

DRAFT APPEAL BOARD IN EACH DISTRICT TO HAVE LABOR MEMBER

Recognized Leaders in Communities to Be Named—More Local Boards Named

Washington, June 25.—(U. P.)—The laboring man of the nation will have a "friend at court" on the appellate exemption boards that sift out the men for America's armies. It was learned today.

On each of the district boards that hear exemption claims for occupational reasons there will be one representative of the laboring man—in most cases a recognized leader of organized labor in the community.

In response to urgent appeals from national labor men the war department today decided to give organized labor representation on each of the higher tribunals.

Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor and a member of the labor committee of the advisory board of the Council of National Defense, has submitted a list of nominations of prominent local labor leaders to the appellate tribunals.

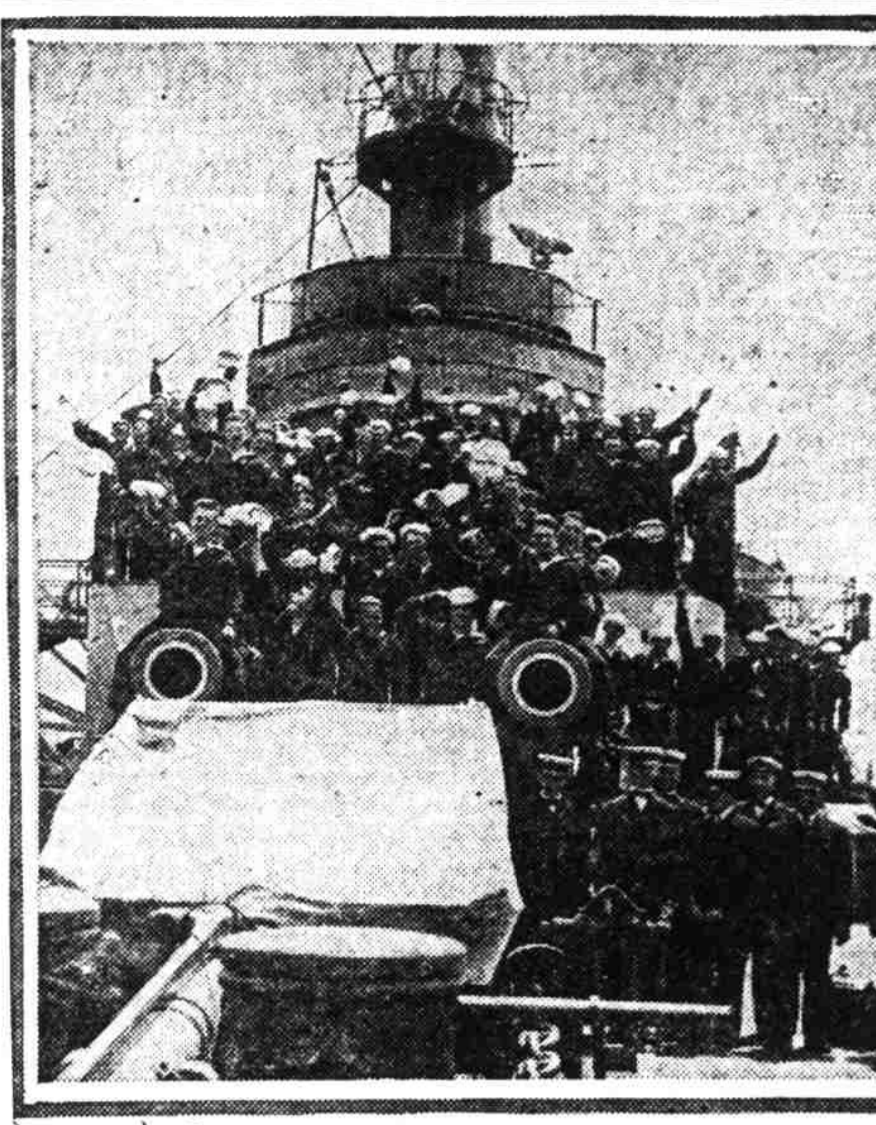

SINKING OF ARGENTINE STEAMER BY U-BOAT BRINGS BREAK CLOSE

Official Admission Made That Attack on Toro is Considered Serious.

Buenos Aires, June 25.—(U. P.)—Sinking by a German submarine of the Argentine steamer Toro was officially admitted today to have brought Argentina very close to severance of diplomatic relations with Germany.

Request for full official details of the attack, the treatment of the Argentine crew and the recovery of the survivors, was made through the Argentine minister at Madrid today. The Toro was a vessel of 114 tons.
