

San Francisco Toung Man Turns Gormaild to Put on Weight to Become Boldier of the Son-Reeds 12 Founds.

San Francisco, July 4 .- (L N. S.)-W. S. Perry, a clerk in the Bank of W. S. Perry, a clerk in the Bank of California, is determined to eat his way into the marine corps and a little thing like 12 pounds underweight is not going to stop him. Several days ago Perry applied to the recruiting ser-geant. Everything was O.K. until he stepped upon the weighing scales. The weight required of a marine is 128 pounds. Perry moved the scales only 0 116.

Since then he has been taking the following course of treatment.

Three raw eggs and three glasses of milk before going to bed, nine hours' sleep, three full meals a day and three or four glasses of malted milk during the day, whenever he can get around the corner of the bank to the soda fountain.

"I have set myself six weeks in which to make the weight," was Perry's declaration, "and within that time I am going to be a member of the marine sorps."
