DRAFT APPEAL BOARD IN EACH DISTRICT TO HAVE LABOR MEMBER

Recognized Leaders in Communities to Be Named-More Local Boards Named

Washington, June 26 .- (II. P.) -The laboring man of the nation will have a "friend at court" on the appellate exemption boards that sift out the men for America's armies, it was learned today.

On each of the district boards that hear exemption claims for occupational reasons there will become representative of the laboring man-in most cases a recognized leader of organized labor in the community,

In response to urgent appeals from national labor men the war depart-ment today decided to give organized labor representation on each of the higher tribunals.

Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor and a member of the labor committee of the advisory board of the Council of National Defense has submitted a list of nominations of prominent local labor leaders to the appellate tribunals The list contains the name of several acceptable men in each federal judicial district. Other haders of labor have sent their suggestions.

With the exception of Maryland and Wisconsin, the personnel of the local exemption bounds of the entire country was today complete. Telegrams to the governors carried the final draft of the lower boards.


