

BERKSHIRES, HORSES TO BE FEATURES OF COMING STATE FAIR

Hog Raisers From Entire Pacific Slope Are Expected to Take Exhibits to Salem.

STOCK ENTRIES POUR IN

Secretary Lea of Fair Board Says 1917 Show Will Surpass All Former Exhibitions.

Salem, Or., June 28.—The Berkshire congress which will attract hog raisers from California, Washington, Idaho, Utah, Nevada, Montana and Oregon, will be held this year at the Oregon state fair, according to announcement made Wednesday by A. H. Lea, secretary of the fair.

"The swine exhibit at our state fair this year will be larger than the swine exhibit at any world's fair held in recent years," declared Secretary Lea. "There will be more entries and the quality will be better."

Prospects are that the fair this year will be larger than any fair ever held in the state, according to Mr. Lea. He says the livestock department will be so overcrowded that it will be necessary to erect several new barns to take care of the entries.

Horses to Be Feature
"There will be three times as many horses as were shown at the last fair," said Lea, and last year was the banner year. A. C. Ruby & Co. of Portland will have 56 entries in the horse department.

Requests for a night horse show, something similar to that which was held last year, are being received by the secretary, and Mr. Lea will put the matter up to the board when it holds its meeting here Saturday. Mr. Lea said he would at least advocate the holding of a stock show at night, with the fancy riding stunts, if it will be possible to arrange for them.

W. P. McNary of Douglas, Ariz., has been named as official starter for the races. This will be the fifth time he has served in this position at the Oregon fair.

Premium List Increased
The board has increased the premiums in the cattling department, with the result that the exhibit will be larger this year.

Secretary Lea said the space in the machinery exhibit building is all taken and that tents will be raised to accommodate the overflow.

Requests have come from Portland automobile people for an automobile show under the direction of Joe Reid of Portland. If it is put on it will have to be under canvas.

Time Board Meets

Salem, Or., June 28.—The state time board met Wednesday and reached no decision as to the time deposit it would purchase for manufacturing agricultural time for Oregon farmers. Benton Hovers, a member of the board, was requested to investigate further certain time deposits in the Gold Hill district, and it is considered likely that the board will acquire a like deposit thereabouts.

C. S. Jones of Portland, who is interested in a time deposit near Roseburg, appeared before the board and discussed the idea of the board acting as a selling agency for private manufacturers of agricultural time. He said his company will be manufacturing time fertilizer within two or three months.

Asylum Inmate Escapes

Salem, Or., June 28.—Victor Ericson, a logger, committed to the Oregon state hospital from Columbia county about six weeks ago, escaped Wednesday afternoon by outrunning asylum farm hands who tried to overtake him. He was hoeing in the fields when he suddenly dropped his hoe and ran. Farm hands took after him and the chase covered a course of three miles, but the fleeing inmate was too swift for his pursuers. Ericson is 21 years old and was wearing a black derby hat, hickory shirt and blue overalls.

20 Japanese Would Enlist

El Paso, Texas, June 28.—(I. N. S.)—Twenty Japanese yesterday applied to the recruiting office to enlist in the United States army. Henry Kunst, a German, was arrested by government agents while trying to cross the border from Mexico.

La Grande Hospital Unit to Be Passed

Regular Army Surgeon Will Inspect Company This Evening, After Which It Will Become Unit in U.S. Army.

La Grande, Or., June 28.—The final stamp of approval will be put upon the La Grande hospital corps Thursday, when Colonel Smith, United States army surgeon, inspects members of the company. M. O. G. stationed at La Grande, received a letter from the adjutant general that the war department has recognized the corps as a unit in the United States army. In the few drills gone through by the men all have shown special aptitude in picking up the rudiments of the work. Major Holt is well pleased with the showing made by the company. The quota of the company was increased from 73 to 80 men during the last few days, and a full company is expected Thursday night.

WONG FOUND GUILTY OF MURDER BY JURY IN AUTOMOBILE CASE

Hop Sing Gunman Who Shot and Killed Joseph Gue Must Pay the Penalty for Deed.

