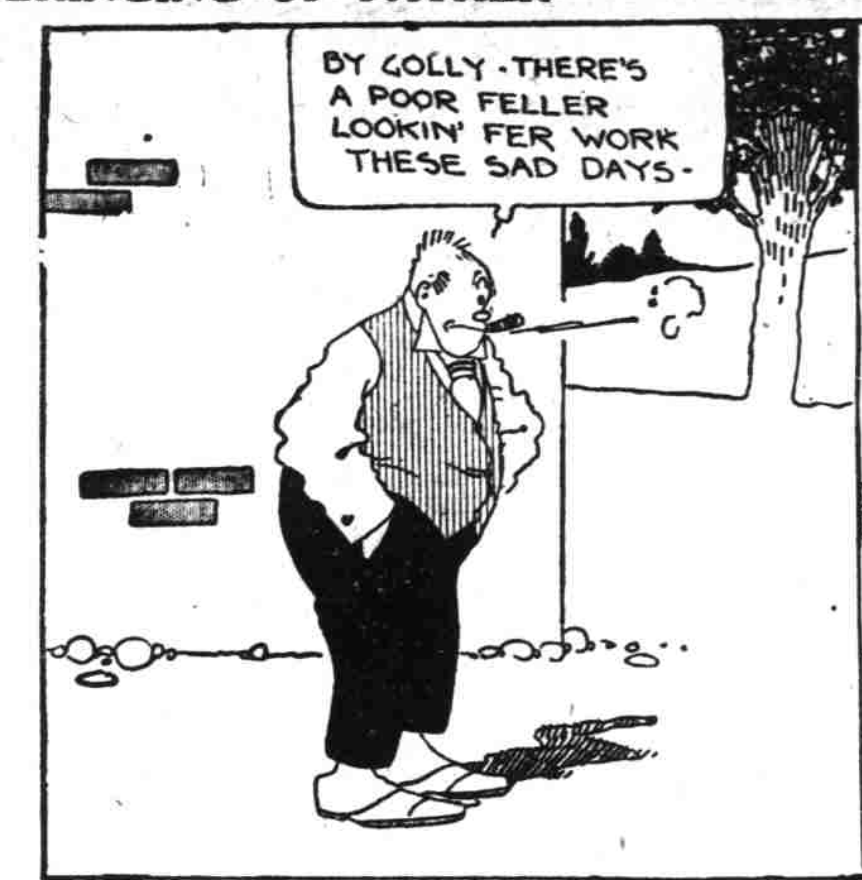

London Does Honor To American Nurses

How Members of First Unit Were Received on Arrival There. San Francisco, July 21.—(U. N. S.)—How the first unit of American nurses, reaching London recently, were received by Lord Knutsford at the London hospital, is told in a letter of war conditions received here by Mrs. I. B. Spence Rideoot from her sister, Eva E. C. Luckes, matron of the hospital.

After observing war conditions abroad, the writer casually informs her sister that she was awarded the Royal Cross and that it was presented to her personally by Queen Alexandra, who came to the hospital for that purpose. Of the nurses' arrival she says:

I am told that American nurses are better paid than their fellow workers in England. Lord Knutsford wrote to tell me that none of these nurses had a salary of less than 150 pounds, and some a good deal more.

One Thousand Acres Burned
