

BILLY SUNDAY IS TO SPEAK AT GLADSTONE CHAUTAUQUA SUNDAY

Closing Day of Gathering Is
Set as Date When Noted
Evangelist Will Appear.

CHAPLAIN GILBERT TALKS

Army Men Defended From Charges of
Immorality—Oregon Boys Are
Praised for Patriotism.

Oregon City, Or., July 18.—Billy Sunday, noted evangelist, is to speak at the Gladstone Chautauqua Sunday afternoon, the closing day, at 2 o'clock. This announcement was made Wednesday by Secretary Burke, after President C. H. Ivey and Directors Chris Schuebel and J. W. Loder and Rev. J. W. MacCallum, pastor of the local Congregational church, made a hurried automobile trip to Hood River, the summer home of the evangelist, and prevailed upon Mr. Sunday to address the Chautauqua gathering on this day. When the party reached Hood River they were met by "Mr. Sunday," who said "no." This did not deter the visitors from "going after" Billy himself, and they kept after him until he consented to appear.

Opera Company Billed
With the Boston Light Opera company to make its appearance twice, once in the popular comic opera, "Chimes of Normandy," and the fine new auditorium to be opened in the evening, Thursday is expected to be the biggest day yet of the Gladstone Chautauqua, with next Sunday, the closing day, capping the climax of the 13 days' session.

It is believed that Saturday also will be one of the really big days, because of the lecture by Dr. Frank Bohn, European correspondent of the New York Times, who will speak on "The Mind of Germany." Because of his wide knowledge of continental conditions, his extensive acquaintance with leaders of the social movement there, and his freedom of access to both the countries of the entente and central powers, Dr. Bohn has been recognized as one of the foremost of European correspondents.

In addition to Dr. Bohn on Saturday the Chautauqua has a double bill with the Musical Arts quartet and Montaville Flowers, who will lecture in the evening on "Guarding the Golden Gate." Saturday will also be Chautauqua county day, and the people of the county are expected to flock in.

Chaplain Gilbert Speaks
Introducing Major W. S. Gilbert, chaplain of the Third Oregon regiment, as the speaker of the morning, Mrs. Kemp, chairman of the forum hour, said she was proud to know that the mothers of Oregon had such a splendid man in whose keeping they could place their sons, and feel that they would be given moral training that would be of much benefit to them. Major Gilbert in his opening remarks complimented Oregon for its splendid response to the call to arms. He asked his audience how many knew a soldier among the number that had enlisted from Oregon, or had written letters to a soldier, or had done anything for them, with the result that a great many hands went up. Major Gilbert said his men were anxious and ready to receive the "boys" which were being made by the W. C. T. U. members.

The patriotism of the young men of Woodburn was reviewed by Chaplain Gilbert in his comment to the effect that in a little town of but 3200 people, 182 young men had enlisted in the Third Oregon and that there wasn't a young man left in the town. Here the chaplain took occasion to rap Portland, which, he said, had not been able to respond.

Soldiers Are Defended
He said that it made his blood boil when people talked about the soldier boys becoming bad after they joined the army, or that they were the riff-raff of a community, and that educational centers should be protected from the immoral influences that might be thrown out by military camps in close proximity. The chaplain said that rather there more danger to the military camps from the presence of the cities and educational centers than otherwise.

For an hour Wednesday afternoon Hon. W. L. Nolan of North Dakota entertained an almost-packed auditorium as he spoke on "We the People." He pictured the many nationalities that make up the more than 100,000,000 people of the United States, creating considerable laughter and amusement as he spoke the language of several. He said that the American people could always be depended upon to battle for the right, and predicted that democracy was sure to win in the end.

Bankers Get Behind Whiskey Under Ban

They Appear Before Congressional
Committees to Get Commandeering
Section Eliminated from Food Bill.

Washington, July 19.—(I. N. S.)—Thirty bankers of New York, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Kentucky, Ohio and other states appeared before a joint meeting of the senate finance and agriculture committees and also before the house ways and means committee Wednesday afternoon to urge the elimination of the whiskey commandeering section of the food bill.
The bankers said they had no interest in the future manufacture of alcohol. They insisted, however, that the whiskey now in bond was put there under legal contract with the government and that approximately \$120,000,000 of loans had been made by the banks on warehouse receipts.
The disposition of this whiskey, they declared, should be governed by existing law.

Deutschland Agent Now in Germany

Baltimore, Md., July 19.—(U. P.)—Captain Frederick Hinsch, former agent for the North German Lloyd interests, who handled all the details for the overseas trip of the cargo submarine Deutschland, is now in Germany.
Shortly before the United States entered the war federal authorities placed a watch on Hinsch, but his friends believe he escaped on a small sailing vessel and was picked up by a German submarine at sea.

Marshfield Strikers Will Continue Fight

Marshfield, Or., July 19.—The men who are still on strike at the C. A. Smith mill held a meeting and passed resolutions approving a more vigorous prosecution of the strike and the electing of a strike manager. They declared that the strike is not over, as far as they are concerned, and that they are picketing outside the mill will be kept up.

O. A. C. TO 'DO BIT' IN INCREASING NEW GRAIN PRODUCTION

Special Courses in Inspection
and Standardization to Be
Added to Courses.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, July 19.—Increased production of cereals, including wheat, oats, barley, rye and corn and of potatoes and beans is the most promising way of meeting the food shortage crisis. No one can say how long it will be before the world accumulates a surplus of food, and it is the purpose of the Oregon Agricultural college to lay special stress on the scientific production of these food materials—getting maximum yields at least cost.
Grading the cereals for scientific marketing along the lines of the new standardization regulations will require the services of grain samplers and graders, and the college is prepared to help solve this problem by training men in accordance with the need as expressed by the bureau of markets of the United States department of agriculture.
That the college is in position to take care of this problem of training young men is exemplified by the fact that the farm crops department of the college has been acting in an advisory capacity to the public service commissions of Oregon and Washington in the formulation of the new state grades for grain and hay which are to be applied in the two states.
The college has already provided a number of men for this kind of work, and has added a considerable amount of special equipment to provide well trained men for grain inspection and grain standardization work which is of such vital importance to the producer and the consumer of cereal products.
This work is not only important in the national emergency, but it also offers a very attractive and lucrative field for students who qualify themselves for it. Four or five men have already been taken into the United States bureau of markets. The grain grading work will be featured in both regular and in short courses during the coming school year.
