25,000 Boys Await Chance Upon Farm Washington, June 15.—(I. N. S.)—California has 25,000 boys waiting to leave the farm. This means a wired Friday afternoon to the department of labor, which has organized the boys' working reserve. Professor B. H. Crockerham of the University of California, who has been appointed state director for the boys' reserve, stated that those 25,000 young men between 15 and 18 years of age are only awaiting the call.

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At St. Michael's and All Angels church last Sunday morning, the fifth anniversary of the Rev. T. F. Bowen as its vicar was observed. In his sermon, the Rev. Mr. Bowen reviewed the growth of St. Michael's during the five year period, showing a development from small beginnings to a work that overtaxes the capacity of the present church building and has created a demand for a new and much larger one.
