

PRESIDENT ASSUMES PRACTICALLY WHOLE POWER OVER EMBARGO

Chief Executive and Advisers
Make It Clear Authority
Will Not Be Abused.

NEUTRALS ARE AFFECTED

Control of Food and Other Materials
Is Weapon Which Will Make
Central Powers Worry.

Washington, July 10.—(I. N. S.)—President Wilson Monday took the embargo power practically into his own hands. He and his advisers made it clear that it would be exercised with the greatest care. No wholesale or absolute ban upon exports will be imposed.

The powers which this embargo clause give the United States as a factor in the politics of the world are too vast to be entrusted to any but the most expert hands.

British control of the seas was insufficient to check food getting into Germany. The United States can do this absolutely.

Such diplomatic weapons as Great Britain, France and Russia have been able to use, the neutrals have at best proved but left-handed. The president now has in his right hand a weapon with which he can deal almost a death blow.

New Embargo Powers Eminent

It was predicted by diplomatic observers here that the embargo may prove one of the most important features of the war to the present time. It may mean that the United States can force an entirely new lineup against the central powers.

Our policy of restriction will be gradually constructed. The three great ends of the embargo clause in the espionage bill, under which the president will be attained with as little destruction to domestic business, as little disturbance among the allies and as little suffering among neutrals as possible.

The story that an absolute embargo on wheat and other supplies would be imposed immediately met with unqualified denial in every authoritative quarter Monday.

Embargo Machinery Organized

Developments make it clear that Secretary Redfield of the commerce department, announced as the "executive officer" of the exports control machinery, will be little more than its chief clerk. The president has been convinced that there are other and more effective methods of handling the problem than through the cut-and-dried channels of the routine commerce department.

Strengthening the belief that the embargo is one of the most important features of our foreign policies, its machinery was organized Monday largely under the dominance and along the favorite lines of Herbert C. Hoover.

The real source of light in the embargo situation will not be the formal council of cabinet officers, but an advisory board of high class volunteer experts. As at present contemplated each member of the export council will appoint one of these advisers.

Oregon Guardsmen Round Up I. W. W.

North Yakima, Wash., July 10.—(I. N. S.)—Thirty I. W. W. repose in jail here today, thanks to the "clean-up" activities of the Oregon troops. Members of the Oregon detachment arrested them last night in the I. W. W. hall, taking into custody several leaders of the agitation and has been carried on in this district.

Some of the men arrested will be later released, while charges will be placed against the others before a United States commissioner. In connection with the arrests, a large quantity of radical literature was seized.

Manufacturers Will Fight 8 Hour Day

Seattle, July 10.—(I. N. S.)—One hundred and fifty leading lumber and shingle manufacturers and loggers of Washington, at a closed door meeting today, pledged themselves by unanimous vote, to raise \$500,000 for the purpose of fighting the demands of workmen for an eight hour day. Prominent in the action taken were H. H. Blodgett, Seattle; Alex. Polson, Hoquiam; Joseph Irving, Everett; and J. G. Dickson, Tacoma.

Girl Finds Lover After Long Search

She Works Her Way to Coast From
North Dakota, Meets Old Sweetheart
in Street and Wedding Follows.

Eugene, Ore., July 10.—After a separation of several years, neither knowing of the whereabouts of the other, Granville E. Wetzel, 20 years old, and Dorothy Ford, 18 years old, who were sweethearts in Dickinson, N. D., met by chance during the Fourth of July celebration in Eugene and were married Saturday.

Wetzel came west but for some reason Miss Ford failed to hear from him. Her parents died and she started to the coast several months ago in hopes of finding Wetzel. She believed he was somewhere in Washington, California or Oregon. She had no money but traveled from town to town, working her way. She arrived in Eugene July 4 on her way south, and came upon her sweetheart on the street. They were married at the home of Wetzel's father, W. G. Wetzel, south of the city. They will live at Wendling, where the groom is working in a sawmill.

IRRIGATION PLANTS NOW UNDER PUBLIC SERVICE REGULATION

Attorney General Says Com-
mission Has Power to Or-
der Upkeep Sums Set Aside

Salem, Ore., July 10.—Irrigation companies in Oregon are being brought under the jurisdiction of the public service commission for the regulation of their service and, in some instances, of their rates.

Attorney General Brown Monday rendered a lengthy opinion to the public service commission in which he holds that the Central Oregon Irrigation company, in Crook county, is a public utility and subject to regulation by the commission.

Carry Act Involved

As the company's irrigation project, however, is being reclaimed under the Carry act, and a contract was made between the company and the desert land board as to the maintenance fees that may be charged, the attorney general holds that the public service commission has no authority to make an order changing those fees, or in any way altering the terms of the company's contract with the state.

"I am of the opinion that the commission has jurisdiction to require the Central Oregon Irrigation company to set aside out of the maintenance fees a depreciation fund to be expended in maintenance and keeping the irrigation system in a state of efficiency," says the attorney general. "The commission, however, cannot increase the charge of maintenance in order to create such a fund or to enlarge the same."

Legislature Changes Law

The construction which I am placing on the contract between the state land board and the Central Oregon Irrigation company and the public utility act does not in any way alter the terms of the contract between the company and the state land board.

