PENDLETON MUST PAY FOR ALL WATER USED IN FLUSHING SEWERS

"Sinful Waste" in the Past Prompts City Commission to Take Steps for Remedy.

Pendleton, Or., July 13.—Hereafter the city council will have to pay for all water that goes through the sewers of the city, the water commission having served notice that it will meter all flush tanks and charge at the rate of two and one half cents a thousand gallons.

This action was taken after the commission had for three years sought to check what it claims to be a sinful waste of water in flushing the sewer system. It claims 1,000,000 gallons of water daily has been going through the flush tanks, whereas a small part of that will suffice. The council is rebelling but the commission claims it is backed by legal opinion.

Employment Office to Open
Pendleton, Or., July 13.—It was announced Thursday afternoon that the government will open a free employment agency in this city between July 15 and 20, with Mr. Green, who has been in charge at Hood River, as representative of the United States labor department. P. A. Robbins of Portland made arrangements with a local committee and an office may be maintained all the year. It is estimated there are 1700 farmers near Pendleton who employ labor.

Injured Leg Is Amputated
Pendleton, Or., July 13.—J. R.

Brown, an aged resident of this city, Thursday had a leg amputated as a result of injuries at Lexington recently when a vicious jack attacked him. The animal seized him above the knee and shook him as a cat would a mouse. Not until it was beaten almost insensible with a club did the animal release its hold. Brown's life was despaired of for a time as the bones were crushed and the wound became infected. However, it is believed amputation will save his life.

Pastor Saves Woman's Life
Pendleton, Or., July 13.—Rev. E. E. Gornall, minister of the Methodist church, figured in the roll of lifesaver Wednesday at the lake near Meacham, when he rescued Mrs. M. L. Stockham from drowning. They were members of a fishing party and were in the middle of the lake fishing from a raft when Mrs. Stockham fell into the water. The minister jumped in after her and though she is a large woman, while he is small, physically, succeeded

in getting her back to the raft and towing her to shore.

Indian Wheat Land Is Sold
Pendleton, Or., July 13.—Two pieces of Indian wheat land were sold Wednesday through the Umatilla agency and both brought good prices. Bruno Weber purchased 160 acres, on south reservation adjoining his farm, for \$17,120. The land belonged to the mother of Michel Wilson, Tom Thompson purchased 80 acres situated on the north reservation for \$10,480. The land is known as the Ealoni land and formerly was farmed by Charles Hamblin.

Farmer Dies While Bathing
Corvallis, Or., July 13.—A. J. Ogleby, a resident of Alsea, was found dead in a bathing pool at Breitenbush Springs Sunday. The body was taken to Alsea for burial. He was a well known farmer of the Alsea country.

Youth Is Downed In Umpqua River

Roseburg, Or., July 13.—Wesley McGee, 15-year-old son of William McGee, a local timber man, was drowned in the south Umpqua river at Roseburg Thursday afternoon. He was swimming with other boys under the Oak street bridge when he got into deep water and drowned before help could reach him. The other boys were smaller than he, and none was a good swimmer. The body was recovered by Ialo Stephens and Ralph Lane, after being in the water less than 10 minutes, but medical aid failed. The boy was popular and a member of the juvenile band.

Timber Land Changes Hands
Eugene, Or., July 13.—The purchase of a half section of timber above Wending for \$25,000 from the Puget

Sound Timber company of Seattle, was announced Thursday by the Booth-Kelly Lumber company. It was acquired as a reserve supply in connection with logging operations of the company on the upper Mohawk river east of Eugene. The timber is within easy access of the company's extensive system of logging railways in operation in that locality.

NORTH BEND SHIPYARD UNDER SPECIAL GUARD AGAINST DEPREDAATION

Threat by I. W. W. to Burn Steamer Virginia Olson Before Launching Is Reason.

Marshfield, Or., July 13.—Special guards have been placed at the Kruse & Banks shipyard in North Bend because of threats said to come from the I. W. W. to burn the vessel Virginia Olson before it is launched next Saturday. Whether the threat was in earnest or a boast, could not be learned but the owners felt justified in putting armed guards at the shipyard during the night. District Attorney Reames of Portland and R. P. Bonham, representing the federal department of labor, are investigating the I. W. W. in the locality. They have asked the district attorney of Coos county to furnish any evidence procurable as to the operations of the organization.

Law Must Be Enforced
Marshfield, Or., July 13.—United States District Attorney Reames is here regarding the I. W. W. operators, has instructed District Attorney Hall and City Attorney Brand to enforce the bone dry law and if they find liquor on any of the incoming vessels to arrest the officers and owners of the craft. He says that in this way the bone dry law can be actually enforced.

Shipyards May Be Commandeered
Marshfield, Or., July 13.—There is a rumor here that the Kruse & Banks shipyard at North Bend may be taken over and operated as a Federal shipbuilding plant and greatly enlarged. There is no verification of the report here.
