

### GREAT BRITAIN HAS LOST 642 VESSELS IN DIVER CAMPAIGN

Total Tonnage Placed at Nearly 2,000,000 by Maritime Expert.

New York, June 21.—(U. P.)—Germany has sunk about 2,000,000 tons of British ships since the unlimited submarine warfare was declared February 1, according to figures cited today by a maritime expert, based on calculations from the official British lists of losses.

In the submarine campaign to date, the British have lost 642 vessels. Official figures available since March 4, give 236 British ships of more than 1000 tons sunk and 135 of less than that tonnage. From February 1 to 25 the size of the 171 vessels sunk was not officially given. Best information, however, estimated the division as 100 ships of more than 1000 tons and 71 below that figure.

This would make a total of 436 large vessels sunk and 206 smaller ones.

The average of the 436 large vessels was said by a maritime expert today to be about 4000 tons; that of the smaller 800 tons. This would give the total tonnage of ships of more than 1000 tons thus destroyed as 1,744,000 tons and that of the smaller 164,800—a grand total of 1,908,800 tons.

The figures do not include sinkings of French, Italian, American or other vessels than British.

### Locomotive Boiler Explodes; Three Die

Pittsburg, Pa., June 21.—(I. N. S.)—Two men were instantly killed and a third died of his injuries when the boiler of a freight locomotive standing on a siding of the Pittsburg, Chartiers & Younglough railway, near here, exploded with terrific force early today.

Warren Carlyle, engineer, and Brake-man Walker, Allenworth, both of Pittsburg, were in the cab. Their dead bodies were hurled several hundred feet.

### Man Confesses Plot; Believed to Be Insane

Knoxville, Tenn., June 21.—(I. N. S.)—W. S. Clark, claiming New York as his home, today confessed to police his participation in a plot to dynamite troop bearing trains and bridges of military importance.

Clark was arrested in connection with the explosion May 8 in the munitions plant of the federal dynamite corporation at Kingsport.

Police say Clark tried to blow up the Johns Hopkins hospital at Baltimore while a patient there. They believe he is insane.

### 'ARTISTS' NOT TO BE EXEMPTED IN DRAFT, WHATEVER THEIR LINE

Baseball Players, Actors, Authors and Painters Are All Subject to Call.

Washington, June 21.—(U. P.)—Baseball players, artists, actors and authors must take their chances with the other 9,500,000 men in the great selective draft lottery. There are no provisions for their exemption from military service in the exemption regulations, it became definitely known today.

Unless they are "indispensable" and serve to contribute to the "maintenance of the national interest in the emergency," such men will be subject to draft.

That is the answer inquirers are getting to questions about men in these classes.

**Baseball Players Not Exempt**  
Several managers of baseball teams have asked the war department

whether their players will be subject to conscription.

An inquiry from an artists' colony in Greenwich Village, N. Y., was answered by pointing out that practically all of France's famous artists are in the trenches.

Big, hard callouses on the hands will be one of the contributing causes for exemption from military service for farmers. Among other things the appellate exemption boards will take into consideration the length of time certain "farmers" have been tilling the soil. Would be "slackers" by hundreds are fleeing big cities to work on farms, hoping thereby to be classed as farmers and escape military service.

**'Slackers' Are Getting Busy**  
Reports to this effect to the war department, in some cases giving names, were turned over to the department of justice. Some of the "shirkers" offered to work during the summer for practically nothing but board and room. This aroused the suspicion of the farmers, who reported the unusual situation to the war department. The subterfuges of these self-made farmers will be of little avail.

Most of the tips so far on would-be slackers have come from New York, Chicago, Pittsburg and Detroit.

**Digby Bell, Actor, Dies**  
New York, June 21.—(I. N. S.)—Digby Valentine Bell, actor, died Wednesday at a private sanitarium in this city. He was 63 years of age and was one of the best known actors on the American stage. He had of late appeared in vaudeville. He was born in Milwaukee. He went to Italy to study and made his American debut in 1874 as a concert singer.

### Unitarian Pastor Is Given Notice to Quit

Attack on Monroe Doctrine Costs Rev. Dr. Francis Watry His Position—May Start Rival Congregation.

Los Angeles, June 21.—(P. N. S.)—Rev. Dr. Francis Watry, pastor of the Unitarian church of Long Beach, has been ousted by the majority members of his congregation for alleged un-patriotic utterances.

