**Burman to Get Fights**

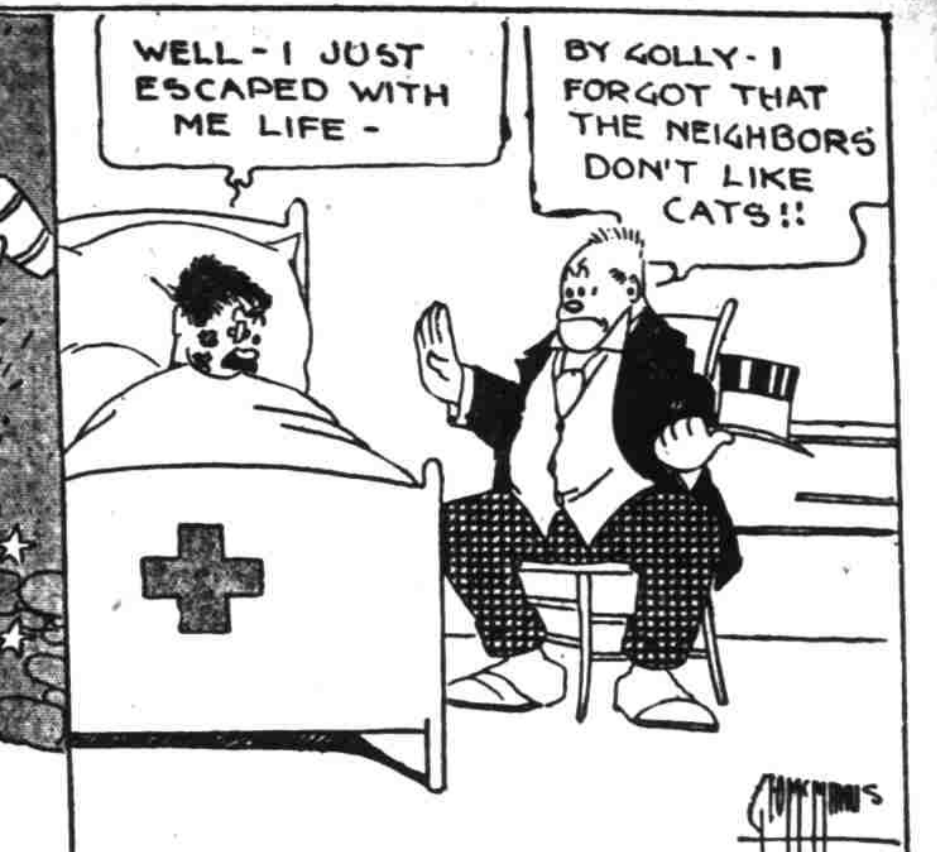
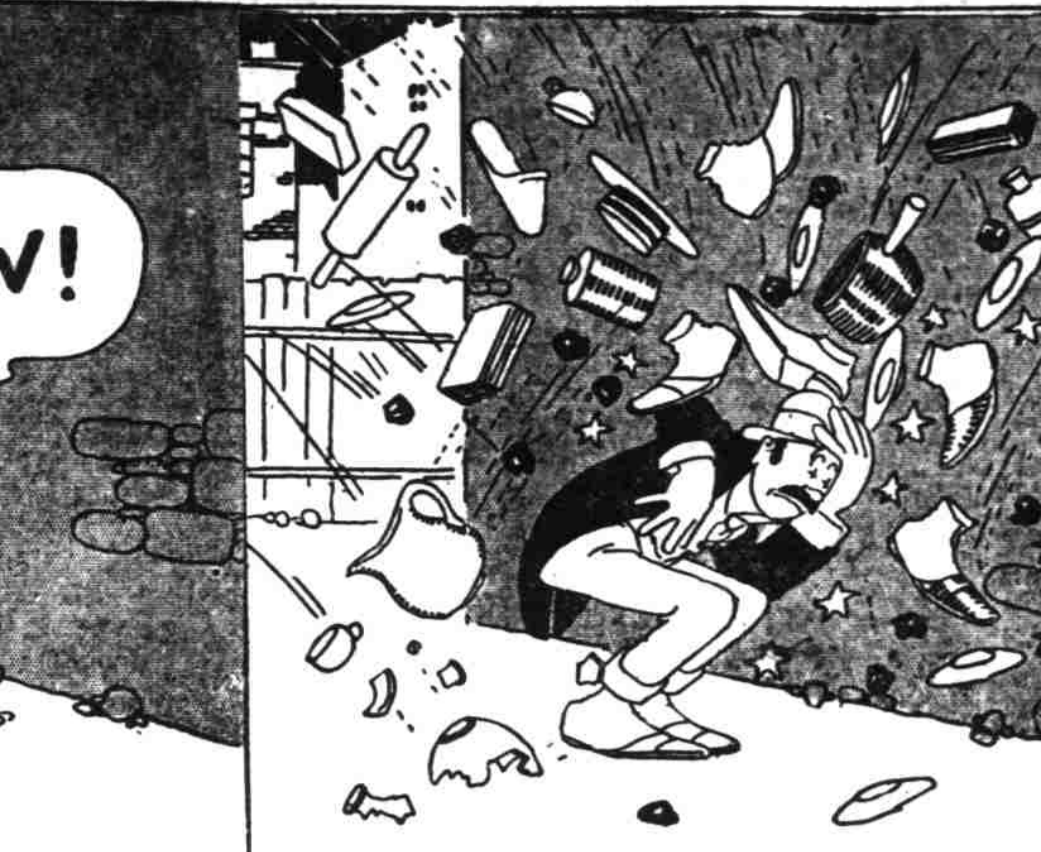

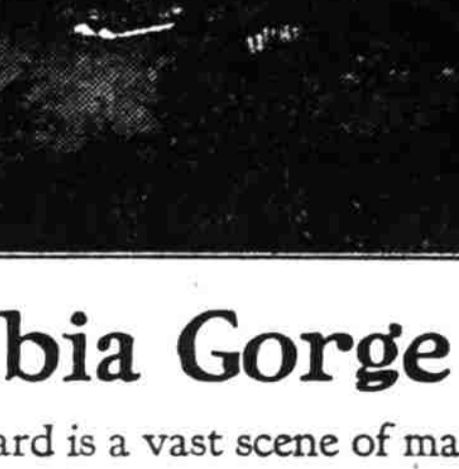
**Former Collector Scott Not Guilty**

"The latest news from Russia is not good, but Russia is a land of surprises and her resources are inexhaustible."

## British Air Control Plan Suggested Here

Washington, July 28.—(I. N. S.)—Congressman Hulbert of New York Friday submitted to the senate committee on military affairs, which has under consideration the Sheppard-Hulbert bill creating a department of aeronautics, a substitute for that measure.

"The substitute makes official the organization for the aircraft production board, coordinating the activities of the war and navy departments in connection therewith. It is understood that the plan closely follows the English system, and that it will have the support of both Secretaries Baker and Daniels. Neither has been friendly to the original measure."
