

FERDINAND REED MAY GET JOB AS MANAGER OF THE AUDITORIUM

Mayor Baker Has Made No Appointment but Admits He Has Reed in Mind.

THE DUTIES ARE OUTLINED

In Addition to Work of Administration, Mayor Will Expect Manager to Help Develop the City.

Ferdinand E. Reed, president of the Laurelhurst club and an active supporter of George L. Baker in the recent city campaign, is to become manager of the auditorium, according to intimation by Mayor Baker today. The mayor declared that, while the appointment was not yet made, he had his eye on Reed as a live man for the place.

Mayor Baker said that it was his plan to make the public auditorium a general clearing house for the city's development and growth, and to have a man in charge who could keep things moving.

"While, of course, the man to be appointed will have to look after the administrative work of the building," he said, "I want him to create interest in development and get new industries here."

"Mr. Reed is an energetic worker, and while he may have made mistakes in the past, those mistakes had nothing to do with his ability. I have not appointed him yet, but I have got my eye on him."

MISS DINSMORE APPOINTED

Mayor Baker Fills Post of Private Secretary Temporarily.

Mayor Baker has a young woman for a private secretary, temporarily at least. She is Miss Lorene Dinsmore, who was his stenographer while he was commissioner of public affairs.

The place had been offered to Hial M. White, a newspaper man, but owing to the fact that it might be only a temporary appointment, White declined to accept. Should Roy W. Keel, formerly secretary to Baker, now at the officers' training camp, fall to be assigned to active service, he will take Miss Dinsmore's place. The position pays \$150 a month.

Baker also announced that he had reappointed John F. Logan to serve a six year term as a member of the municipal civil service board. Mr. Logan, who had been chairman of the board, is a lawyer.

MANY FIREMEN ENLISTING

Places, However, Rapidly Filled From Eligible List.

With men enlisting in the army and navy and failure of the people to adopt the two-platoon amendment in the city election, June 5, 45 men of the fire bureau have left in the last three months according to Fire Chief Dowell today. Their places are being rapidly filled, however, from the eligible list.

German Efforts to Fraternize Spurned

Petrograd, July 6.—(U. P.)—German troops tried vainly to fraternize with Russian troops on the Rumanian front, but a fusillade of artillery fire answered their showing of the white flag.

The incident was related in today's official statement as indicative of the determination with which the Russians on the Rumanian front were participating in the offensive, started by General Brusiloff on the northern line. It occurred in the region of Balesani. The Teutons yelled invitations to the Russians to fraternize, but were not answered except by shells.

General Brusiloff reported a brief but sharp infantry action northwest of Rybniki, near Dzikelany, and artillery along most of the front where he has been pressing the enemy hard.

Germans Expect New Battle

Berlin, July 6.—(I. N. S.)—Violent artillery firing, as if signaling a new infantry battle in Galicia, was reported by the war office today. The Russian guns began their last night between Zborov and Brzezany, and were still pounding away early today, with the Germans replying. Further north, at Smorgon, Brody and Zhyvyn, artillery fighting was also reported.

LIEUTENANT LEADS BATTERY RECRUITING

First Lieutenant Charles L. Johnson of battery A, field artillery, Oregon National Guard, is in charge of the recruiting work for battery B, the last military organization authorized for enlistment of men, and is at 106 Fifth street all day and every day. Lieutenant Johnson has been a member of battery A since 1912, and is a well-known business man of Milwaukie, Or. Four years ago he was given a commission as second lieutenant, and just before this battery went to the Mexican border he was promoted to first lieutenant. The expectation is that battery B will fill up in a few days, and that Lieutenant Johnson will receive further promotion shortly after.

MYSTERIOUS SHOOTING OF SERGEANT MORTON UNDER INVESTIGATION

Board of Officers of Regiment Is Sitting Today; Its Findings Not Given Out.

To investigate the mysterious shooting of George W. Morton, sergeant in company L, Third Oregon Infantry, at Clackamas Thursday night, a board of inquiry composed of officers of the regiment is making an investigation today.

Sergeant Morton was shot, presumably by himself, judged from the nature of the wound, in the woods back of the rifle range at the camp about 6:30 in the evening.

Soldiers nearby heard the report of the gun and found the sergeant with a bullet wound through the head. His service revolver was lying on the ground about 25 feet from the body. One cartridge had been discharged.

An ambulance service machine was summoned from Portland and the wounded soldier was hurried to the post hospital at Vancouver barracks. His condition there this morning was reported to be extremely serious and small hope of recovery is extended. He was treated at Camp Withycombe by Major M. B. Marcellus, chief surgeon of the regiment. The bullet entered the left side of the head above the ear, passing through the brain, and emerged from the right side of the skull.

