

JULY 4 CELEBRATION FAREWELL TO STATE TROOPS IS PROPOSAL

Details Are to Be Worked Out
at Meeting to Be Held in
City Hall This Afternoon.

FUNDS WILL BE NEEDED

County Finds It Will Not Be Able to
Appropriate for Celebration—Hat
May Be Passed.

Portland's Fourth of July celebration will be the nature of a farewell to the Oregon National Guard, according to tentative arrangements made by those in charge of plans for the celebration. Details are to be worked out at a meeting to be held in the city hall this afternoon.

It is proposed to bring the Oregon troops to Portland to participate in a big military parade, possibly a military tournament and a general entertainment including street dancing and sports.

County Not Able to Aid
Where the funds are to come from for the celebration has given the committee concern, however, inasmuch as the county commissioners learned this morning of legal obstacles in the way of appropriating \$500. They had planned to appropriate this money today and with the \$500 appropriated by the city and the \$400 on hand a total of \$1400 would be available.

To bring the soldiers here for the day, feed them and award them prizes for their mess funds would cost considerably more than \$900, the only money available if the county commissioners are unable to appropriate \$500.

The committee meeting this afternoon may decide to open a popular subscription list to secure all the funds possible to give the soldiers a rousing farewell.

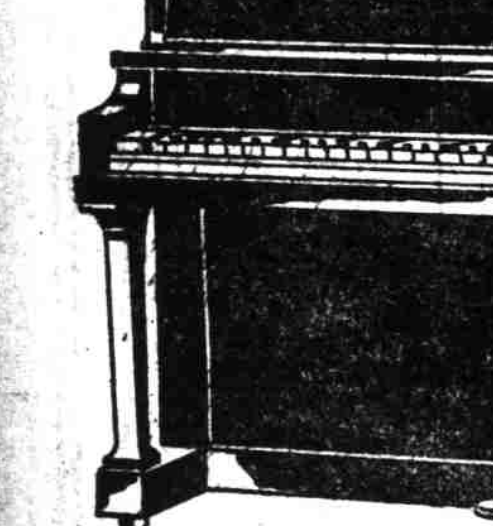
Vancouver Sends Invitation
The committee in charge of the celebration at Vancouver, Wash., met with the Fourth of July committee here Thursday afternoon in an endeavor to have Portland's celebration held jointly in Vancouver, but those of the local committee thought that it was preferable to provide a farewell for the state troops.

City and County to Patrol Waterfront

A plan to increase the facilities for patrolling the waterfront in the city limits is being worked out jointly by Harbormaster Speier and Sheriff Hurlburt. The plan, when completed, will be presented to the authorities of both the city and the county for their approval.

Owing to the war conditions and increased activity on the waterfront, the need for more protection in the way of equipment for patrol work has become advisable and the scheme for having the sheriff's office cooperate with the harbor patrol was presented to the county commissioners who recommended that the details be worked out by both departments.

He found the father lying on the bed with both arms broken, the result of an accident in the woods Thursday. The children had just recovered from the measles. The larder was only slenderly supplied.

"We have a brother who is in the Canadian army," declared the woman.

"You will not subscribe to this fund," declared the solicitor.

He called his team captain, who is the president of a prominent social club.

Within half an hour an automobile was bound towards that house, the larder was refilled and a fat gold piece was in the woman's purse.

Besides \$5 was credited to that family's contribution to the Red Cross fund.

Mysterious Fall From Window Kills

Albert Bross, 35 years old, a bricklayer, died at Good Samaritan hospital this morning as the result of a fall from the second story window of the Grand Union hotel at Union avenue and East Burnside street, shortly after 2 o'clock this morning.

The manner in which Bross fell from the window is not known, as no witnesses to the accident have appeared. Bross had been in the city only a few weeks and was working on the Benson Polytechnic school, he came from Idaho Falls, where his wife lives.

A fracture of the skull caused his death. The body was taken in charge by the coroner and an inquest will be held this evening.

Oats and Barley as Crop Are Abandoned

Salina, Kans., June 22.—(I. N. S.)—Reports from western Kansas say oats and barley fields have been abandoned for a crop and farmers are pasturing the fields. There is said to be a large acreage and rain two weeks ago would have made the largest crop of both cereals in the history of the west half of the state.

FRED FOLEY IDENTIFIES WONG WENG TUENG AS JOSEPH GUE'S SLAYER

Witness of Tong Shooting
Points Out Defendant as
He Sits in Court Room.

