

SOCIAL LIFE GOES ON IN RUSSIA DESPITE ALL AUTHORITY IS LACKING

Belgian Minister of State Is
Fearful of What Would Be
Similar Fate in London.

PRODUCTION FALLING OFF

Factories Operate Without Foremen
and Wage Increases Are Every-
where Demanded by Workers.

London, July 30.—M. Vandervelde, Belgian minister of state, returned from a trip to Russia. He writes his impressions for a London newspaper as follows:

"At the moment of my departure from Russia I should like to sum up my impressions. Renan used to say apropos of the French revolution: 'Let us be careful not to apply our little, reasonable, bourgeois programmes to events of such amplitude.' The same must be said now of the Russian revolution.

Grips of Steel Broken
"In a single day the government of an empire of 180 million souls, which had jealously destroyed all local autonomies, has crashed down, dragging with it in its fall the Duma, which was but a body of privileged men, a mere shadow of a national representation.

"What was, is no longer, and what is to be, is not yet. The chaotic state of the finances, the disorder in the food supply, the chaotic condition of transport, the systematic disorganization of the army which were causes of the revolution; all these now appear in the light of day. The grip of steel that hitherto gave a semblance of cohesion to the Russian state has been broken apart, and individuals and

groups are acting on their own impulses.

Soldiers Imprison Officers
"The non-Russian peoples are proclaiming their independence; the industrial workers are claiming control over the factories, the soldiers are professing submission to no other discipline than that of their committees, granting themselves holidays without leave to go and see what is going on in their villages, imprisoning officers with whom they are discontented, and not content with having their delegates in the provisional government, exercising on the larger, through the intermediary of their councils of workmen and soldiers' delegates, a control over every step.

"Finally, the peasants, too, in their turn, are stirring, and in certain districts are showing a disinclination to await the reunion of the constituent assembly before exercising their rights to recover the land.

Anarchy is Upon Russia
"In short, full anarchy is upon Russia, and it is not surprising that it should be so on the morrow of a revolution which is the most thoroughgoing that has ever happened.

"But what does astonish us westerners is that the anarchy, this eclipse of authority, has not at all the consequences that it would inevitably have in France or England or Belgium.

"Up to the last few days, for example, Petrograd has no longer any police or gendarmery or public force of any kind; nothing but a militia of volunteers, thinly distributed and powerless. Were such a state of affairs to exist in London or Paris or Brussels in the midst of a period of revolutionary tension, frightful things would be certain to happen.

Social Life Goes On
"Here there is no such consequence have for a few expropriations and a few individual misdeeds. Lenin and his friends make themselves at home in the palace of a ballet dancer; anarchists try to lay hands upon the topographical material of a conservative journal. But amidst a general calm which is perfect, absolute, almost disconcerting, social life goes on; innumerable meetings are held without ever the conflict of opinions giving rise to interruptions by violence or troubles or disorders.

"From the point of view of tolerance and courtesy we would have much to learn from Russian gatherings. The most absolute freedom of the platform exists at them, not merely as a right but in fact.

"Similarly in the factories every

man works as his own head directs him. The foremen have no voice. The discipline of authority is absolutely non-existent, and it is true that all this does not work out well. Production has gone down considerably. The leaders of industry find it impossible to face the formidable demands for increases of wages, though on the other hand these are to be explained by the depreciation of paper money and the fantastic increase in the cost of living.

"Yet if all this does not work well, nevertheless it does work, and there is good reason to believe that once the first intoxication of the revolution is over it will work better."

China Plunged Into Second Revolution

New Republic Is Set Up at Canton
and Possibility of Declaration of
War Upon Germany Appears Gone.

Peking, July 30.—(U. N. S.)—The complete disruption of China, first by the effort to restore the monarchy, and now by the revolution in which two separate republics are being set up, has removed all chance of a declaration of war on Germany at this time.

The division of the country is growing. News comes that a separate government is being set up in Canton, although there is some opposition to it in high councils there.

It is learned definitely that the United States is not in any way urging China to enter the war, as has been reported. America has made no move since her original words of advice to the warring factions to get together, which caused such an unpopular impression in Japan.

The government here is faced by a serious financial situation, the outcome of which no one is able to judge. The finance minister is trying desperately to devise schemes for raising a loan, but Japan appears to be the only country where money can be obtained and the terms offered by Tokio are very high.