Sergeant Morton is from Dallas, where his mother resides. A brother is also in company L. Mrs. Morton was summoned to the bedside of her son today. Colonel John L. May, commanding the regiment, said the findings of the board of inquiry would not be made public.

Shooting Causes Surprise

Dallas, Or., July 6.—Word of the shooting of First Sergeant George Morton at Clackamas came as a shock to the people of Dallas where he has lived practically all his life. No cause is known here why he should attempt suicide, if such was the case. Morton had been a member of Company L for eight years, and had been first sergeant since April, 1916.

For several years he has served as messenger in the state senate. His mother, Mrs. Viola Morton, resides here, and his brother, Irvie, is mess sergeant in Company L.

Guard May Be Called Early

Indianapolis, Ind., July 6.—(I. N. S.)—Adjutant General Smith today received instructions from Washington which led him to believe that the Indiana National Guard will be called into the federal service before August 1, the official date.

COUNTY BOARD WILL DECIDE ON DIVISION OF BRIDGE EARNINGS

District Attorney Says Proceedings Show Ratio Is on Two to Three Fifths Basis.

EARLY ACTION RESCINDED

Contractor's Specifications Called for This Division in Paying the Cost of Construction.

The question to be decided at the next meeting of the Interstate Bridge commission Tuesday, July 10, will be, according to the opinion given today by District Attorney Walter Evans, whether or not a two-fifths and three-fifths ratio of the division of the earnings of the Interstate bridge is fair and equitable to the taxpayers of both Clark and Multnomah counties.

The district attorney indicated in his statement that the question as to whether the ratio should be two fifths and three fifths or two sevenths and five sevenths seemed clearly by the records to point to the two fifths ratio as the agreement that existed at present. To substantiate his remarks he called attention to the second provision of the specifications for the Pacific highway Interstate bridge over the Columbia river and approach, published by Weddell & Harrington, the engineers who received the contract, and the specifications which were adopted and approved by the commission. The provision states: "Multnomah county, Oregon, will pay all the cost of the Oregon approach and three fifths of the cost of the bridge over the Columbia river; Clark county, Washington, will pay two fifths of the cost of the bridge over the Columbia river."

Plan to Change Ratio Dropped

Regarding conflicts in the records Mr. Evans called attention to the fact that the provision existing in the minutes of a meeting of the commission held December 30, 1914, which disclosed the adoption of a two sevenths and five sevenths ratio upon a suggestion made by Commissioner Rufus Holman was specifically ordered canceled at the next meeting of the commission January 1, 1915.

The provision from the journal of the commission, dated Wednesday, December 30, 1914, reads as follows:

"It was suggested by Mr. Holman, and so ordered, that it is the sense of the commission that sufficient revenue be raised by tolls and franchises to pay interest on bonds of Clark county and two sevenths of the total operating and maintenance expense of the bridge, and five sevenths of the total operating and maintenance expense of Multnomah county."

The opening paragraph of the minutes of the next meeting of the commission, dated January 1, 1915, reads as follows:

"The proceedings of the meeting of the Interstate Bridge commission held on December 30, 1914, were read and approved, with the exception of the last paragraph on page 39 of the journal of said commission relative to the revenues to be raised by tolls and franchises on bonds of Clark county and operating and maintenance expenses to Clark and Multnomah counties, which was ordered canceled for the reason that it was the opinion of those present that no definite action was taken on the subject."

Former Action Rescinded

"The fact," stated District Attorney Evans, "that the last action taken by the commission was the adoption at that meeting held on April 30, 1915, of a ratio of division of earnings from the bridge on a basis of two-fifths and three-fifths, in the absence of any

Only Adless Paper In U. S. Ends Career

Chicago Day Book Forced to Suspend Publication Because of Increased Paper Cost and Other Contingencies.

Chicago, July 6.—(U. P.)—The Chicago Day Book, the only "adless" daily newspaper in the United States, suspended publication today.

N. D. Cochran, editor and publisher, announced in the last edition that the increased cost of white paper, together with other war contingencies, made it inadvisable to continue.

Cochran, who is also editor of the Toledo News-Bee, will spend most of his time in Washington. The Day Book was founded in 1911 and sold for 1 cent until last November, when it was raised to 2 cents.

German Critic Sees Worthy Foe in U. S.

Amsterdam, July 6.—(I. N. S.)—American soldiers will be worthy of the steel of the highly trained legions of Germany.

This tribute was paid to the United States forces today by Captain von Salemann, military critic of the Vossische Zeitung of Berlin. He adds that it will be necessary to reckon seriously with the United States if the war continues into 1918.

Girl's Slayer Identified

Pontiac, Mich., July 6.—Allen Livingston, 32 years old, is under arrest and has been positively identified by 10-year-old Elizabeth Stillier as the slayer of 13-year-old Hope Irene Alexander, who was assaulted and murdered in Sylvan Gardens, nine miles from Detroit, on the Fourth of July.

