THEATRES AND ACTORS WILL DONATE A DAY'S INCOME TO RED CROSS

Calvin Heilig and E. A. Erlanger Announce Plans to Aid Humanitarian Cause.

NEW REGULATIONS ON CENSORSHIP ARE PLACED IN OPERATION

Failure of Associated Press to Comply With Official Requests Results in Change.

Chapters of the American Red Cross throughout the United States are planning to give full cooperation with theatrical managers who will in October devote one day's receipts to the Red Cross fund. Calvin Heilig of Portland has volunteered to aid in the humanitarian cause.

A. L. Erlanger, prominent nationally as a theatrical exponent, who is half owner of the Heilig theatre, announced briefly the plan for the nationwide benefit, during his recent visit to Portland. Mr. Erlanger is national chairman for the benefit.

Under the plan proposed the actors will contribute their day's salary to the fund. More than 250 of the most prominent theatrical managers of the country have promised to assist in the undertaking. Special performances will be run and the patrons will be expected to pay extra prices.

Henry P. Davidson, chairman of the war council of the American Red Cross, is generalissimo of the benefit scheme.

In New York a committee has been appointed, composed of many of the greatest leaders in the theatrical world, and will include Marc Klaw, David Belasco, Les Shubert, George J. Cohan, Sam H. Harris, Henry W. Savage, Oliver Morosco, Charles Dillingham, Arthur Hammerstein, Florenz Ziegfeld, Marcus Loew, E. F. Albee, Martin Beck, Alf Hayman, A. H. Woods, Gorstock, Elliot and Casselwyn & Co., John D. Williams, and Sam Scribner.

Tens of thousands of New York other committees are being formed, composed of theatrical leaders in their respective territories. These committees and local Red Cross authorities will cooperate in making the undertaking a nation-wide success.

I. W. W. Sentenced At Klamath Falls
Klamath Falls, Or., Aug. 1.—Sentences imposed on I. W. W. members here charged with vagrancy, by Justice of the Peace E. W. Gowan, range from 30 days in the county jail and costs, to six months imprisonment and \$100 fine. In two cases an additional 10 days were given for contempt of court. Twelve men out of 21 sentenced received four months or more. Among those held are Carl Swelgen and Joe Schneider. Two of the accused demanded jury trials.

Auto Crosses Mountains
Bend, Or., Aug. 1.—Although three feet of snow still lies on the summit of the Mackenzie pass road the trip from Bend to Eugene may be made without difficulty, according to T. A. McCann of Bend, who has just returned from an auto tour through the mountains. The section of the road lying between Bend and Eugene was covered in nine hours.

14-Year Old Maiden Seeks to Join Army
Potosky, Mich., Aug. 1.—Wearing a gaudy uniform, Miss Dorothy Scheidel, aged 14, was stopped at Grand Rapids Tuesday afternoon en route to Detroit, where she intended to try to enlist in a branch of military service. The girl disappeared from Potosky last Friday and an unavailing search ensued. Her hair was clipped close. She walked to Grand Rapids and was going to walk the rest of the way to Detroit.

Washington, Aug. 1.—(U. N. S.)—Bennett Clark, son of Speaker Clark, a candidate for a commission in the army, has been recommended for a captaincy by the officials in charge of the Fort Meyer training camp.

New T. Mooney Trial To Depend on Oxman

District Attorney Says If Jury Finds Oregon Man Guilty, He is Willing to Reopen Case.

San Francisco, Aug. 1.—(U. N. S.)—District Attorney Charles M. Fickert has found what he considers a safe and just course to be pursued in the matter of a new trial for Thomas J. Mooney, under sentence of death for the preparedness parade bomb murders.

Fickert said, in discussing the action of Attorney General Webb, in filing in the supreme court his stipulation consenting to a new trial for Mooney because of the Oxman letters, that he believed that justice as between Mooney and the state would best be served by making a new trial for Mooney dependant upon the conviction or acquittal of Frank C. Oxman, who is awaiting trial in the superior court on the charge of having attempted to procure F. E. Rigall to give false testimony against Mooney.

