

FOUR OREGON CITIES MAY FORFEIT WATER PRIVILEGES TO STATE

Newberg, Bandon, Prineville
and Klamath Falls Fail to
Comply With Regulations.

NOTICE SERVED BY BOARD

Unless They Comply With Law by Next
Meeting, Permits Will Be Con-
sidered Under Rules.

Salem, Or., June 19.—As the state water board has been unable to get replies to queries addressed to the cities of Newberg, Bandon, Prineville and Klamath Falls, the board decided at its last meeting to give those cities until the next meeting of the board in which to inform the board as to the work being done under their permits to appropriate water for municipal purposes or the permits will be canceled. A statement given out by the board says: "The cities of Newberg, Bandon, Prineville and Klamath Falls are in danger of losing their water rights, owing to lack of showing that work is being prosecuted with reasonable diligence under their respective permits to appropriate water for municipal supply. Under the rules of the state water board, these permits are subject to cancellation, and at a meeting of the board on the sixteenth, the matter was taken up, and it was decided that, in order to give the cities every possible opportunity to perfect their rights, the cancellation would be postponed until the next meeting.

"The Newberg permit calls for the diversion of two second feet from Skelton Springs, the Bandon right covers five second feet from South Two-Mile creek, while Prineville wants to store 295 acre feet in Prineville reservoir, and divert three second feet from Marx creek and the reservoir. The Klamath Falls permit calls for a right, contemplating the use of over 15 second feet from the Aspen lake watershed.

"Repeated requests for information relative to construction work and use of water have been ignored by the municipalities, and unless some evidence of activity in connection with these appropriations is submitted before their next meeting, the water board will proceed to cancel the permits."

School Building Improving

Salem, Or., June 19.—Many rural school districts are taking advantage of the offer of J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of schools, to furnish them free of cost plans and specifications for rural school buildings. The result is that within a comparatively few years the rural schools of the state will be greatly improved in style of architecture, convenience of arrangement and ventilation and lighting, points out Mr. Churchill.

Superintendent Churchill has prepared a pamphlet which contains drawings, plans and specifications for one, two, three and four room buildings. In addition he has blue prints, showing the various designs and elevations of the buildings. These have been prepared by leading architects, and Mr. Churchill furnishes them, with an estimate of the cost of the building, to any rural school district which contemplates erecting a new school building.

Forest Fire Prevention Extended

Salem, Or., June 19.—With the arrival of dry weather, State Forester F. A. Elliott is perfecting his fire prevention and fire fighting forces throughout the forest areas of the state.

Twenty-three state fire wardens are now in the field. They will have supervision of the forest patrol work. Under their direction will be the force of men who will be employed by the various forest patrol associations. These associations now have men employed in making trails and performing other work which will aid in protecting the timber against fire.

No fires of any consequence have been reported thus far this season. The greatest danger is said to be in connection with the logging camps. As the closed season for starting fires began June 1, a number who have slashings to burn have obtained permits from the state forester.

Washington, June 19.—There is no shortage of labor in this country at the present time in any general industry, according to Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor.

In a letter to Representative Raker of California, made public today, Mr. Gompers declared, "there are many thousands of skilled mechanics who can be obtained for a decent living wage."

Skilled mechanics, he says, have been called for by various departments of the government, and when they responded they have not been employed, because of the lack of work.

"Trade unions," he added, "are willing to do their share. Thus far they have done more than their share. This service should be recognized and understood. There need be no concern with reference to apprentices. Trade unionists will be prepared to meet any emergency which may confront the country in the future. The trade unionists, however, will exert every effort to maintain standards and will oppose, to the very limit of their power, every endeavor to change or lower those conditions which it has taken so many years of toil to secure. Organized labor will do its full duty, but it will not consent to the confiscation of its achievements until such time as property itself is confiscated."
