

STATE FAIR BOARD NAMES FEW JUDGES FOR ANNUAL EVENT

Partial List of Those Who
Will Award Prizes Is An-
nounced at State Capital.

SUPERINTENDENT CHOSEN

More Campers Are Asking for Space
Than Ever Before and Grounds Are
Being Improved Extensively.

Salem, Or., July 12.—Announcement was made Thursday by A. H. Lea, secretary of the state fair board, that the board has selected judges for all of the departments of the state fair, save the agricultural, floral, textile and horse departments.

Mrs. Winnie Braden, superintendent of the agricultural pavilion, has been vested with power to name the judges for the agricultural department, and she expects to announce them soon. Carlos W. Hall of Denver, Col., will judge the Holsteins, Red Polls, Brown Swiss and Dairy Shorthorns; T. A. Saunders of Maunula, Iowa, the beef cattle; Harry Jenkins of Downers Grove, Ill., the Jerseys and Guernseys; Thomas Brunk of Salem, the swine; T. B. Johnson of La Grande, the sheep; Oscar Nelson of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, the poultry; and Mrs. Alice Weister of Portland, the art exhibits.

Secretary Lea said the fair board had resubmitted Albert Tozier, superintendent of the fair campgrounds. More campers are asking for space than ever before, and a number already have made reservations. The campgrounds have been greatly improved this year. Two rest rooms, costing \$1000 each, have been erected, and a modern water system laid through the grounds. In the past there has been complaint because of lack of water, but this year there will be an abundance of water. A gravel road has been constructed to the grounds.

Road Work to Be Advertised

Salem, Or., July 12.—The state highway department Thursday announced that it would advertise for bids for the grading of the Columbia river highway in Columbia county, to be opened July 30 at the office of S. Benson, chairman of the highway commission, in Portland. The commission also is preparing to advertise for bids for the 10-year maintenance of the hard-surface roads for which the bids are to be advertised July 20.

Tannery Destroyed By Incendiary Fire

Vallejo, Cal., July 12.—(I. N. S.)—Fire Thursday destroyed the Santa Rosa-Tallejo tannery, causing a loss of \$250,000. It is believed that the fire was of incendiary origin because it is reported to have started in different parts of the plant at the same time. By the time all available fire apparatus was on the scene the fire was beyond control, although it had started only a few minutes before.

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English Roast Beef Comes From U. S. A. Secret's in Cooking

The secret is out. It is not the superiority of the English roast beef, for the choicest hunk comes from the U. S. A. The real secret lies in the cooking of the meat.

This is the declaration of Mrs. Mary Rausch of the University of Washington, in her talk before the extension department of the N. E. A.

She said: "To get the finest flavor beef must be roasted in the oven, uncovered. The secret rests with the cook and not the quality of the beef, although I visited London some years ago I took pains to investigate the reason for the famed deliciousness of the English roast beef. I believed the English beef was better than ours. Imagine my surprise when informed that the beef I relished so much in London came from the United States."

Pension-Insurance Plans Are Complete

Best Features of Canadian System
Probably Will Be Basis of Measures
Adopted for U. S.

Washington, July 13.—(U. P.)—Uncle Sam's comprehensive war pension-insurance and relief plans will be ready for submission to Secretary McAdoo very soon.

Indications now are that the best features of Canada's system for the care and pay of war men, mothers and children and aged dependents will be adopted.

Almost every war organization here has dabbled in war insurance, relief and pensions. Secretary McAdoo's activities are the only official moves along that line.

The work has been coordinated under the direction of McAdoo's official representative, Assistant Secretary Rowe, and legislation along the line of his recommendations will be drafted.

While nothing definite has been decided, it was held likely that dependents of men fallen in action will be paid an annuity, possibly in the form of interest on an original investment by the government.

It is practically certain the government will directly control practically all war pensions, relief and insurance. Assignment of the half an enlisted man's pay, which in Canada amounts to \$15 a month, is one feature of the Canadian system Uncle Sam may adopt.

A stipulated amount probably will be paid each dependent by the government weekly. This probably will be based on a graduated scale, so much for a wife, so much for each child and so much for each other dependent.