"By saying that the commission has authority to require the company to maintain and keep in good condition the irrigation system is merely saying that the legislature has changed the remedy and has conferred on the commission some of the power and duties formerly exercised by the courts."

Ambassador Gerard Quits U. S. Service

Washington, July 10.—(I. N. S.)—James W. Gerard, former ambassador to Germany, has resigned from the American diplomatic service, it became known Monday afternoon. His resignation was sent to the secretary of state May 24 and one week later was accepted by the president. It was his last act. Mr. Gerard gave as his reason his desire to return to the practice of law.

Oregon Physicians Meet at Seattle

Seattle, July 10.—(I. N. S.)—More than 100 physicians of Oregon, Idaho and Washington are registered here today for the medical and surgical institute and clinic to be held this week under direction of the university extension department, aided by the King County Medical society and the Washington State Medical society.

Clinics are being held in the various hospitals.

ANARCHIST LEADERS GIVEN SENTENCES OF TWO YEARS, \$10,000

Emma Goldman and Alexan-
der Berkman Are Sent at
Once to Prison.

New York, July 10.—(U. P.)—Emma Goldman and Alexander Berkman, two of America's leading anarchists, are on their way to prison today. They will spend two years behind the bars, and longer if they don't pay their respective \$10,000 fines for interfering with conscription.

Both asked permission to remain in New York two days and wind up their affairs. It was denied by Marshal McCarthy. He said:

"I consider their further presence in New York a menace to the community. This is the beginning of the end of anarchism in New York."

They were on their way to prison within six hours after conviction.

I. W. W.'s Are Sent From Jerome

Jerome, Ariz., July 10.—(U. P.)—One hundred citizens organized a posse early today and swept through Jerome, searching every lodging house in town, rounding up I. W. W.'s. With 75 gathered, the posse started with them to the depot. A special train is held there in readiness to deport the men to Jerome Junction, 27 miles away, it is declared here.

Citizens charged attempted intimidation by I. W. W. members of union miners who have returned to work. Late yesterday the first clash of the strike occurred when a crowd of union men coming of shift became angered at being called "scabs" and chased the I. W. W.'s into the residence section.

Five Men Burn to Death in Hotel Fire

San Francisco, July 10.—(U. P.)—Five men, two of them unidentified, were burned to death early today in a fire which started in the Cosmopolitan hotel on the waterfront here and destroyed buildings on either side.

Over 50 other guests were carried to safety by the fire fighters.

The fire started in a rooming house on the waterfront here and destroyed buildings on either side.

George Burke, electrician.

Captain Thomas S. Williams, retired sea captain.

"Black Jack" Mahoney, marine fireman.

The police say Burke cut his throat in his room when he found himself cut off from escape by the flames.

The fire, starting in the Cosmopolitan, spread with such rapidity, that in a few minutes a block of structures on the Embarcadero, was in flames.

The police say the fire was caused from lighting of bedclothes by a guest of the Cosmopolitan who had been smoking in bed.

Major Portion of Peking Is Given Up

Dispatches Say Chang Hsun Has With-
drawn Troops to Imperial City—Re-
publicans Surround Peking.

Washington, July 10.—(I. N. S.)—Chang Hsun has withdrawn his troops from the major portion of Peking. The imperial city and the temple of heaven, the state department was advised today in cabled reports from Tokyo. Peking is surrounded by republican troops.

Railroad communication between Peking and Tientsin was resumed on Sunday.

In accordance with the constitution the republican government of China at Nanking has confirmed General Feng Kuo Chang as president and Tuan Chi Jui as vice president.

This information reached the state department in consular dispatches from the Orient this afternoon. Indications are that the monarchists are steadily losing ground.

Decision has been reached by the republican government, according to the state department advices, to banish the emperor, the imperial family and the imperial princes from Peking. They will be kept under surveillance. Chang Hsun, the leader of the Manchurian revolt, is reported as negotiating in Peking for guarantees of personal safety.

Fighting Believed at an End

Tokyo, July 10.—(I. N. S.)—An undated dispatch from Tientsin today says:

"Republican troops are on the point of entering Peking. General Chang Hsun, commander-in-chief of the imperial armies, has resigned. The whereabouts of the emperor is unknown. It is believed that all fighting has ceased."

Effort Will Be Made To Arrest Plotters

San Francisco, July 10.—(I. N. S.)—Strenuous efforts are being made by the United States court to prepare warrants for the arrest of the 158 men named in 195 indictments returned last Saturday by the federal grand jury in the India revolt and Sacramento cases.

Many of those named are in Germany and cannot be reached, but it is expected by United States Attorney John W. Preston that of the conspirators now in the United States all will be under arrest within the week.

It is charged that the conspirators not only sought to overthrow British rule in India, but also to send supplies from here to German men of war and to dynamite ships carrying munitions and supplies to the allies.

Some of the names of the indicted will be withheld by the government until arrests have been made.

More Money for Naval Aeronautics

Washington, July 10.—(I. N. S.)—Appropriation of \$45,000,000, in addition to the money already available for naval aeronautics, was recommended to congress this afternoon by Secretary of the Navy Daniels.

The money would be used to expand the present air service of the navy by establishing new schools and buying new air craft for school duty with the ships and coast patrol work.
