

LOW RATES TO SCENIC POINTS WILL BE GIVEN DURING CONVENTION

Railroads Desire to Give N. E. A. Visitors All Chance to See Natural Beauties.

SPECIAL RATES ON 4TH

Tickets to be on sale July 3 and 4; Special "Loop" Train Will Make Circuit Via McMinnville.

During the session of the National Education association in Portland, July 7 to 14, the Southern Pacific, the Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railway and the Oregon Electric will make low round trip fares from Portland to points along the Columbia river, the Cascade mountains, the Willamette valley and to beach resorts. While will be the first time the railroads have ever granted such rates for a convention in this city.

The rates will be on the basis of a fare and a third and will be in effect from July 10 to 15, inclusive. Decision to make these rates is due to a desire to give delegates and others attending the convention an opportunity to visit the scenic, health and pleasure resorts in the vicinity of Portland and to visit other points of interest.

For fourth of July events special round trip fares will be granted to all points in Oregon, but the Southern Pacific will grant them only when the one way fare is \$5 or less. Tickets will be on sale July 3 and 4, with return limit, July 5.

A special train will be run to the Tillamook beaches on Tuesday. It will leave Portland at 1:40 p. m. and on the return trip will leave Tillamook at 4 p. m., July 4, arriving in Portland at 10:45 p. m. This will give those going over a day's stay at the beaches.

A special train will also be run from Portland to McMinnville, leaving Portland at 1 p. m., July 4, and returning at 8 p. m. This train will be known as the "loop train," as it will make the circuit by way of McMinnville, McMinnville and back the other route. The object of this excursion is to give those going an opportunity of spending an afternoon on a ride through that section of the valley.

PLENTY OF YOUTHFUL WORKERS WANT WORK ON OREGON'S FARMS

Flood of Offers Answers Appeal of Judge Tazwell for Boys to Work.

LADS CAN DO ANYTHING

Requests Cover Every Description of Work Usually Found on Farm—Juvenile Officer Gets Results.

Berry growers in the Willamette valley and large produce raisers, who find the present labor shortage handicapping them in the picking or cultivation of their crops, will find an abundant source of youthful and willing workers registered with Juvenile Court Judge Tazwell at the courthouse.

A flood of letters answered the appeal sent out by Judge Tazwell some time ago, asking that boys seeking work for the summer on farms send in their names and addresses to be listed in the Oregon Journal. The country range in years from 10 to 16. Their requests cover every description of work usually found on a farm, such as weeding vegetables, hoeing corn, hilling potatoes, milking cows, picking berries and taking care of stock.

One youthful aspirant wrote in as follows: "Dear Judge—I would like you to try and get me a job on a farm. I am 14 years old, can pick berries, milk cows and drive horses some. The bigger the farm the better I would like it. Walter Morset, 1289 Burrage street."

Charles Reimer, 18 years old, sent his name in to be listed for berry picking, potato hoeing and weeding. Hilton Rose says on the postal card he sent in: "Dear Judge—I read the article in The Oregon Journal about wanting boys and I would like to make some money, so send my name." Chief Officer Keady of the juvenile court estimated that he has several hundred boys listed already who have volunteered to do work outside of the city on farms or ranches.

All berry growers and farmers who can use boys during the summer months are requested to communicate with Judge Tazwell or Chief Officer Keady of the juvenile court at once, in order that the boys who have already sent in their names may be supplied with work.

DOG OWNERS ARE WARNED

Constable Petersen Makes Known Operation of New Law.

Attention of all dog owners in Multnomah county residing outside of the city limits of Portland is called by Constable Petersen to the operation of the new law, that provides for the seizure and destruction of dogs whose new licenses are not secured by July 10.

Licenses are being given out now at the constable's office, and owners are requested to come in before July 10 and pay the required fee for the new license.

Under the new law, the dogs seized by the constable's men after July 10 will be held for redemption for 48 hours, after which time they will be destroyed.

GREEK PASTOR WINS CASE

Community Must Pay Preacher \$400 Back Salary.

Rev. Panaretos Anagnostopoulos received a directed verdict for \$400 against the Greek community of Portland from a jury in Circuit Judge Tucker's court this morning.

Anagnostopoulos sued to recover the amount of money due him for four months' service as pastor of the Greek church in Portland. He said he came here from Greece under the agreement with the Greek community of Portland.

Commerce Chamber To File Objections

Objections to the abandonment of the Yaquina project and the improvement of the Columbia between the mouth of the Snake river and Priest rapids will be made to the Oregon delegation in congress by the Chamber of Commerce.

The district of Yaquina, comprising both Toledo and Newport, recently voted \$480,000 bonds for a jetty project, the government agreeing to put up dollar for dollar. Under the stress of the war the proposition has been eliminated from the rivers and harbors bill.

The engineer department has cut out the Columbia river project despite the recommendation of the local engineers.

AMERICAN RED CROSS IN FRANCE READY FOR BIG FUND JUST RAISED

Commission Has Spent Past Two Weeks Planning Work Ahead of It.

Paris, June 28.—(U. P.)—The American Red Cross in France is ready to receive that \$114,000,000 which American generosity has just contributed, and spend it as efficiently as a big business corporation would.

For more than two weeks now the American Red Cross commission has been planning the vast work ahead of it. Under direction of Major G. M. B. Murphy, vice president of the Guaranty Trust company of New York, a former army officer and graduate of West Point, they have been thoroughly over the ground. L. D. Kenny of the commission, vice president of the Federal Accounting company of New York, has studied the accounting of the huge sums which the Red Cross will handle.

Preparations Are Completed

O. J. Osborne of Chicago, an expert on transportation, has made his part of the work ready. So have Ernest McCullough of Boston, a noted engineer and authority on sanitation systems, and Ernest R. Bicknell, whose former experience rebuilding shattered earthquake cities will go far in the work of rebuilding northern France.

"The Red Cross is here to organize and cooperate, not to dictate and bully

the splendid organizations which have been doing such great work in France before America entered the war," Major Murphy explained. "Our three principal aims are:

"First, to work in conjunction with the army medical corps in caring for American troops behind the lines. The army itself will pick up its wounded on the firing lines and take them to army base hospitals. Here is where Red Cross work and vigor will come in."

"Second, aid in continuing and extending relief work already under way in France. This means with our experts and our money and experience we will give help to all organizations now engaged in this work, not absorbing, but co-operating with them."

"Third, give effective assistance to civilian relief work in France, co-operating with the French government and following its suggestions to the limit of our means and ability."

Business Men Are in Charge

"Our spirit in entering this work is that we owe so much to France that we can only hope to pay back a very, very small part of the debt."

Major Murphy explained that experts not only in Red Cross work, but in business methods, had already carefully mapped out handling of funds and of personnel so that the American public may be certain every cent contributed will be utilized to the very best advantage.

Second in command of the headquarters here is James H. Parkins, vice president of the National City bank of New York. A number of other men high in American business and financial worlds are aiding.