Fourteen members of the church last night voted that Dr. Watry's usefulness as their pastor ceased when he declared from the pulpit that the "Monroe doctrine was not worth a snap of the finger." He was given 60 days to terminate his pastorate.

Backed by 11 members of the congregation, the preacher says he will start a rival church if forced to get out.

### One Dead, 2 Dying As Result of Crash

San Bernardino, Cal., June 21.—(U. P.)—One man was instantly killed, two are dying and eight are seriously injured, two probably fatally, as a result of a collision near here between a motorcycle and three Southern Pacific bandcars Wednesday.

Pablo Cruz, aged 30, was decapitated when the motorcycle ridden by Guy Dart, a high school boy, crashed into the bandcar at Loma Linda crossing. Dart was slightly injured.

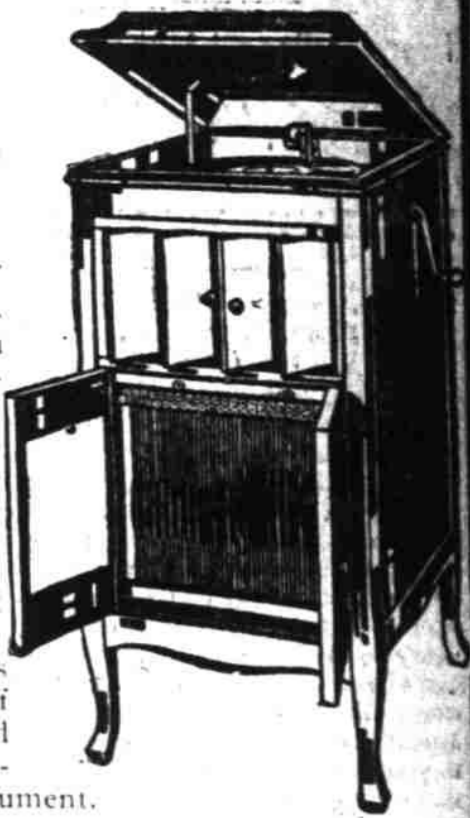

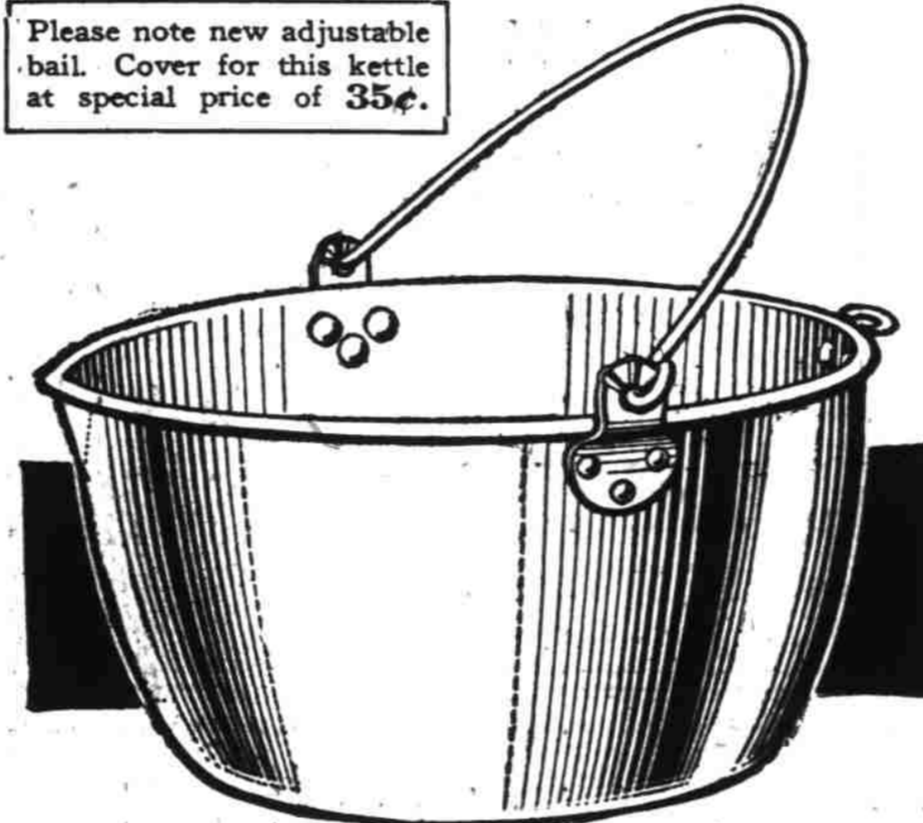
