

141 NEW CITIZENS, FLAG IN HAND, TAKE OATH OF ALLEGIANCE

N. E. A. Delegates See Aliens
Become "Good Americans"
at Auditorium Court.

LITTLE GIRLS GIVE FLAGS

Patriotic Answers Given by Applicants
Frequently Bring Prolonged Ap-
plause From Audience.

One hundred and forty-one men were admitted Thursday night into full citizenship, and 252 women and minor children derived citizenship through them at a special session of the circuit court of Multnomah county held in the Auditorium for the enlightenment of the members of the National Education association. Six of the new citizens were given their final examination, four of them being coached for it in the Portland public night schools, and the other two learning the qualifications of citizenship by themselves.

The ceremony was carried out with all the impressiveness of the usual proceedings, enlivened by the frequent applause of the many spectators. A feature of the program was the presentation to all of the new citizens of small silk American flags by the Oregon society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

As the new citizens stood to have administered to them the final oath renouncing allegiance to any foreign government and supporting the constitution of the United States of America, they held the flags in their hands. On the adjournment of court all present stood and sang the first and last verses of "America," and the first verse of the "Star Spangled Banner."

The examination of the six applicants revealed an understanding of the methods of the government of the United States and a knowledge of the election of officers and representatives that frequently brought applause from the assembly. The questions were often such as many Americans born and educated in this

country could not have answered off-hand with the ease of the new citizens. In no case did an applicant falter with his answer.

Answer Brings Applause
Much interest prevailed in the examination of Miss Margaret McArdle, who for four years has been in the employ of the county clerk's office of Multnomah county. She was a native of Scotland, and her reason for wishing to become a citizen was, she said, "Because I believe in democracy," which answer brought applause. In response to the question as to her relatives, she said she had two brothers, "One in France and one in England in a hospital. They are both serving Great Britain with the Scotch Highlanders." Again she was applauded warmly.

Henry B. Hazard, representing the United States bureau of naturalization was examiner, and as each applicant answered successfully the questions put, he announced: "The government has no objection to the admission of (name of the applicant). In each case the ceremony began with the swearing in of the applicant and two witnesses of his good behavior and standing. The witnesses were questioned, and the applicant in turn.

Judge Kavanaugh Presides
The final oath of citizenship was administered to new citizens, in groups according to nationality. Judge John P. Kavanaugh, who presided. Fourteen nations were represented, including Belgium, France, Great Britain, Italy, Russia, Austria-Hungary, Denmark, Sweden, Roumania, Holland, Switzerland and Turkey.

As the new citizens from Austria-Hungary and Turkey took the oath the audience burst out with applause. Those who took the examination were: David Abram Elkin, from Russia; Edmund Joseph Landry, from England; Edgar Schonberger, from Roumania; George Steele Hamilton, from England; Miss McArdle, from Scotland, and Isaac Krutchevsky, from Russia.

The last candidate petitioned at the close of his examination to change his name from Krutchevsky to Kay, because, "When I write it, I forget the last letters." When asked if he believed in democracy, he replied: "To prove it, I've enlisted," which brought a round of applause. He stated that he had joined an ambulance corps and expected to be called at any time. Miss McArdle was asked at the close of the ceremony the first thing she would do now that she was a full-fledged American citizen. She replied: "I'm going to learn the Star Spangled Banner. I know 'America' now."

The proceedings of the evening began with the examination of the six applicants. At the close of this, John Speed Smith, chief naturalization examiner of the department of labor at Seattle, mentioned the aid of the pub-

lic schools in instructing the applicants, and introduced James F. Ewing, vice president of the Oregon chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution, who had charge of the distribution of the flags.

Little Girls Present Flags
Mr. Ewing made a few remarks concerning the history of the flag and what it stands for, being frequently interrupted by applause. The flags were then passed to the new citizens by little Misses Nancy Bonham, Ruth Isherwood and Eleanor Kavanaugh, daughter of Judge and Mrs. Kavanaugh.

Judge Kavanaugh then made a short address to the new Americans. With the singing of the national hymn, in which the assembly was led by Professor W. H. Boyer, the ceremonies were ended.

The National Education association then held its general session. Dr. E. O. Holland, president of Washington State college; Miss Caroline Hedger of Chicago, and Charles E. Rugh of the University of California, were speakers.

Principals Oppose Anti-Draft Scheme

Meeting at an informal luncheon at the Hazelwood Thursday afternoon, a number of male principals of high schools adopted a resolution directly opposed to those for the exemption of school teachers from conscription, which have already been put before the resolutions committee of the National Education association, and in favor of which it is understood a petition is being circulated. The resolution adopted at the Hazelwood luncheon follows:

"Resolved that it is the sense of the high school principals here assembled that no male member of the teaching corps be exempt from military duty on account of his profession. Be it further resolved, that the proposed resolution as referred to in the press is contrary to the spirit that animates every loyal school man, and that we condemn the suggestion of such a resolution, whether presented formally or informally."

This resolution is signed by the principals of Lincoln, Franklin, Jefferson, Commercial, Washington and James John high schools of Portland, and by high school principals of Seattle, Tacoma, Everett, Spokane, Bellingham, Eugene, Chicago and Oakland, Cal.

Portland Police Officer Weds

Kalama, Wash., July 13. — A marriage license was issued Thursday to John B. Scott and Emma B. Scott, both of Portland and they were married by Judge G. G. Comer, in his office in the court house. The bride has been married twice before and the groom once. They were both divorced. Mr. Scott is a member of the Portland police force.

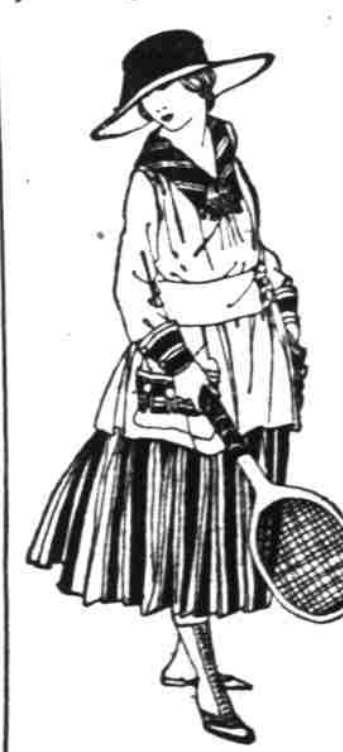
