

LABOR COMMISSIONER TO HELP FARMERS GET MEN TO GATHER CROPS

Granges and Unions of State
Are Asked for Information
as to Needs for Harvest.

COOPERATION IS WANTED

Plan is to Supply All Workmen Re-
quired at No Expense to Agri-
culturists or Employers.

Salem, June 27.—By enlisting the cooperation of the various granges and farmers' unions in the state in supplying information, State Labor Commissioner O. P. Hoff is taking steps to help secure needed farm labor for caring for the crops soon to be harvested. "This department is working in cooperation with the employment agencies of the state, including the public employment bureau of Portland and the United States employment service, to supply the farmers with help free of charge," says Commissioner Hoff in a letter, with a list of questions as to crop acreage and conditions, which he is sending to the secretaries of granges and unions.

"The bureau of labor is endeavoring, through the cooperation of the secretaries of the local or subordinate granges and the farmers' unions, to secure first hand information as to the conditions of growing crops, beginning and the length of the harvest season for the various crops, need of help in the different farming sections and communities of the state and such other data as will be of aid in securing the necessary help to insure a successful harvest." With this information in hand, Commissioner Hoff expects to be able to connect all those who want work with a job, without cost to themselves or to the farmers.

Lease of Lakes Is Wanted

Salem, June 27.—The City Safety Deposit company of Omaha, Neb., has written to Secretary of State Elliott asking if there might be opportunity to lease from the state Summer and Albert lakes, in Lake county, for the purpose of extracting potassium salts from the waters of the lakes. The inquiry will be referred to the state land board at its next meeting. This brings to attention again the old lease executed by the state land board to Jason C. Moore, who assigned the lease to the Pacific Chemical company. The lease has long since expired, but it has never been cancelled by the state land board because of the opposition of Governor Withycombe and State Treasurer Kay.

Many extensions had been made on the lease and on October 3, 1916, Moore asked for another extension, which was granted with the understanding between a majority of the land board that unless steps were taken to carry out the provisions of the lease no further extensions would be granted. The extension ran to December 16, 1916, on condition that the lessee carry out his agreement to have the board \$25,000 surety bond or acceptable securities in that amount in lieu of the \$10,000 which was deposited when the lease was first made.

Nothing was done and when December came, Secretary of State Elliott endeavored to get the board to cancel the lease, but Withycombe and Kay declined to take action, and the matter has been dragging along since. The principal work in his new position will be in connection with crossings of railroads and highways under the new law enacted for the purpose of eliminating grade crossings wherever possible.

Railroad Does Losing Business

Salem, June 27.—The Willamette Valley Southern Railway company, which operates a line from Oregon City to Mount Angel, did a losing business in 1916, according to the company's annual report filed with the public service commission. Operating revenues for the year amounted to \$62,166, while operating expenses ran up to \$69,227. After taxes and interest and other items were paid the total loss for the year amounted to \$6,457.

Rural Credit Bonds Urged

Salem, June 27.—Mrs. O. C. Cardwell, master of Eastern Star grange at Bend, has written to the state land board, urging that the state rural credit bonds be pushed ahead of the \$6,000,000 road bonds on the grounds of patriotism. She asserts patriotism demands that rural credit funds be provided to aid the farmers in increasing their tillable acreage. The letter was referred by State Engineer Lewis to the highway commission.

Life Insurance Warning Issued

Salem, June 27.—Husbands should tell their wives the name of the life insurance company with which they are insured, advises Insurance Commissioner Harvey Wells in a "life insurance warning" issued Tuesday. This will give the protection they intended their widows to have.

Water Subject of Inquiry

Salem, June 27.—The public service commission will hold a hearing Tuesday, July 11, to look into the complaints made against the service and purity of the domestic water supply.

U. of O. May Get Retired U.S. Officer

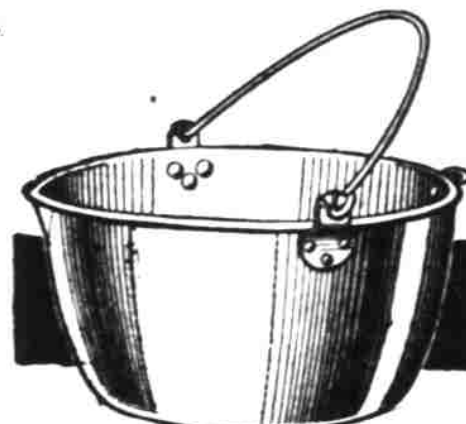
