

SECOND INSTALLMENT DUE AT BANKS FRIDAY ON LIBERTY BONDS

Payments, in Order to Reach
Reserve Bank by July 30,
Must Be Made Early.

If you are buying Liberty bonds on the installment plan allowed by the government, your second payment will be due at the bank Friday.

Liberty loan regulations provide that the payment must be made July 20, but that means the money must be in the federal reserve bank at San Francisco on that date. Inasmuch as it takes 48 hours for cash transfers from Portland to San Francisco, the banks are requesting that the payments be made not later than Friday, July 27.

In a number of instances Liberty bond subscribers have not yet paid their first installments, due June 28. The banks have had to pay these installments, in order to keep the bonds from being forfeited on the purchase. The banks in a short time probably will do something to declare the defaulting of these bonds, as it will be impossible for the financial institutions to carry them much longer.

Guard Reserve Members Called.
Mobilized for service for the first time today were the 12 companies of coast artillery, four troops of cavalry, two batteries, four engineer companies, the field hospital squad and the headquarters company.

The infantry organizations of the Oregon National Guard have been in service for several months and are at various points in the northwest guarding public works, shipbuilding plants and quelling I. W. W. disorders. They will be called in when local conditions will permit.

In addition to the call to the regular troops, calls for 64 members of the Oregon National Guard Reserve were sent out Tuesday. Transportation was forwarded the men and they will join various organizations.

Eugene, Or., July 25.—Three hundred men of the coast artillery corps slept "on their arms" here last night in readiness for today's call. Those who came from outside points slept at the armory. The home boys slept at home.

The headquarters staff and Second and Third companies are located in Eugene. The Second company is largely made up of students of the University of Oregon, and all of them have arrived from their homes in different parts of Oregon and Washington.

Ashland Men Entertained
Ashland, Or., July 25.—The members of the First company, coast artillery, of Ashland were given a big "sendoff" by the Elks' lodge, with the Honor Guard girls and the local Red Cross members assisting. The entertainment was a great success and the soldiers and their friends all had the time of their lives. Games and general good time were enjoyed till later in the evening when the merry-makers joined in the dancing.

Albany Company Ready
Albany, Or., July 25.—Captain R. R. Knox, First Lieutenant A. C. Baker and Second Lieutenant Clarence Collins and 127 men gathered at the local armory this morning under mobilization orders. They will remain in training at Albany for several days, but expect to leave August 1. The men will be put through stiff open field work, hiking and bayonet drilling while here.

The men are being fed by three restaurants, and those who live too far from the armory are sleeping in the buildings. Those within a few blocks are permitted to remain at home nights.

The men are all in fine spirits and say they are anxious to see service in France.

Hood Company Responds
Hood River, Or., July 25.—Patriotism is at a high pitch in Hood River. Company 12, coast artillery, composed of about 75 young men from Hood River homes, was called into government service and mobilized this morning at the city park, where they will remain in training for a week. It is reported, before assembling at the state mobilization headquarters, Captain George E. Wilbur is in charge of the company and has given his personal attention in the matter of the supervision of arming quarters for his men at the city park.

A dance at the armory hall last night in honor of the artillery boys and the proceeds were applied to the mess fund of the company. Over 500 couples attended the dance. The music was furnished free by local musicians.

Harrisburg Entertains Boys
Harrisburg, Or., July 25.—A rousing farewell was given last night in honor of the Harrisburg boys who entered the federal service today. The affair was sponsored by the local Red Cross chapter. An appropriate program was given, the principal speaker being Milton A. Miller of Portland. Mrs. Rose Powell of Eugene sang.

The boys are members of the Third company, coast artillery, at Eugene. They are: Bryan Smith, Howard War-mouth, Cecil Hayes, Robert Hayes, Joseph Somerville and Gail Hathaway.

Tacoma Units Respond
Tacoma, Wash., July 25.—(U. P.)—About 800 strong local units of the national guard, hitherto unmobilized, assembled at the state armory here today, in obedience to the call of the war department, and were formally transferred to the federal service. The troops will remain here until orders are received directing them to proceed to the California training camp.

Included in the newly mobilized organization are coast artillery, cavalry, signal corps, field hospital and sanitary troops. All are in excess of their war strength.

Cove Adds Quota
Cove, Or., July 25.—Three more Cove boys have gone to the "front." They

are Grever Duffy, Ralph Hancock and Tom Jones. This makes 29 Cove boys who have volunteered for service. Monday night the Red Cross people of Cove gave a banquet and go-away party to these boys who are now leaving for the front. Addressed by Otto, chairman of the Red Cross, and Rev. Pratt of the M. E. church.

All But Five Will Pass
San Francisco, July 25.—(U. P.)—Of 128 student officers from the Presidio training camp who took examinations for regular army commissions, all but five will be passed and will be given provisional second lieutenants' commissions, according to announcement today.

