

NEW POPULAR LOAN MAY BE OFFERED TO FINANCE ALLIES

Over Billion Dollars Has Already Been Advanced Out of Liberty Bonds Fund.

NEXT YEAR'S NEED HEAVY

United States Appears to Be Able to Pay Own War Bills as They Come Due; Must Aid Friends.

Washington, July 6.—(I. N. S.)—If advances of money to the European allies of the United States continue throughout the summer at the rate they have been made so far during this nation's participation in the war, the proceeds of the first \$2,000,000,000 installment of the Liberty loan will be used up before autumn.

To date the advances to the allies amount to \$1,043,000,000, or more than half of the initial issue of war bonds. The regular financing program of the treasury contemplates the advance of close to another billion dollars by October. This will leave for the support of the American armies and civil establishment only what revenue is raised by the extraordinary taxation provided under the revenue laws.

New Loan Likely

Secretary McAdoo has announced that he plans to declare another issue of war bonds in the fall. The last revenue bill authorized a total issue of \$5,000,000,000, so \$3,000,000,000 in these securities are yet available. The same revenue law authorized the secretary of the treasury to sell not to exceed \$2,000,000,000 in short term treasury certificates of indebtedness.

Already \$388,000,000 of these certificates have been sold, but in accordance with the law have been turned back to a large extent in payment for Liberty loan bonds. This means that the treasury has the full amount of the \$2,000,000,000 Liberty loan issue in cash or pledges, and has redeemed the greater part of the treasury certificates. Under the law these certificates may be retained, so the treasury can now release these short term notes for money for emergency financing.

New Provision Needed

Present indications are that the \$3,000,000,000 in loans to the allies authorized by Congress will be made by January 1, and after that time new legislation must be adopted before this nation can continue as paymaster for the European war.

Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo has informed Congress that the needs of the government for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1918, will amount to approximately \$2,236,000,000. The revenue bill about to be passed by Congress will provide revenue of \$1,670,000,000. Secretary McAdoo stated that he apprehended no immediate need for a further authorization of bonds. These figures indicate the belief by Secretary McAdoo that the government is in good shape financially, and can get along under the war bonds now authorized.

What steps the government must take for extraordinary financing after January 1 must be determined by the requirements of the allies, yet to be stated.

Dry Indications Send Prices of Whiskey Soaring

New York, July 6.—(U. P.)—Whiskey is soaring. Artificial imagination is going to be costly. Distillers here, almost without exception, look for a general rise in the price of whiskey. The price of many brands has already increased, one of them \$3.13 per cent. It is predicted that if the bill under discussion in Washington to prohibit the manufacture of liquor is passed, whiskey will take its place in family museums with other priceless treasures.

Germany Ignoring All Notes of U. S.

No Word Received From Her in Response to Any Question Since War; Spanish Minister Helpless.

Washington, July 6.—(I. N. S.)—Germany is ignoring every note and inquiry of the United States. No word has been received from her in response to any question since the beginning of the war.

Two main questions were put to the German government by the state department. One was the reported detention in Germany of more than 50 Americans and the other was the proposal that officer prisoners of war should be paid their regular salary by the two governments. The first inquiry was in the form of a question through the Spanish minister at Berlin, who represents American interests there. The second was a direct note presented by the Spanish minister.

On his own behalf the Spaniard notified the United States that Germany claims she will allow the Americans to depart as soon as the usual war time passport regulations are complied with, this requiring several months. No reply of any kind to the second proposal has been received.

The opinion in official circles here is that Germany has adopted a policy of ignoring the United States completely. What she expects to gain is not clear.

Portland Engineers Given Commissions

Washington, July 6.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—Among commissions in the engineer officers' reserve corps just announced are Charles H. Willison of Portland, Or., as major, and Preston B. Delano of that city as second lieutenant. Joseph J. Hittinger of the quartermaster corps was commissioned on June 4 as captain in that branch of the service.

Charles H. Willison is employed as engineer by the Portland Railway, Light and Power company, and lives at 1248 Rodney avenue. The name of Preston B. Delano does not appear in Portland directories. Joseph J. Hittinger lives at 413 Eleventh street.

Recruiting Shows Improvement

Washington, July 6.—Recruiting over Independence day showed an improvement. 1489 enlisted men being gathered for the regular army on the third and fourth. New York had 177, Pennsylvania 181 (filling the quota of 15,355), and Massachusetts 102.