ATTORNEYS OFTEN CLASH

Verbal Combats Between Dan J. Malarky and Robert Maguire Bring Reprimand.

A second positive identification of Wong Weng Tueng as the Chinese who shot and killed Joseph Gue the evening of March 27 was made this morning by Fred Foley, witness for the state in the trial of Tueng for Gue's murder.

Foley, who is an employee of the Northwest Steel company, testified to having been loitering in the vicinity of the shooting 15 or 20 minutes prior to its happening. He pointed out the prisoner in court as the man whom he had seen sitting in an automobile shortly before the shooting. Both he and also as the man whom he saw and also as the man whom he saw machine after firing a number of shots from a revolver.

His testimony conflicts with that of Tony Marovich, another witness for the state, who also positively identified Tueng as the man who had done the shooting. Marovich was the driver of the murdered man's car and testified Thursday that he saw Tueng on the sidewalk before the shooting and that either two Chinese were involved from that direction.

Foley's testimony that Tueng shot from the street side would indicate that either two Chinese were involved in the shooting. Both attorneys were repeatedly censured by the court for their personal brawls which at times became extremely heated.

THREAT TO KILL ALLEGED

Joseph C. O'Gorman Arrested on Complaint of Bill Collector.

Joseph C. O'Gorman, secretary and manager of the Baby Ko-rai company, was arrested Wednesday night by Deputy Constable DeLong on a warrant charging him with assault. The arrest was made following the charge laid before the district attorney's office by George G. Baird, collector for the Medical Protective association, that O'Gorman had threatened to kill him with a revolver when he had called on him to collect a bill.

Irvine, according to his version of the story, called on O'Gorman Wednesday afternoon at the offices of the Baby Ko-rai company at Columbia boulevard and Derby street and presented a bill for \$84.50, which he says the latter has owed since 1913. Thereupon O'Gorman attacked him, he says, and when repulsed rushed to his desk, secured a revolver, which he pointed at the collector, threatening to kill him. While in the act of pointing the revolver at Baird, an expressman, came into the office, and O'Gorman put the gun away.

A check for \$250 cash bail was given at the constable's office by J. S. O'Gorman, son of the prisoner.

DIVORCE MILL IS BUSY

Complaints Cover Wide Field of Alleged Domestic Wrongs.

Mrs. Millie Carter in a suit for divorce charges A. C. Carter with being drunk continuously for two years. Abuse and threats with a gun are some of the remaining acts recited in the complaint.

Cruelty is charged by Nina Flick against R. C. Flick, to whom she says she was married in 1911, and on that ground asks a divorce, \$40 a month alimony and the custody of their two children.

Caterina Anzillotti was married to A. Anzillotti in 1912 and according to her complaint for divorce is tired of her side of the bargain. She asks for divorce and \$30 a month.

SEARCH WARRANT ISSUED

A search warrant issued at the instance of the district attorney's office was turned over to Constable Petersen Thursday to compel the Reliable Loan office at Third and Alder streets to return a watch belonging to J. E. Campion, an employee of M. S. S. & Co.

Campion says the watch was stolen from him June 15, while he was playing baseball at Columbia Park. A search of the pawnbrokers brought it to light at the store of the Reliable Loan office. Upon their refusal to deliver it to him, Campion reported the matter to the district attorney.

Fred Pape Promoted By Port Commission

Fred Pape, superintending mechanical engineer of the Port of Portland commission, is to step up as a result of the resignation Thursday of E. W. Wright, general manager of the commission.

Pape will be known as general superintendent and will look after all operations, the committees of the Port attending to the general management. Pape's salary was raised by the commission from \$225 a month to \$300, while John Patrik Doyle, secretary of the commission, was raised from \$175 to \$200.

The commission discussed the proposed deepening of the channel from Ross Island to Milwaukee.

Co. B Engineers Meet Tonight
Company B of the Oregon National Guard engineers will meet tonight in the Armory for inspection by the adjutant general. The acceptance of this unit will mark the completion of the mustering in of the engineer battalion, as Companies A and B have both been accepted in state service and Company A is now in federal service.

Engineers Need 30 More
Company E, Eighth reserve engineering corps, is in need of about 30 more men to bring it up to its full quota. Thirty bridge and track men are needed, as well as one tailor, one barber and two steam drill men. The company expects to leave in a few days for meritoric lake training camp.