Naval Radio Station Finished

Marshfield, Or., July 12.—Work on the naval radio station at Marshfield is completed and the force of wireless operators who have been at Cape Blanco station are being transferred to this city. The marines who have been guarding the Blanco station are also to be brought here and added to the force guarding the Marshfield station. The public has not been allowed to visit the new station. It is inclosed by a high board fence and in addition by an electrified barbed wire fence. The station at Cape Blanco is abandoned.

First of Interned Ships at Manila In

Steamer Mark Beaches San Francisco Under Own Steam—More Coming With Full Cargoes.

San Francisco, July 12.—(I. N. S.)—The first of the 19 German vessels interned in Manila and seized by the United States when war against Germany was declared arrived here Thursday. The vessel is the freight steamship Mark, and left Manila with the steamship Bochun.

The Mark is a fine vessel, of 6579 tons and was not damaged by the German crew. She is second largest of the Germans interned in Manila, the Prinzess Alice, 11,000 tons, being the biggest.

The Prinzess Alice is in Manila, loading for a voyage to this city. The Mark came under her own steam.

Hundred Million Is Asked to Help Navy

Washington, July 12.—(I. N. S.)—Secretary Daniels Thursday urged congress to make an appropriation of \$100,000,000 to speed up the navy, under the emergency fund, asking for additional torpedo destroyers and the finishing of the fleet of submarine chasers.

Door of Safe Blown Off

Albany, Or., July 12.—Although the turning of the handle would have opened the safe in the office of the Solo Milling company at 810 Wednesday night burglars put in a heavy charge of "soup" and blew the door off. The contents of the safe, consisting of books and papers, were taken under a nearby warehouse and examined and were found there in the morning.

Married Women Teachers Barred In Seattle's Plan

Married women teachers are not included in the ranks of Seattle's pedagogues, according to Frank B. Cooper, city superintendent, who is a convention delegate at Portland.

The sound metropolitan claims to have 28,000 pupils in the public schools. There are 1217 teachers. Much attention is being paid to the industrial courses.

The city school system contains 16 centers of this kind where the students may carry on this line of work. Twelve hundred eighth grade pupils are now taking the industrial course in Seattle.

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Fishing Is Regarded As Good by Experts

With continued falling of water in the streams originating in the mountains, trout fishing is becoming better than ever.

Fishing in the upper Deschutes is now fairly opened, and will be at its best for the next two months. Suttle, East O'Neill and Crescent lakes are also good now.

Portland fishermen have had success in the North Umpqua at the outlet of Rock creek. Ideal weather at Klamath Falls has aided in the fishing. Blue bottle, blue upright and March brown flies are being used on the lake.

On the Nehalem river, in the vicinity of the Salmonberry, fishing is regarded as very good, a party of four catching 160 last week. The McKenzie river continues good.

The miscellaneous fishermen are reminded that croppies are being caught in Oswego lake, and crawfish are plentiful in the Tualatin river, and chinook salmon are reported running in the Alsea and Nestucca rivers.

State Golf Tourney May Go to Gearhart

There is some likelihood that the Oregon State Golf tournament and the Gearhart summer golf tournament will be merged into one big affair at the seaside resort during August.

O. W. Taylor of Gearhart has taken the matter up with President W. W. Cotton of Waverley, who in turn has placed the matter in the hands of Chairman Glass of the tournament committee to present to the board of directors. Opinion is that conditions favor the playing of the state tournament at Gearhart.

Angels Buy Tom Seaton

Los Angeles, July 12.—(U. P.)—Tom Seaton, one of the greatest right handers ever developed in the Pacific Coast league, was purchased yesterday by the Los Angeles club from the Chicago Cubs.

Seaton graduated from the Portland Coast league club about seven years ago to the Philadelphia Nationals, and has been in the majors ever since. He is expected to report to the Angels within the next week.

Greb-K. O. Bout Arranged

Pittsburg, Pa., July 12.—Harry Greb of Pittsburgh and George (K. O.) Brown of Chicago were matched yesterday to fight 15 rounds to a decision in Dayton, Ohio, July 23. The match between Greb and Zulu Kid, scheduled for July 16 in Erie, Pa., has been called off, it was announced, because the Zulu Kid failed to post a forfeit.

Salem Tourney to Open July 19