In order to give effect to his position in the matter, said Fickert, he would endeavor to set ahead the trial of Oxman, so as to secure the verdict of a jury at an early date upon the issue of Oxman's guilt.

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The Journal Woman's Calendar

THURSDAY'S THRIFT

THOUGHT A large amount of good food in potatoes including most of the valuable mineral elements, is wasted by ordinary methods of peeling. Baking "in the jackets" also means a loss (if the jacket is not eaten) since much of the meat of the potatoes sticks to the stiffened skin and is discarded. Here is a suggestion for reducing the discarded portion of the potato to a minimum:

Washed potatoes in a vessel of rapidly boiling water and allow them to remain 10 minutes. Remove and strip the thin skin as when potatoes are peeled after thorough cooking by boiling. The potatoes will still be practically raw and may be handled like raw peeled potatoes in preparing any dish, as scalloped, French or German fried potatoes, potato chips, etc.

One excellent way to cook the skinned potatoes is to bake them. The entire potato, including the thin, golden brown crust may be eaten.

OLD ORDER CHANGETH

The old English order of four meals a day is giving place to three. In short, afternoon tea, once the height of fashion and adopted widely by Americans, is now un fashionable because unpatriotic. True, the food controller has recognized the fourth meal by decreeing that two ounces of breadstuffs may be eaten between the hours of 3 and 4, but something stronger than the food controller, our old friend, Public Opinion, is against eating between luncheon and dinner. So the days of the afternoon tea are numbered. Who, surveying the pleasant world prospect three summers ago, would have prophesied a catastrophe great enough to dash the afternoon tea cup (or dish, as many say), from the lips of John Bull? But unpleasant as the sacrifice of light refreshment around 4 or 5 o'clock will be to those who have accustomed themselves to the gain in health will compensate for it. And Britishers realize this and are writing letters against food between luncheon and dinner hours.

Fortunately for us, we go into the war used to only three meals a day. We do not have so much to give up. Breakfast, luncheon and dinner have been enough to satisfy most people and sustain them for the daily struggle.

Three a day is our established number, just as four are recognized as the standard in England; the insatiable, who wake up in the middle of the night and patter downstairs for a piece of pie do not count in the official estimates. Some city folk have learned to keep going on two meals a day, breakfast and dinner; two others vary the scheme by omitting breakfast. So we are starting well. We have no fourth meal to give up, and many have no third. Great Britain's experience is worth noting, however, because it shows what changes war can work in the national mode of life. We all know how an Englishman loves his tea in the afternoon, so we can appreciate that when the poor fellow submits to his prohibition he is doing his bit just the same as though he were amusing Fritz in France.

TOOTHsome CHINESE

DISHES Here are a few favorite dishes— and delicious Chinese

First—Stew an ox, sheep or pig's heart, or as much of it as would be necessary, until quite tender. Slice and return to dish with mushrooms, two prunellas, some chopped celery, a little horseradish and one red pepper chopped fine if you like it hot. Thicken the gravy with a little flour and serve hot. If fond of mushrooms add these and about one large tablespoonful of the green part of the celery.

Second—One pound lean pork, stew until tender. Cut into thin slices. One large cucumber, having soaked in salt water for an hour or more, cut very thin, put one half in dish, then the pork (cold), then the remainder of the cucumber. Put one half cup of vinegar on to boil, and if liked add two cloves or some nutmeg. Pour over the meat and cucumbers and serve cold. If onions are liked add large ones, and if more seasoning add a red pepper. Salad dressing on this is also good.

Third (For Winter)—About one pound of pork, lean and fat, cut in inch cubes, put in pan and keep turning until a delicious brown. Put two large sweet potatoes on to boil and when tender cut in pieces as large as meat, about six large chestnuts, put with pork and add caramel to make a brown gravy. Serve tomatoes stewed with this. Turnips, squash or pumpkin can be used instead of sweet potatoes.