Auxiliary Raises Fund for Engineers

More than 100 relatives and friends of the boys in company A, engineers, of the O. N. G., met Thursday evening, as the result of the call issued by the women's auxiliary of the company. The members pledged to their share in making the life of the boys easier, both at home and abroad, and voted a monthly tax of 10 cents toward this. More than \$28 was paid into the treasury.

The women will meet to sew for the boys. The first meeting will be on next Wednesday at 2 o'clock on the eighth floor of Lipman-Wolfe building. The regular monthly business meetings will be held at the library the first Thursday of each month. Captain Keating of the British army addressed the meeting.

\$100,000,000 MARK WILL BE PASSED BY RED CROSS WORKERS

It Is Expected More Than
\$75,000,000 Will Be Sub-
scribed by Tonight.

Washington, June 22.—(U. P.)—The \$100,000,000 mark originally fixed in the national Red Cross campaign will be greatly exceeded by Monday night, if the present rate of returns continues.

The \$75,000,000 stage was confidently expected to be passed today. Director Henry P. Davidson flashed the word today to local leaders throughout the country:

"Make the campaign not only a success, but a super-success."

By the time Miss Katherine Stinson brings Buffalo's checks by aeroplane tomorrow, leaders of the subscription drive expect to have the hundred million pledged, and will call on the country for a large over-subscription on Monday.

Miss Stinson was scheduled to leave Buffalo today in her new flyer. With good luck the aviatrice will reach Washington at 4:30 tomorrow afternoon.

She plans to make stops en route at Albany, Governor's Island and Philadelphia.

Cleveland is the first large "200 per cent" city, and passed its original allotment of \$2,500,000 on a drive to double this figure.

Many smaller cities, including Worcester, Mass., and Wilmington, Del., are out to treble their quotas.

The north central division held a safe lead in the race by districts, with nearly \$15,000,000 reported so far. New York city alone has passed the \$27,000,000 mark.

S. F. Has Given \$610,435

San Francisco, Cal., June 22.—(U. P.)—San Francisco has contributed \$137,317 to the Red Cross during the past 24 hours, making her total contributions since Monday \$610,435. The climax of the local seven day campaign comes tonight at a big mass meeting at the Auditorium.

MARGARET C. BALL, A RESIDENT OF OREGON FOR 53 YEARS, DIES

When Girl of 19, She Crossed
Plains With Her Parents
to Washington County.

Mrs. Margaret C. Ball, widow of Chauncey Ball and a resident of Oregon for 53 years, died this morning of paralysis at her home, 109 East Forty-seventh street north.

Mrs. Ball was born in Cedar county, Mo., November 12, 1842. Her parents were Josiah and Pamela Edwards. While a young girl she moved to Brownsville, Neb., with her parents, where she lived until she was 19. In 1861, with her family and a group of friends, she emigrated westward over the old Oregon trail. The trip took six months, and was made with horses and oxen. The Edwards family stopped in Washington county.

Margaret Edwards moved to Portland and was married to Chauncey Ball at Oregon City by Rev. P. S. Knight, August 13, 1865. Mr. and Mrs. Ball lived in Portland until 1876, when they moved to the Mount Tabor district, then outside the city, buying a nine acre tract. Mrs. Ball lived there during the 41 years since.

Mrs. Ball is survived by five children: Henry C. Ball of Cheshire, Or., and Elwood J. Ball, Clark H. Ball, Mildred R. Ball and Mrs. Laura Macdonald of Portland. Mrs. Ball was a member of the Second Baptist church, East Twentieth and Ankeny streets.

The funeral will be held Saturday afternoon.

W. S. BEEBE DIED TODAY

Timber Operator Was Stricken
With Apoplexy Thursday.

W. S. Beebe, 62 years old, a timber operator with offices in the Beck building, died at St. Vincent's hospital early this morning after suffering a stroke of apoplexy.

Mr. Beebe was stricken Thursday afternoon while on his way to work, and sent to the emergency hospital by Motorcycle Patrolmen Schaffer and Thompson. He was later removed to St. Vincent's hospital, where he died without regaining consciousness.

Mr. Beebe is survived by his widow, Mrs. Kate Beebe, and three children, none of whom is living in Portland. He resided at 5416 Forty-second street southeast. For the past 20 years he had been active in timber operations in Oregon and came from his native state of New York in 1886. The funeral will be held in Oregon City next Sunday morning. Seventy-five prizes were awarded.

Two Girls and Two Young Men Are Detained by Police, After Being Picked Up in St. Johns Early.