ARMY LOTTERY DRAFT IS BEING ORGANIZED FOR NATIONAL ACTION

Drawing of Numbers Will Take Place in Washington When Boards Finish Work.

QUICK ACTION NECESSARY

Provost Marshal General Impresses Upon Members of Exemption Board Importance of Duty.

Washington, July 6.—(U. P.)—The draft lottery will be staged in the national capital on the day following completion of organization of the local exemption boards.

"The minute the local boards are completed and have numbered more than 9,500,000 registration cards, we will be ready for the draft," was the official announcement from Provost Marshal General Crowder's office Thursday.

General Crowder urgently has insisted that the boards finish their labors before Saturday. He emphasized that one day lost now means a day lost in the most important element of the United States, in a message to every board.

Quick Action Imperative. General Crowder declared it is an imperative national necessity that the serially numbered copies of the cards be in the hands of the states' adjutants general and another copy be mailed to Washington before Saturday.

The first test of the efficiency of the great national war organization, of which you are an important member, comes now," the messages read. "This is the most important element in the conduct of a war. It is plain to see how great the nation's dependence is on each particular man in whom the president has expressed his confidence by appointment to a local board."

"It would be difficult to over estimate the value to the nation of the thing you are here called upon to do, or the importance that it be done within the limit herein indicated."

Some Delay Is Expected

In spite of the call for haste, officials believe that a few days may be lost in filling vacancies caused by resignations from the boards. Any disposition to shirk the duties without a valid excuse for resignation will not be tolerated.

Department officials have pointed out that under the law members can be compelled to serve. Evasions can be punished. So far the number of resignations is far from alarming.

Although it is held in secrecy the method of drawing the "key" numbers of the draft is practically complete. In a few days it will be explained in another set of regulations.

Death Threats Are Reported

San Francisco, July 6.—(U. P.)—Death threats are being sent to members of draft exemption boards in San Francisco.

John J. Liddy, member of one district board, today advised Registrar Zemansky that he sent his resignation to Mayor Duggan, saying one man had told him his (Duggan's) life would be taken if he failed to vote for exemption of the man who made the threat.

Mayor Rolph announced that he had no authority to accept resignations, as the matter of selection was out of his hands. Other members of the board declare they have also received threats but they refuse to take them seriously.

Nearly Million to Be Drafted

Washington, July 6.—(I. N. S.)—The number of men to be drafted again has been increased. Definite announcement to this effect was made Thursday by Secretary of War Baker. It was reported that the draft, first scheduled to include 500,000 and later raised to 625,000, might be employed to draw from 750,000 to 1,000,000 men on the first drawing.

Secretary Baker said the number to be drawn had not yet been determined, although at least estimates it would be more than 650,000.

The extra men will be used to fill vacancies in bringing the regular army and federalized national guard to war strength, voluntary recruiting having failed to a large extent.

Manganese Output To Be Trebled Here

Washington, July 6.—(I. N. S.)—The American output of manganese will be trebled in 1917. This prediction was made today by Secretary of the Interior Lane. The vast increase is due to the war time demand for steel.

"Modern steel making demands manganese," said Secretary Lane, "and the shortage of a domestic supply of this ore has been a matter of concern to those of us who wished America to be industrially independent. But now the war requirements for steel have been realized by the manganese operators, for reports already received by the department of the interior show that shipments of high grade manganese during the past six months aggregate 23,245 tons or nearly 15 per cent more than the tonnage for the whole 12 months of 1916."

Copper Supply Cut; Federal Aid Sought

Washington, July 6.—(I. N. S.)—The annual production of 100,000,000 pounds of copper greatly needed for munitions purposes has been cut off by the strike in the Arizona fields, heads of various copper companies wired Senator Ashurst Thursday afternoon. The strike is said to have been fomented by German agents.

The copper companies asked that federal troops and investigators be sent to the district.

Mother Jones Rouses Strikers to Rioting

Bloomington, Ill., July 6.—(I. N. S.)—Following an address at a mass meeting of street railway strikers by Mother Jones here Thursday night, a mob formed and attacked the cars operated by non-union men. John Maloney, a member of the mob, was shot and is not expected to live. A number of conductors and motormen were pulled from the cars and badly beaten. Several cars were wrecked.