After deliberating for an hour yesterday afternoon, a jury in circuit court brought in a verdict finding Wong Wen Tung guilty of the murder of Joseph Gue the night of March 27. Wong is a member of the Hop Sing tong, while his victim was affiliated with the Bing Kung-Bow Leong faction.

This is the first conviction obtained by the state in its prosecutions of Chinese highlanders who have figured in the recent shootings of the tong wars.

The prosecution was handled by Dan J. Madarkey and John Collier for the state, while Littlefield & Maguire conducted the defense.

The killing took place on Madison street between Second and Third as Wong was sitting in an automobile. Gue was evidently waiting for him, mounted the running board of the car and emptied his revolver at the man within, wounding also Antoine Marovich, the chauffeur.

Wong then dropped to the pavement and ran, his capture being effected by R. C. Blackmar, a repairman for the Portland Highway, Light & Power company, who held him while William Taggart, a fireman, called the police.

Wong will be sentenced by Judge W. N. Gatens Saturday at 9:30 a. m.

Chinese Are on Trial

La Grande, Or., June 27.—The trial of Ching Ben, Li Hung and Wong Ona, Chinese, accused of assault to kill, began Wednesday. The accused Chinese paid a hospital fee of Eng Chang and later tried to collect, which they were unable to do. On the night of February 15, while Eng was in a store of the Lee Kee, in Fourth street, he was fired at through a window. Eng claims he saw Ching through the window when he fired. Other witnesses brought out the fact that the three Chinese were seen running from the scene of the shooting, while a witness seen to sneak into a local hotel where they worked. No tong was mentioned in connection with the affair.

Aurora Takes Hold Of Red Cross Work

Following End of Drive, Auxiliary of Willamette Chapter Prepares for Active Relief Duties.

Aurora, Or., June 28.—The Red Cross meeting here Monday night to complete the organization of the Aurora auxiliary of Willamette chapter was attended by an enthusiastic crowd. The local auxiliary was organized a couple of weeks ago, but active work was postponed until the completion of the big drive for funds. Now the work of the auxiliary will be taken up in earnest and it is hoped that the membership will become one of the largest in the county. Dr. B. F. Giesy is president of the local organization and Mrs. Diana Snyder secretary.

Big Acreage Planted

Aurora, Or., June 28.—It is estimated that this section has the largest acreage of food crops this year that has ever been planted here. The increase in potatoes placed at 40 per cent, while in grain, beans and root crops, exclusive of asparagus, the increase is almost as great. The chairman of the state further increase next year are greatly enhanced by the erection of the big evaporating plant at Salem, many of the farmers desiring to contract their crops to the new company.

Honor Guard Girls May Pick Cherries

The Dalles, Or., June 28.—Local cherry orchardists are worried over their failure to secure enough cherry pickers. An appeal has been sent to the Chamber of Commerce for pickers. Members of the local chapter, Girls' National Honor Guard, at recent meeting voted to form companies to assist the growers if they are needed. The chairman of the guard has been asked to encourage girls to help in the emergency. Unless pickers can be found the cherry crop will be threatened.

Crematory Sends Wrong Ashes

New York, June 28.—(I. N. S.)—Trial of Mrs. Rosalie Stahl's \$10,000 damage suit against the William Neckar crematory was resumed Wednesday, with Mrs. Stahl on the stand. Mrs. Stahl alleges that after she sent her husband's body to the crematory they sent her back the ashes of someone else.

Pendleton Lassies Marry Cavalrymen

Pendleton, Or., June 28.—Pendleton has two more war brides. Two members of Troop D, Pendleton's cavalry organization, were married Tuesday night. John Danmore took as his bride Doratha Pearl Gulliford, while Evan Cameron was married to Zena Van Tassel. Both of the troopers had from Pilot Rock and their brides are from Pendleton.

SCHOONER MARGARET WILL BE OVERHAULED IN ALBINA, PORTLAND

Underwriters Order Motorship Damaged by Fire to This City Instead of Astoria.