Count di Cellere Sends Greetings to President Aley of Education Association.

SIGNIFICANCE IN ALLIANCE

Count V. Macchi di Cellere, ambassador from Italy to the United States, replying to a letter of Robert J. Aley, president of the National Education association, asking his opinion as to what should be accomplished at the convention, sent the following greeting to the convention:

It is my pleasure, in this hour in which all the efforts of the civilized world are directed towards a new and better order of things to express to you, Mr. President, my appreciation for the kind request you make of me.

It seems to me that the solemn hour that all the martyrs who fell for the cause of civilization anticipated and died for, is well nigh at hand.

Brotherhood of Man Near

As an Italian and the representative of a great country, I have felt and feel that the association of the energy of the United States with that of the allied nations of Europe has much deeper significance than that of a despatch agreement in a moment of extreme danger for humanity.

The brotherhood of man is not a dream. It is a present reality in the U. S. A. where different races are peacefully melting, and preparing a new race with all the good characteristics of each individual that becomes a part of it. By following the hard path of duty, nations can do what individuals are striving to do.

No better medium could be found to foster the principles of human brotherhood than that of such associations as the one over which you so nobly preside.

You, gentlemen, educators of the generation that will soon be the ruling power of the world, are the ways and means through which a better understanding among men can be brought about. In your great task may the good will of men help you till peace based upon justice and freedom for all will reign upon the earth.

Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, the British ambassador to the United States, has also sent his greetings and best wishes for the success of the Portland meeting.

German Wireless Operator Arrested

Trenton, N. J., July 6.—(I. N. S.)—Prof. Jonathan Zimmick, German radio operator until recently stationed at the great German wireless station at Sayville, L. I., was arrested by federal agents at Boonton, near here, last night and removed to Ellis island. It was learned today. Federal agents refused to disclose what led to his arrest.

I. W. W. Leader Reindicted

Rockford, Ill., July 6.—(I. N. S.)—James Cully, I. W. W. leader, indicted for opposing registration and held under \$10,000 bond, was reindicted this afternoon, charged with interfering with an act of congress.

Several additional I. W. W. members were sentenced to a year and a day as slackers by Federal Judge Landis.

Spy Suspect Is Seized

Boston, July 6.—(I. N. S.)—Marine guards at the Charleston navy yard late today seized as a spy suspect a man who gave his name as John B. Fitzpatrick of Everett, Mass. He was turned over to the federal authorities.

Autos Go Wrong At Forest Grove

Forest Grove, Or., July 6.—An automobile containing the Charles Buhman family of the Kansas City section and Joe Wiles, a real estate man and automobile salesman of Forest Grove, turned turtle at Hillside when Charles Buhman, just learning to drive, ran the machine up an embankment. Franklin Buhman, a small son, was injured some about the head, and other members of the party were bruised.

Wheels were twisted from two machines in the Gales Creek section, and Fred Wilson rode off an embankment and into a canyon and escaped injury. A Forest Grove woman driving in the Balm Grove section had to steer into the bank to avoid seriousness when the brake on her machine failed to work and she shot with speed down a steep hill.

Mrs. Sage Buried

Forest Grove, Or., July 6.—The funeral of Mrs. Clara Sage, aged 65 years, was held at her home on Second avenue

this city, yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock and burial was in the Forest View cemetery. The services were conducted by Rev. R. E. Dunlap of the Methodist church of which deceased was a member.

Mrs. Sage was born at Troy, N. Y., and came to Oregon seven years ago. She is survived by six children. Two daughters and a son reside at home. Mrs. L. E. Howard, wife of the former editor of the Yamhill Record, now residing in the east, is a daughter. Mrs. Sage passed away Tuesday evening.

Manchus Plan Celebration

San Francisco, July 6.—(I. N. S.)—Fung Kuek Chung, vice president of the Chinese republic, was elected temporary president of the republican government at a meeting today of the military dictators of the provinces fighting a restoration of the monarchy, according to cable advice received by the Chinese Wireless today.

Another cable report stated that troops from Canton province are marching toward Peking today, while Emperor Huan Tung has issued a proclamation calling for a great public celebration July 19, in honor of the restoration of the Manchus to power.

Full Tax Payments On O.-C. Is Favored

Washington, July 6.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—A report from the public lands committee favoring the Chamberlain bill for full payment of taxes and penalties on Oregon & California lands is now in Senator Chamberlain's hands, ready to be presented as soon as the legislative situation permits. He will try to secure unanimous consent to consider it as an emergency bill at an early date.

Argentina Wants Kaiser to Apologize

London, July 6.—(I. N. S.)—A Buenos Aires dispatch to the Times today states that Argentina has sent a note to Berlin demanding an apology and indemnity for the destruction of the Argentine steamship Toro by a U-boat.