Drafted Man Has Chance
San Francisco, July 25.—(U. P.)—Being drawn for the first quota of the national army does not prevent enrollment in the second officers' reserve corps training camp, according to orders received by the training camp today. In case a drafted man is seeking admission to the second Presidio camp, he is directed to take his examinations for the reserve corps in the regular order and if selected for the training camp, his release from the draft army can be secured, according to Colonel M. W. Rowell, in charge of the training camp preparations.

Army in France Is Busy
Permanent Camp of the American Army in France, July 25.—(U. P.)—Staff officers made one more change today. The day was rearranged so that in the mornings the American soldiers will drill by themselves in tactics already acquired and in the afternoon will join the French soldiers in learning new stunts in trench fighting.

An intensive telephone system connecting all the camps was completed today.

Headquarters entertained at luncheon an army officer formerly connected in an important capacity with the Panama canal building.

Second Call Perhaps Next Year
Washington, July 25.—(U. N. S.)—The second increment of the national army of the United States will not be called until 1918, unless there is some change in the war plans now in the hands of the war department.

"I have prepared the machinery of the draft for but one turn this year," said Provost Marshal General Crowder today, "although, of course, the secretary of war and the general staff may order a change. At the present time, however, it is the plan to prepare only the first increment of 687,000."

Men chosen in the first draft will be mobilized early in the fall. General Crowder explained today that it is the present plan to order all men held for service to report to their local boards on a certain date. When all the men are assembled they will be turned over to the war department and come under military jurisdiction for the first time. The quartermaster general and the adjutant general of the general staff will then take the men in hand and arrange for their transportation to cantonments.

Two rules will be followed in assigning men to cantonments, first, to keep all states' contingents together wherever possible and, second, to send each contingent to the nearest cantonment.

War Bill of U. S. Will Be \$17,000,000,000
Senator Smoot Tells Senate Yesterday's Figures Were Too Low; Loans to Allies Are Added.

Washington, July 25.—(U. N. S.)—America's war bill, including budgets already voted and new sums to be asked by the administration, will reach the stupendous total of \$17,000,000,000, the report smoot of Utah, one of the leading financial experts in congress, informed the senate today.

Senator Smoot yesterday gave the total as \$14,000,000,000. He told the senate he had been told by the treasury department that the total by figures he obtained last night in addition to the \$5,000,000,000 war department budget.

The new sums are: \$2,000,000,000 for a new loan to the allies, \$500,000,000 for additional shipbuilding, \$150,000,000 for general deficiencies in the various departments.

Meanwhile the big war revenue bill was resting in the finance committee's pigeon hole awaiting the arrival of figures from Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo showing in detail the needs which the \$5,000,000,000 war department budget must meet.

The big problem confronting the committee is how much, if any, of the \$5,000,000,000 needed by the war department is to be obtained through the new revenue bill.

Canneries Guarded By Federal Troops
San Jose, Cal., July 25.—(U. P.)—With United States troops in camp near the Pratt-Lowe fruit cannery at Santa Clara, ready to go on duty with the first sign of violence in the strike of 2000 fruit cannery, the strike situation was quiet today.

The troops, detachments from the Fourth and Ninth companies of United States artillery, were ordered to the scene from Camp Fremont by Major General Hunter Liggett on request of a committee of San Jose and Santa Clara officials and cannery men.

Meanwhile Sheriff A. B. Langford has sworn in many extra deputies and is preparing to cope with any repetition of the riot of yesterday when one man was killed and two wounded in a clash outside the Pratt-Lowe plant.

The strike has tied up nearly all the canneries in this vicinity but has not yet affected the Pratt-Lowe plant.

California Forest Fires Under Control
San Francisco, July 25.—(U. N. S.)—After days and nights of fire fighting, the forest fires that are burning in the mountains near Santa Cruz and Guerneville are under control today. The Santa Cruz fire is raging along a 10 mile front on the west ridge, and is within 2 1/2 miles of Boulder creek, but its spread has been stopped, according to latest reports. The Guerneville blaze is confined to a small strip along Gilliam creek.

Elliott Is Chairman Of Northern Pacific
New York, July 25.—(U. N. S.)—At a meeting of the executive committee of the Northern Pacific Railway company, Howard Elliott was elected chairman.

MRS. MARY POTTER, A PIONEER OF 1852, IS DEAD AT AGE OF 87

First Husband Met Death at
Hands of Indians in Rogue
River District in 1855.

Oregon has lost another of its historic pioneer characters in the death early today of Mrs. Mary Potter of Clackamas station, following a general collapse due to advanced years.

