Sunday Baseball Case to Be Rushed To an Early Ruling

Timber Workers Ask Advance; Talk Strike

Aberdeen, Wash., July 7.—Demands for an eight-hour day in the mills, with a minimum wage of \$3, and for a nine-hour day in the camp, with a minimum wage of \$2.50, were made on pulpworkers and logging camp operators of the country Friday by the International Union of Timber Workers, which has been in session since Monday. The union asks a conference with the employers prior to July 12, and threatens a strike unless such conference is arranged.
