

ALBANY WINS NEXT YEAR'S MEETING OF STATE G. A. VETERANS

Noses Out Portland in Race for Convention Honors; Sessions Successful.

OLD FRIENDS MEET AGAIN

Number of Acquaintances Renewed After Many Years Since Boys, Now Old Men, Fought Together.

Forest Grove, Or., June 28.—Albany won out over Portland this morning in the race for the next annual session of the state Grand Army of the Republic encampment. The Dalles and La Grande were also in the race. The first ballot showed Portland in the lead. In subsequent balloting, La Grande and the Dalles were soon eliminated, and when the race settled between Portland and Albany the valley town won out.

Today the encampment of the Grand Army men and women comes to a close. Many are now on trains rolling homeward to all parts of Oregon and other parts of the northwest. Business, hand music, receptions, drills by the Boy Scouts and Girls' Honor Guard and goodbyes are being said.

Registered up to yesterday were 922.

For Third Time This makes the third time that Forest Grove has been honored by the state encampment. Years ago the old boys pitched their tents in South park, this city, and later in the Navy grove west of town. Here over campfires they cooked their bacon and beans—those were the days of encampment. But while the tents and the bacon and the beans were missing this year the zest and the cheer of the old boys have never been greater than this June.

Dr. J. E. Hall of Portland, retiring department commander, was one of the central figures of the encampment.

Including Dr. Hall, 15 party department commanders have been in attendance at the encampment, which is only an index of the gripping interest of these latter days. Other department commanders in attendance were: A. E. Borthwick, J. C. Cooper, H. B. Gates, M. L. Pratt, D. H. Turner, B. F. Pike, T. E. Hillis, S. F. Blythe, James P. Shaw, W. J. R. Beach, Newton Clark, Thomas B. McDevine, S. W. Taylor and George A. Harding.

Israel B. Putnam, picturesque as Buffalo Bill, came from the Tillamook country with his waving long hair, big hat and big heart. Comrade Putnam is 84 years old and fought with the artillery from West Virginia. He would like to get a chance at the Kaiser.

Others On Hand George Vannortwick, aged 89, did not come—because he was already here, Forest Grove being his home. But he it said that the encampment had been at Baker or just across from Hornbrook, Cal. George Vannortwick would have been there—there not only

in body but in spirit. Comrades this week recalled the encampment at Tillamook when the old boys and the old girls gave an old fashioned dance. Comrade Vannortwick being on the floor for every set. And he still has the same spirit that made him a great fighter in the Civil war.

R. C. Markee, commandant of the Oregon State Soldiers' home, has enjoyed his visit with Past Department Commander T. E. Hills of Garden Home. The two men soldiered together all through the war. Mr. Markee has just celebrated his seventy-second birthday. He is a native of Ohio and when four years of age his father moved to Illinois. Twelve years ago commandant Markee came to Oregon. He is the father of 11 sons, 10 of whom are living. Four of his sons are serving the colors. One is stationed with the Coast Artillery at Fort Grant, Panama, and his son, Roy, is leader of the Coast Artillery band in Portland. All the Markee brothers are musicians and have toured the United States on the biggest vaudeville circuits as stellar musical artists.

Mr. Markee says that a splendid new brick and concrete hospital is being built at Roseburg for the old soldiers at a cost of \$25,000.

Old Friends Meet There were meetings of friends who had not seen each other since the war. John Williams of Portland, aged 84, and J. H. Lane, 76, of North Plains lived side by side on farms near Viroqua, Wis. They first met in 1855 and enlisted together in 1862. Mr. Lane's parents lived in Kentucky and were strong abolitionists, and his mother used to assist slaves in their flight into Ohio and freedom.

Mrs. Helen Smith Southwick, wife of Frank Southwick, former postmaster of Salem, met old childhood friends.

