

STATE REPORTS SHOW
\$272,190.58 RAISED
FOR RED CROSS FUND

From Harney County Comes Word That Burns to Date Has Pledged \$2000.

CORVALLIS GIVES \$7000

Klamath Falls in Three Days Has Raised \$425.10 and Carlton Hopes to Double Its Quota.

Oregon's Red Cross total today from the state outside of Portland stood at \$272,190.58. The total to be raised outside of Portland is \$100,000.

From away out in the big stock-raising county of Harney came the report that the Harney County Board of Health, under the leadership of Chairman H. L. Corbett and State Campaign Manager L. G. Nichols have been awaiting.

Corvallis reports \$7000 in hands, Thursday noon, was the report from Victor P. Moses of Corvallis as the representation of Benton county which has been among the list of "missing counties."

Forest Grove is still climbing upward. "Six thousand five hundred, with several thousands more," was the report from R. J. Simpson, Medford has its hands full. William G. Tait, general chairman, telegraphed: "Subscriptions are coming in so fast that we cannot give you accurate figures on the Medford district, but we will undoubtedly end the week's work with our allotment over-subscribed."

Klamath Falls had a cheerful statement to make over the telephone wire. "First day, \$143.75," reported H. D. Mortenson, "second day, \$141.75, third day, \$143.15. Total at end of third day, \$428.65. Places outside Klamath Falls in Klamath county very slow in reporting."

Carlton Hopes to Double Quota

W. B. Dennis of Carlton is convinced that the Yamhill county town will over-subscribe its allotment 100 per cent, according to a letter which he has written Campaign Manager Nichols.

Ontario, Malheur county's bustling community, is giving a good account. "C. B. Boyer telegraphed: 'We are up to \$4000. Everything working fine. Nyssa is just getting started. We are working for Red Cross results.'"

Brownsville Gathers Cash

Brownsville, Or., June 22.—Since Monday the Red Cross drive has been on in Brownsville and it is believed that the full quota will be subscribed by Saturday. The outlying districts

of Plainview, Crawfordville and Holley have been organized by Brownsville men, led by W. P. Elmore, and house to house canvassers are now at work. At Holley, the quota has already been over-subscribed.

At Brownsville the old pioneers of Linn county are holding their annual reunion and the Red Cross canvassers are taking advantage of the crowds to glean many a dollar. President Kerr of O. A. C. has addressed the meeting and Friday Reverend Hinson of Portland will speak.

Baker City Passes Mark

Baker, Or., June 22.—The total Red Cross subscriptions in the city of Baker Thursday passed the apportionment of \$12,000, committees at the noon luncheon reporting \$12,356.

In Baker county the total is close to the apportionment of \$20,000, totals reported showing \$18,401, with many communities not included.

Grant county has passed the halfway mark of the \$5000 apportionment, and solicitors sent word the county will over-subscribe.

Pioneers Make Up Quota

Ridgefield, Wash., June 22.—Ridgefield's campaign to raise the allotment of the Red Cross fund for this part of Clark county has been successful. The \$500 apportionment for Ridgefield and rural districts was reached and over-subscribed Thursday morning when Alonzo A. Knox, one of the oldest pioneers here, contributed \$50 in gold, and another, J. Leslie Packard, a \$25 check.

Dallas Adds \$1000

Dallas, Or., June 22.—At least another thousand dollars was added to the Red Cross funds from Polk county Thursday in voluntary subscriptions. Ralph E. Williams, who headed the Dallas subscription list with \$1000 Wednesday phoned from Portland that he would raise his subscription to \$250.

Eugene \$3000 Ahead

Eugene, Or., June 22.—Eugene's subscription to the Red Cross fund has passed the \$12,000 mark. Ten thousand dollars was the amount allotted to this city. The committee set out to secure \$15,000 or more, and the members believe they will reach the mark. The rural committees are doing as well in proportion.

Mrs. Eddy Dies at Baker

Baker, Or., June 22.—Mrs. Ida Eddy, 49 years old, a resident of Bridgeport, died at a local hospital Thursday morning. She leaves four sons, one daughter and several grandchildren and sisters. She was a native of Kansas, but had lived in Oregon nearly all her life.