Mrs. Potter had just passed the eighty-seventh milestone in her life's journey. She belonged to the rapidly disappearing group of courageous men and women who crossed the plains in 1852. The hardships of the long journey by ox team were the lot of Mrs. Potter. By the time the travelers reached their destination in the Rogue river country they had lost practically all their stock and were left to break ground for their new home as best they could.

Husband Killed by Indians
Mrs. Potter's first husband was William Guest, who was killed by the Indians in the war in the Rogue river district in 1855. In 1857 she married Edwin Potter at Jacksonville, Or. Mr. Potter died at Salem in 1870. He was a bricklayer by trade and built the first brick structure in the town of Silverton.

Three children were born from the first union, and four from the second marriage. Those surviving her are: Mrs. E. J. Calf of Los Angeles, Mrs. Lucy E. Long of Vancouver, B. C., John Guest of Josephine county and George Potter of Clackamas.

Funeral Date Not Set
Mrs. Potter, while a Republican, never qualified as a voter, but always took a keen interest in politics. She was also a devout member of the Methodist Episcopal church. Her death is mourned by a wide circle of friends. She had lived the greater part of her life in Oregon, although for several years she made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Calf, at Los Angeles.

Interment will be at the Clackamas cemetery, in charge of the Holman Undertaking company. The date of the funeral will be announced later.

Millard F. Bird
Millard F. Bird, 268 Stanton street, was instantly killed by a fall from a silo scaffold near Gaston, Tuesday afternoon. Mr. Bird was born in Oregon City 62 years ago, and has lived in the state most of the time since. He is survived by the widow, Mrs. Lydia Bird, and five children, Mrs. I. B. Thomas, Ray J. Bird, R. L. Bird, Robert Bird and Maxine Bird. His three sisters are: Mrs. N. N. Robbins of Oregon City, Mrs. Rachael Ford of Sherwood and Mrs. Elisabeth Corby of Salem. His brother is William Bird of Willhoit. Or. The funeral services will be at Finley's undertaking parlors at 1 o'clock Thursday afternoon. Rev. J. C. Robbley of the Red Key Avenue Christian church will deliver the funeral sermon. The body will be cremated at the Sellwood crematorium.

Rev. James Milton Willoughby
Rev. James Milton Willoughby, chaplain at the Portland sanitarium, died Tuesday at that institution, aged 62. Mr. Willoughby came to Portland in 1916 from Idaho. He formerly resided at Boise, Cambridge and other sections of that state. He was at one time a member of the Idaho legislature. Rev. Mr. Willoughby leaves four sons, H. E., Clovis, Or., Pearl E. and N. M., Cornelius, Or., and E. Willoughby, Tacoma. J. P. Finley and Son have charge of the funeral arrangements.

Selling From Doors Of Cars Is Stopped
Washington, July 25.—(U. N. S.)—The long established practice of selling merchandise and produce from the doors of freight cars on sidings was broken up by the interstate commerce commission today in a decision which upheld railroad interests in opposition to the contention of the Nebraska State Grange and other western farming and merchandising interests.

It has been the practice for farmers to ship produce to cities and sell from the car doors, taking advantage of the free time allowed by the railroad before the collection of demurrage. The commission today declared this service is neither the shippers' right nor the carriers' duty and that a railroad is a transportation agency which cannot be expected to perform extraneous services of this character.

Oregon Guardsman Dies in His Bed
Roseburg, Or., July 25.—Gus Garren, private in company I of Woodburn, stationed here as a guard, died suddenly Tuesday night of heart trouble. He went to bed at the armory in apparent good health, but died suddenly in his bed.

Garren was about 32 years of age and has two brothers in the same company doing guard duty. It was his brother who was pushed off a high trestle in Southern Oregon a couple of months ago and nearly killed. The young man's home was at Hubbard, where his parents reside.

Cleveland Has Four Murders One Night

Woman Has Throat Slashed, Lover Is Shot and Woman's Husband Sought—Lost Latchkey Causes Death.

Cleveland, Ohio, July 25.—(U. N. S.)—Police today put two murder mysteries together and went on the trail of one man instead of two.

The body of a prosperous appearing Italian was found in an excavation at the new freight terminal with two bullet holes in the back of the head.

Mrs. Angela Laratta, 31, was murdered last night in her home while her 2-year-old child cried in its crib. Her throat had been slashed.

The police later learned Mrs. Laratta was separated from her husband for the second time three weeks ago. They also were told that the man's body found in the cave was the sweetheart

of the woman. Laratta is being sought.

Two other persons were slain during the night. Casinere Marynys forgot his latchkey and attempted to climb into a window at his boarding house. The proprietor, Joe Graczyk, shot and

killed him. Police charged Graczyk with murder, as they say he made no attempt to identify the man.

Guiseppa Labanardo, Italian, is held for the murder of an unidentified man with whom he argued last night. The man slain was shot four times.

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
