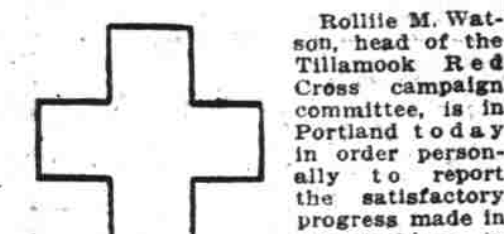


TILLAMOOK PROMISES MORE THAN HER \$5000 SHARE FOR RED CROSS

Rollie M. Watson Comes in
Auto Over What He Calls
"High Gear" Road.



Rollie M. Watson, head of the Tillamook Red Cross campaign committee, is in Portland today in order personally to report the satisfactory progress made in preparation for the \$5000 apportionment to Oregon in the great national \$100,000,000 drive. Mr. Watson came by automobile last night. "We have a high gear road between Portland and Tillamook now," he said. "In the place of the old steep Dolphin road we have a fine, water bound macadam road on easy grade, without toll. Portland auto parties can plan to go over to Tillamook from now on without any trouble. As for us, we can leave Tillamook in the morning, spend the best part of the day on the Columbia river highway and return that night. The only bad stretch of road is the 10 miles between Rex and Tigardville, and the state highway commission should choose it first for permanent improvement."

"As for our Red Cross campaign, we are going to over-subscribe our apportionment just as we over-subscribed the Liberty bonds. We have the help of the fraternal organizations, the ministerial association, the newspapers, the girls' honor guard, the Coast artillery and the Ladies' Civic league, in addition to the workers of the Tillamook Red Cross auxiliary."

Subscribers May Select Their Seats

Those who subscribed to the sustaining fund of the Portland Music Festival association may select their seats, beginning at 9 o'clock Friday morning, at Sherman, Clay & Co.'s. The privilege of prior reservations expires Saturday night.

The sale of seats to the general public will open next Monday morning at the same place, and will continue throughout the week. This sale will be limited to season tickets. In this connection, it is to be remembered that the lowest priced seats—those selling for 25 cents—are also reserved seats. Festival dates are Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 1, 6 and 7.

Pershing Guest of French President

Paris, June 14.—(U. P.)—Major General Pershing lunched today at Elysee Palace with President Poincare and other French notables. He was in conference with French war office leaders most of the day and his headquarters in the Hotel Clivier were a scene of constant activity. Tomorrow Pershing is to lunch with Marshal Joffre at the military club.

War Prohibition Bill Reported to Senate

Washington, June 14.—(U. P.)—The Gore "war prohibition bill" was favorably reported in the senate today. It prohibits the use of any perishable foods in the manufacture of intoxicants and empowers the president to stop the use of perishable foodstuffs in such manufacture. It also authorizes the president to commander for redistribution all spirits in bond.

Southern Heat May Keep Guard in North

Washington, June 14.—(U. P.)—The general staff is considering holding the middle western national guard regiments in their state mobilization camps until the hot weather in the south is passed. At present the movement toward the border is scheduled for about August 1, but army officials assert it would cause hardship to send men from the north into the south in the middle of summer.

On the duration of the present warm spell depends the flood conditions of the Willamette and Columbia rivers. Uniformly warm temperatures were reported all over the North Pacific section Wednesday and are expected to start all tributaries of the Columbia to rising at once. The river here had been dropping slowly and will probably not commence its rise again until Monday, according to the weather bureau. Portland had a temperature of 90 Wednesday, the highest of the year. It was slightly cooler today. The river now stands at 22.3 feet.

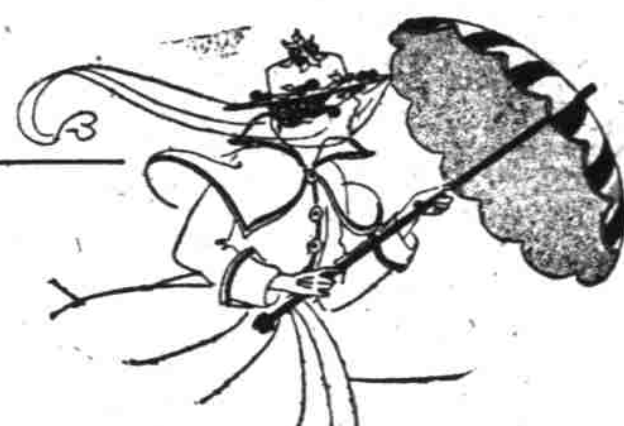