Astoria, Or., June 28.—Captain Williamson, representing underwriters, Wednesday ordered that the motor schooner Margaret, which was towed here after Monday morning, be taken to Albina, Portland, for cleaning and overhauling. Instead of the Port of Astoria terminals, as at first announced, the tug Walulla will tow the Margaret up the river Thursday morning. No exact estimate of damage has been made, and it is said it may run anywhere from \$20,000 to \$40,000. Five sailors and two officers were paid off Wednesday by Captain Nielsen.

New Charge Against Auto Man

Astoria, Or., June 28.—E. W. Olsen, formerly a local automobile dealer, was rearrested Wednesday night on a Portland warrant on a charge of obtaining money under false pretense. Just as he was freed by the grand jury on a no true bill on an accusation of forging automobile contracts, Olsen, it is said, forged contracts and sold them to Benjamin Boone & Co. of Portland, bringing cars thus obtainable to Astoria. He will be taken to Portland Thursday morning to stand trial there on the new charge.

Longshoremen Secure Raise

Astoria, Or., June 28.—Longshore-

men working on the Hill steamers at the Flavel terminals will receive 30 cents an hour and 90 cents for overtime, according to an agreement reached Wednesday. The schedule is retroactive from June 15.

Belgians Invited to Astoria

Astoria, Or., June 28.—The Chamber of Commerce has invited the Belgian commission to visit Oregon and Astoria.

Coquille Editor, on Way South, Dies

Coquille, Or., June 28.—Word has been received here that Percy Chase Levar, for many years and until a few months ago editor of the Coquille (Or.) Herald, died Tuesday aboard the steamer Breakwater while en route to San Francisco. Mr. Levar, who was a victim of tuberculosis, was in the care of his wife and a nurse, and was en route to southern California for his health. He was a native of Maine, aged 57 years, and a son of John Levar, an early day logger of this community. The widow and a daughter, Miss Mary Levar, survive. Knights of Pythias have charge of the body, which will be sent to Marshfield for burial Sunday.

Blasts Fail to Get Boy's Body Afloat

Hood River, Or., June 28.—Efforts by expert powder men to dynamite the Devil's Punch Bowl, where Hilman Strong, son of Attorney H. W. Strong, of Portland, was drowned Monday morning, in hope of recovering the body failed after as many as 11 sticks of dynamite were discharged at a single shot. The water is estimated to be 50 feet deep in the Punch Bowl. A patrol has been organized to watch the river day and night.

VETERANS OF SPANISH WAR ARE IN SESSION FOR ANNUAL REUNION

Camps of Department of Oregon and Women's Auxiliary Are Gathering at Hillsboro.

Hillsboro, Or., June 28.—The Spanish War Veterans, department of Oregon, is in session here for its ninth annual encampment. The special train from Portland brought out the Portland and Eastern Oregon delegation, and accompanying it were the Third Oregon regimental band. The women's auxiliary is holding its annual meeting concurrently. Chaplain Meade of McMinnville opened the session by introducing Rev. Mr. Smith of Scott Harrington camp, who offered the invocation. Mayor John M. Wall welcomed the veterans and auxiliary and was supplemented by Hugh Rogers, commander of the Hillsboro camp.

Responses were made by Elmer Lundberg of Scott Young camp, Portland; Mrs. Eva G. Hyde of the Hillsboro auxiliary and Mrs. Cora Thompson, president of the sister association. A solo, "The Battle Hymn of the Republic" was sung by Dr. L. M. Hyde, in which the audience joined in the chorus. The visitors then were given a luncheon in the shade of the court house lawn and the two organizations settled down to business. Patriotic sentiment was the dominant note in all the addresses and it transpired that many veterans of the Spanish war are now in service in the various National Guards. Governor Withycombe is expected here Thursday night to address the encampment.

For several years he has looked after the business of the Robert Dollar company in Coos county and is widely known in lumber circles. The bride was chief operator in the telephone office at Bandon. The couple will go to British Columbia, where Mr. Dollar has been stationed by his company.

Some Workers Resume Work

Marshfield, Or., June 28.—While the strike at the Smith mill is still unsettled, it is claimed that 10 or 15 of the strikers returned to work and some are leaving for other places to seek positions. A. H. Powers, head of the Smith Powers Logging company, says the I. W. W. have managed to send members here who are applying for positions with the company.