City and County Give Funds

Roseburg, Or., June 22.—At a special meeting held Thursday the Roseburg city council voted to donate \$250 to the Red Cross campaign. The county court gave the committee a warrant for \$200 as a contribution from Douglas county.

The subscription list for Douglas county has now reached the \$500 mark.

Bend Meets Red Cross Quota

Bend, Or., June 22.—Bend's quota of the Red Cross fund for the state of Oregon has virtually been met, according to a report made by the committee last evening. The first day's work netted \$521. The employees of the mill companies are giving one dollar each to the cause. The Sherrill-Hixson company gave \$1000 and will match dollar for dollar any sum the employees give more than this amount. A subscription list will be taken upon the part of the Brooks-Seaman Lumber company, which gave \$750.

Marion Towns Do Well

Woodburn, Or., June 22.—Woodburn, Gervais and Hubbard will not disappoint those expecting \$4000 from the district in the Red Cross drive. After two days with the field partly covered, \$2200 has been subscribed toward the Red Cross fund. Woodburn has \$1430, Gervais \$523 and Hubbard \$200.

Centralia Printers Swell Fund

Centralia, Wash., June 22.—Centralia's total subscription to the Red Cross fund Thursday noon had reached \$10,290. At the beginning of the campaign the city's allotment was \$8000. Wednesday the executive committee increased its goal to \$12,000, and indications are that even this figure will be exceeded.

Indications are that the Southwest Washington district will double its allotment. Clarke county yesterday had over-subscribed \$12,000.

The local typographical union Wednesday night showed its patriotism by donating a banquet to the Red Cross.

Chehalis Raises Limit

Chehalis, Wash., June 22.—At the Red Cross luncheon held at headquarters, auto owners volunteered enough cars

to take the Chehalis band to Littell, Dryad, Doty and Pe Ell last night to aid in raising the Red Cross funds. The band left here at 5 o'clock in the evening and played in Pe Ell, Dryad and Littell, where meetings were held. Indications last night pointed to subscription in Chehalis nearer to \$14,000 than the \$8000 allotted to this city. Doty on the branch line has far over-subscribed its allotment.

Amity Responding Promptly

Amity, Or., June 22.—Through the efforts of Harry Huddleston, captain, and assisted by Helen Ferguson, W. H. Tovey, Arthur Jones, Earl LeMaster, Pearl Martin, Eugene Strout, Lucy Patty, William Patty, Mrs. C. G. Mack, Florence Stuffer and Mrs. William Loop, Amity and vicinity have subscribed \$1097.75 for the Red Cross fund as reported. The \$1100 mark set as Amity's total will be over-subscribed by \$400, is the belief at the present time, as complete reports have not been received from all local headquarters from the farming districts.

Lebanon Responded Liberally

Lebanon, Or., June 22.—Liberally response is being made to the local Red Cross committee's campaign for funds, and this locality will more than meet its allotment.

Cove Exceeds Allotment

Cove, Or., June 22.—Though only \$750 dollars was apportioned as Cove's share of the Red Cross campaign, the committee in a short time received pledges of \$1200.

Seattle Nears Goal

Seattle, June 22.—(P. N. S.)—Total subscriptions to the Red Cross toward Seattle's allotment of \$300,000 reached \$219,741.50 here at the opening of the campaign this morning. Little doubt is felt but that Seattle will over-subscribe her figure.

Shoshone Reaches Goal

Wallace, Idaho, June 22.—(I. N. S.)—Shoshone county's quota to the Red Cross fund, \$50,000, was reached today. It is expected the final contribution will reach \$60,000.

Newport Needs Cleansing, Says Naval Official

ly closed—boarded up—at a time during March and April when many boys from comfortable homes throughout the nation were forced to walk the streets night and day.

Many Homes Remain Locked

Many of these homes remained locked, barred and boarded up during the winter months they might have afforded habitation for fine, clean boys from good families whose patriotic response to the call for volunteers concentrated them here. Instead of these unoccupied homes, the recruits were housed in "pup" tents, in hotel corridors or on the bare boards of the army and other public buildings.

Governor R. Livingston Beekman summed up the general view of the elect in Newport today when he explained:

"I would not consider it surprising that the owner of a fine home would not wish to turn it over to a lot of raw recruits."

Says People Are Generous

"It's true that a large number of wealthy Newporters' summer cottages remain closed and have not been offered to the recruits—but you must remember that in most instances owners live far away and come here only in summer."