John Gudmund of Pendleton, who has attended every encampment for 40 years, is unable to come because of weakness. He is 94 years old and in his letter to Department Commander Hall regretted very much that he could not come. Daniel Webster, aged 84, Columbus Wood, 81, and Dr. Tracy, 85, were some of the old veterans in attendance.

The music of the Oregon Fife and Drum corps on all occasions and that of the Veterans' quartet, Comrades Hamilton, Foxelson, Varney and Chambers, singing old favorites and war melodies were features of the encampment. "I Know a Yankee Man," a song by H. W. Sparks of this city, was one of the quartet's favorites.

AMBASSADOR ELKUS IN PARIS, SAYS TURKS NOT YET EXHAUSTED

Praises Treatment Accorded Himself and Enemy Citizens of Constantinople.

VIENNA ALSO COURTEOUS

Former Consul General Is Enthusiastic About Trade Future of U. S. in Near East After the War.

By Charles F. Bertelli Paris, June 28.—(U. P.)—Constantinople is quiet and the Turks are convinced that they will not come out of the war the loser, according to Abram L. Elkus, former United States ambassador in Constantinople. Mr. Elkus has just arrived here from the Ottoman capital together with his family and the embassy staff. To an interviewer the former ambassador said:

"I must state with all frankness that during my attack of typhus which delayed my departure from Pera, the Turkish authorities treated me with the greatest consideration, and, although they did not seek to disguise the fact that they felt America's entry into the war was bad for them, their displeasure was never translated into any vexatious or hostile behavior towards myself.

Townshend Well Satisfied "As a matter of fact, in a general way, the Turks behave generously towards their enemies. Their prisoners of war are well treated and the most illustrious among them, General Sir Charles Townshend of Kut el Amara, told me on many occasions he was very well satisfied with the way the Turkish government was behaving towards him.

"Enemy citizens in Constantinople enjoy complete liberty and only occasionally are a few of them temporarily interned as a measure of reprisal. Many Turks still retain their affection for the countries now fighting against them.

Turkey Not Yet Exhausted "It is certainly not true that Turkey is exhausted, demoralized and anxious to get out of the war. Of course, conditions are far from prosperous there. You notice the lack of many things. Wheat is short, and they have bread cards. But there is no real famine and popular kitchens relieve the worst cases of distress.

"We were seen off at the railroad station by representatives of the grand vizier and the Porte.

"Equally courteous was the attitude adopted towards us at Vienna, where, thanks to the kind offices of the Spanish ambassador, we were allowed to spend 12 hours. I was allowed to dine at the Hotel Bristol in Vienna. The meal was excellent, and though the price was high, it was not exorbitant.

Big U. S. Trade Future Seen

He is enthusiastic about the future of the United States in the near east from a commercial viewpoint.

"Americans will play a preponderant role commercially and financially in the near east after the war," he said. "An American banking house will be established in Constantinople and many of America's leading manufacturers will open up there to take advantage of the free port facilities which presumably will obtain there according to the peace settlement."

YOUNG BOY FATALLY SHOT; HEAD MISTAKEN FOR A GREY SQUIRREL

Cap Protruding Above a Log Looks to Juvenile Hunter Like Game and He Shoots.

Albany, Or., June 28.—When his head was mistaken for a grey squirrel, Roy McCrary, 9 years old, son of James McCrary, was shot Wednesday afternoon by Curtis Odenberg, 18 years old. The boy died at St. Mary's hospital an hour later.

McCrary, his brother Ove, 11 years old, and James Kepka, aged 14, left home in the afternoon to pick strawberries. They went east of the city about two miles and entered a wooded place near the Jewish cemetery along the Oregon Electric track. While they were seated on the ground, Odenberg, son of C. C. Odenberg, and a boy named Benson, who also live in East Albany, came up from behind hunting squirrels.

Roy was leaning against a log, his cap protruding above it a few inches. Odenberg watched it move a few times and decided it was a grey squirrel and fired with a .22 calibre rifle. The bullet entered the back of the head. The lad was rushed to the hospital, but the wound was fatal and he died within an hour.
