bond subscriptions, Merrill in the southeastern part of the county is the only section which is doing its pro rata share in this matter. According to its bank deposits, the Merrill section should subscribe \$15,000 for the Liberty bonds and it has already purchased of this amount, \$12,700. A total

of nearly \$30,000 has now been subscribed in the district and it is hoped by the local Liberty loan committee to raise this to \$50,000.

Seattle Trying Hard

Seattle, June 14.—(I. N. S.)—Subscriptions to the Liberty loan at the closing of the banks today totaled \$1,252,160 of this city's share towards the allotment of \$3,200,000. Seattle fell short but a little yesterday of her "million-dollar day," but the loan committee expect today to reach that figure.

ROOSEVELT CHARGES PRO-GERMANS KEPT AMERICA UNPREPARED

German agitation of the last three years," he said.

Want No Division

"It would be impossible to estimate the damage done to the moral fibre of the country by peace at any price propaganda. At last, thank Heaven, we came to our senses," he said. "We have entered the war for the future of civilization, and it behooves us to bear ourselves like men. We are utterly unprepared, but we must fight with preparation and prepare as well as we can at this late date."

"There must be no division among our ranks," Roosevelt referring to German-Americans. "Any citizen of this country who uses his citizenship in the interest of some other country is a traitor and it is not merely our right but our duty to insist on this fact. I want to make it clear that I stand for the American who is in whole or part of German blood precisely as I do for every other American, no matter what his blood. I have German blood in me."

Pacifists Are Attacked

"In this country we must have but one flag, the American, but one language, the English language, and about all, but one loyalty, loyalty to the United States with no looking back to the various old world countries from which our ancestors came."

"But through political pressure the pacifists prevented us from preparing. They cared nothing for humanity, our national honor, or interest. All they asked was a peace that would permit us to put all four feet in the trough while we strove to distract attention from the squalid baseness of our materialism by the shrill clamor of a sham sentimentalism."

"Now when the fire is licking our walls instead of being able to put it out, we are still scrambling into our clothes."

BOGUS NOTE CAUSED DELICATE RELATIONS BETWEEN U. S.-JAPAN

consultation with Japan, though this government was not obligated to make such a consultation.

Later the true text of the note was published in Japan, dissipating the anger which the bogus note had aroused.

Realizing that the situation might develop unpleasantly if the misapprehension was not immediately corrected this government informed its embassy at Tokyo of the true statements, with instructions to inform the Japanese government about it. This has been done.

The Asahi printed the false note under a New York date line. Secret service men started tracing its origin today.

Japanese Mission Coming

Secretary Lansing declared today that "whatever misunderstanding has arisen was due solely to publication of the bogus note."

Ambassador Sato has had recent negotiations with Lansing, presumably on the basis of the Chinese situation, though Lansing said today that Sato had not taken up the note question directly with him.

Japan is sending a diplomatic mission to the United States, which will leave about July 1, it was officially stated today.

Storm of Criticism Aroused

Tokio, June 14.—(U. P.)—The action of Dr. Paul Reinsch, American minister to China, in presenting a note to the Peking government expressing the wish of the American government that harmony and order be restored in China has aroused a storm of criticism throughout Japan. It was officially announced today that Japan is making inquiries at Washington regarding the American action.

Japanese officials openly resent the presentation of the American note. The United Press was authoritatively told today that the United States should have consulted Japan before acting.

The advice of Dr. Reinsch, as transmitted in his note, is regarded here tantamount to interference in China's internal affairs, and it is declared to be a possible cause for future unpleasant relations between America and Japan.

"Suppose Japan would interfere in Mexico, where a situation similar to that in China exists," said one Japan authority. "America would certainly resent it."

It is declared here that Dr. Reinsch acted in opposition to the recognized American policy of non-interference with internal affairs of foreign countries.

in the land for which our fathers died," was its message.

Thousands crowded Independence square. They were not holiday makers. They represented the mass of the nation—its aspirations, its hopes, its determination to bring to a successful conclusion the death struggle between autocracy and democracy.

The bell—the relic of liberty, symbol of freedom—stood silent in Independence hall since 1835. Its brazen side was split. It was sore with age and tradition. Around its girth steel bands, typical of the unification and solidarity of these United States, entwined. It was sacrilege to ring it except in just cause.

Today that cause came and it was with reverence that Mayor Smith tapped it softly with a silver hammer. "Buy a Liberty bond" was the message of the bell. With its stroke, telephone bells shrilled, telegraph wires

hummed. The message had been carried to every red-blooded citizen of the United States.

Kansas City Struggling

Kansas City, Mo., June 14.—(I. N. S.)—Kansas City's Liberty loan committee is making a desperate struggle to bring in subscriptions. Every local newspaper today is carrying full page address ads, calling upon the public to buy bonds. Practically every business representative in the city is behind the campaign, in an effort to reach the city's allotment of \$20,000,000. To do this some eight million dollars must be raised before Friday noon. The tenth federal district announces subscriptions of \$50,230,000.

Cleveland Far Ahead

Cleveland, Ohio, June 14.—(I. N. S.)—Cleveland's Liberty bond quota total reached \$4,000,000 this afternoon, \$9,000,000 above its quota.

S. F. Is Still \$4,000,000 Short

San Francisco, June 14.—(P. N. S.)—San Francisco today has \$4,000,000 yet to raise to complete its \$42,000,000 allotment to the Liberty loan. Yesterday's drive, culminating in a monster mass meeting last night at which \$2,000,000 was pledged, brought in subscriptions totaling more than \$5,000,000.

Figures for the twelfth federal reserve district have not been given out but it is believed that the mighty efforts being put forth in every section today will result in a last minute rush of bond purchasers more than sufficient to complete the district's quota.