"However, the townspeople have been exceedingly generous, and many homes have been thrown open to the recruits."

Mrs. Hamilton Fish Webster, an executive officer of the Newport Red Cross, agreed in part with the governor, and added that she knew of no widespread suffering in Newport.

"There has been an occasional case of a recruit who rushed here precipitately without money, and suffered because the government was unable to help him and because he had been too proud to ask for help," she explained.

"But in the main, thanks to the townspeople, the Red Cross and the Y. M. C. A. I know of no recruits who have gone homeless or hungry in Newport."

"As to the moral condition of Newport, despite the violent protestations of the governor and the mayor, they are bad."

Bootleggers Declared Promiscuous

Newport admittedly has four regular houses of prostitution in operation. There are many walking bootleggers, who make a specialty of supplying recruits. Some townspeople do not hesitate to say that there are dozens of disreputable houses sandwiched among the exclusive cottages of Newport's social elite. And that naval guards stationed to keep recruits away seem to "go blind" when naval men walk in.

"The average individual cases of vice demanding attention every day," said Mayor Burdick, but the general situation is not bad."

Authority on Birds Will Make Speech

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SENATOR BORAH HAS MEASURE TO ADD TO PRICE FIXING POWER

Would Put Duty on Federal Trade Commission Under NECESSARIES CONSIDERED

Lever Food Bill Is Most Momentous Measure Ever Reported to House—Meets Upon War Power.

Approval of Bill Forecasted

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He would have the price fixing apply to steel, coal, oil, farm implements, fertilizer, meats, bread, flour, and such other foods as the president may stipulate in a proclamation, and also articles of clothing commonly worn by wage earners and farm laborers.

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Bill Rests Upon War Power

The bill rests upon the war power and is limited in operation to the period of the war, or for not more than one year after the war closes. A summary of the more important sections of the bill follows:

Establishes government control of necessities, and declares all processes, methods and activities connected with them to be affected by a public interest.

Authorizes the licensing of any business of importance, exportation, manufacture or distribution of necessities to prevent uncommercial manufacture or unequal distribution, exempting farmers as to the products of their lands, retailers and common carriers.

Hoarding is prohibited under heavy penalties, and is carefully defined, so that no one may be permitted to hold necessities in excess of reasonable requirements of consumption or trade, accumulation of farm products by the growers being exempted. Hoarded commodities may be seized and sold, net proceeds being paid over to the owner.

Heavy penalties are imposed for willful destruction of food or feed stuffs for the purpose of enhancing prices or restricting supply.

Authorities are given to purchase or provide for production, manufacture, storage and sale of necessities, or to requisition and store them, fixing reasonable prices to be paid such prices to be subject to review in the courts.

May Take Over Properties

If unable to secure an adequate supply by other means, the president may take over and operate any mine, factory or other plant in which necessities are produced or produced, upon payment of just compensation, reviewable in court.

Authority is conferred to issue regulations or to prohibit operation of exchanges on which necessities are dealt in order to prevent undue fluctuation, manipulation and misleading market quotations.

Upon finding the emergency requires, the president may fix a reasonable guaranteed price to assure the producer a reasonable profit. Authority is given over duties on imports to protect the government in this guaranty, and products produced under it may be purchased, used or sold.

Prohibition Up to President

The prohibition question, so far as the use of certain liquors is involved, is passed up to the president, he being given the authority to limit or prohibit the use of foodstuffs for such purposes or to limit the alcoholic content of any beverage.

The president is authorized to accept the gratuitous services of persons and agencies assisting to carry out the act, and to utilize all departments of the government.

Severe penalties are fixed for violations all along the line. The bill appropriates \$2,500,000 for purely administrative expenses, and carries \$150,000,000 for the work of its general provisions of food control.

Early Passage Predicted

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According to program the house will pass the measure tomorrow. It goes to the senate agriculture committee Monday. There some portions will be eliminated. It will be reported to the senate and be substituted for the upper house measure now being debated. Leaders believed today that disappearance of opposition to the measure in the house forecast a similar change in the senate. It was predicted that passage of the bill by both houses by July 1, as desired by President Wilson, is not a remote possibility. The principal fight in the house will come over the question of nationwide prohibition.

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
