WAR TIME COOKERY

Spinach and Parsley

Spinach that is in prime condition for greens should be prepared for drying by careful washing and removing the leaves from the roots. Spread the leaves on trays to dry thoroughly. They will dry much more promptly if sliced or chopped.

Garden Beets, Onions, Carrots

Beets—Select young, quickly grown, tender beets, which should be washed, peeled, sliced about an eighth of an inch thick and dried.

Carrots should be well grown, but varieties having a large woody core should be avoided. Wash, peel and

slice crosswise into pieces about an eighth of an inch thick.

Parsnips should be treated in the same way as carrots.

Onions—Remove the outside papery covering. Cut off tops and roots. Slice into one eighth inch pieces and dry.

Cabbage—Select well developed heads of cabbage and remove all loose outside leaves. Split the cabbage, remove the hard woody core and slice the remainder of the head with a kraut cutter, or other hand-slicing machine. All the products under this heading should be "conditioned" as described above.

Beet Tops, Swiss Chard, Celery

Beet tops—Tops of young beets in suitable condition for greens should be selected and washed carefully. Both the leaf stalk and blade should be cut into sections about one fourth inch long and spread on screens and dried.

Swiss chard and celery should be

prepared in the same way as beet tops. Rhubarb—Choose young and succulent growth. Prepare as for stewing by skinning the stalks and cutting into pieces about one fourth inch to one half inch in length and dry on trays.

All the products under this heading should be "conditioned" as described.

Raspberries

Sort out imperfect berries, spread select berries on trays and dry. Do not dry so long that they become hard enough to rattle. The drying should be stopped as soon as the berries fail to retain the hand when pressed. Pack and "condition."

That women can help to win this war right in their own homes is the doctrine which Dr. Luther H. Gulick, president of the Camp Fire Girls, is preaching night and day. To this end the organization has adopted a set of "patriotic food honors" to be awarded to

those of its members who perform certain specific tasks in the saving of food. In the Camp Fire movement an "honor" is the privilege of wearing certain decorations as rewards for definite accomplishments. The honors carry with them prestige and promotion in the Camp Fire organization.

The tasks for which patriotic food honors will be awarded are:

1. Use at least as much corn as you do wheat products.
2. Invent a new corn bread or pudding, etc., and have the family eat it 20 times in three months.
3. Make three different corn recipes sufficiently popular to be each used once a week.
4. Do not use potatoes more than seven times a week. Use rice or spaghetti in their place.
5. Eat all potato skins.
6. Do not eat meat or eggs more than once a day.

7. Eat everything edible on the plate.

8. Have not more than two courses at regular meals.

9. Use a fireless cooker 25 times in each month.

10. Do your marketing personally, not by telephone, except in emergencies.

11. Work in a vegetable garden on the average of three hours a week.

12. Preserve enough of any fruit or berries for the family for the winter.

13. Preserve enough of any fruit or vegetable for the use of the family for the winter, such as corn, beans, peas, tomatoes.

14. Do not throw away any bread or other wheat products.

15. Scrape all mixing bowls and food dishes clean with a spatula.

16. Throw away no bones until you have used them for soup. Add to your

soup stock every available amount of food.

17. Throw away no fat.

18. Before disposing of any waste, carefully inspect the contents of all baskets and pails to see that nothing edible is thrown away.

Note—An elective patriotic honor can be awarded to any girl who gets her family to do any of the above honors for three months.
